BOOST THE BETTER FARMING PROGRAM.

Too much cannot be said or written about the value of the "better farming" program that has been inaugurated in this county. It must be put over. More feed and more food must be raised. More hogs and more hominy are needed. It is said that Eastland county spends approximately \$1,000,000 a year for imported pork products that she could raise at home. Better farming means more hogs.

CAREFUL DRIVING PREVENTS ACCIDENTS.

Slippery roads and streets are not inducive to fast riding. More than 75 per cent of the auto accidents are due to carelessness and fast driving under all conditions. Wanting to pass the man on the road who is careful in driving his car usually causes some one to get turned over in a ditch and some necks, limbs or ribs to be broken. Often failing to stop at a railroad crossing and looking up and down the line causes accidents that could be averted. If you are close enough to read the license plate on the rear of a car, you are most too close for safety. Folks who are hurt in accidents usually contribute more than 50 per cent of the cause of the mishap. This is peculiarly true of auto accidents. The average autoist ought to remember that hurry makes orry, and haste makes waste. The highways are slippery now, so let's be careful and not speed. You may get there in plenty of time by not speeding, whereas, if you speeded you might not get there at all. It's always better to be safe than sorry. Safety does not mean that you should drive recklessly in town or on the state highways. Just here we want to mention that the drivers of the West Texas coaches are careful drivers and make the time without infracting speed laws. It might be a good idea for some auto drivers we have seen cutting corners around town, that those who will not heed must be made to feel. And accidents are caused by not heeding.

KEEP UP YOUR CHICKENS.

Beautiful flowers growing in the front yard of a home and vegetables in the rear of the premises are civic attractions. Considerable interest has been manifested this spring in the development of these civic assets. This paper has fostered the planting of vegetable gardens and trees and flowers. They can't be made to produce either beauty or food if chickens are allowed to run at large. Old Lady Arabella Hen and Baby Biddy are sworn enemies to flower gardens and vegetable plots. This paper has ever sponsored the production of poultry. To fix up a poultry yard so that your chickens will not intrude on your neighbor's flower and vegetable gardens will not cost a great deal, and besides keep down animosity. Sometimes chickens allowed to run at large costs heavily. It has been known to cost human life. The man who has chickens in his back lot ought to pause a minute, and repeat the Golden Rule a few times before he allows them to run at large. He can clip their wings and put up chicken fence that will keep them in. There is an ordinance against allowing chickens to run at large. The enforcement of that ordinance will help. Sometimes when the officer who has the enforcement of antichicken ordinance in charge has to face a tongue lashing. He is often asked, if the fact was not reported by the neighbor who strenuously objects because of his vegetable and flower gardens. If the officer is indiscreet, he may cause trouble. However, the man who has chickens in his back lot should obey the law and keep them up at this season of the year.
