Ranger has a higher percentage of improperly nourished children than any other town in the county, according to Miss Hellen Gillette, Red Cross dietician for Eastland county. There are likewise a number of children here with serious defects. These children should be given an opportunity to overcome their conditions and defects, she points out. Many babies here dine on pork chops and fried potatoes, washing down this corn field diet with coffee, it is stated.

Miss Gillette has been giving a series of lectures here during the last few weeks on the various types of food, taking the subject up in detail and explaning the value of fruits, vegetables, meats and cereals.

Next Wednesday she will take up the problem of the well balanced meal and show how the various food groups are selected in preparing such a diet. In her home-visiting work here, Miss Gillette states that she has found cases of babies not over 2 or 3 years of age eating pork chops and fried potatoes. The use of coffee by very young children is also very common, she says. In attempting to build strong, well nourished bodies among the children, the co-operation of the parents is essential, she points out, and to obtain this co-operation the lectures and discussions are being given here.

# **WOMEN'S LAUGHS**

Twenty-Six Known Dead Scattered Over Country Surrounding Strip Mine; Men Hanged, Shot and Beaten to Death.

By Associated Press.

HERRIN, Ill., June 22.—Twenty-six men are known to have been killed in open warfare between union men and sympathizers with employes of the strip mine near here of the Southern Illinois Coal company.

Union sympathizers stormed the camp of the workers just before daybreak but found it unoccupied. Shortly after daybreak they returned and found the men hiding behind the steam shovels and other machinery, reports said. The mine employes were thereupon lined up and some of them were marched into the woods and lynched, according to the reports. It was reported that forty-six prisoners were being brought here

Persons who canvassed the workings say bodies "are scattered all over" the surrounding country. The surrounding country swarms with persons, many armed, and this had prevented a checkup of the number reported dead.

A checkup at noon today by the Associated Press revealed twenty-six known dead, with indications that the list would be increased by more than thirty other victims of the fighting in the vicinity of the strip mine.

The bodies were scattered over a fifteen-mile area, some of them riddled with bullets and others beaten to death. Three bodies were found hanging to trees.

Women Laugh at Agony. In the middle of the road near the mine, six men with their bodies mangled by bullets and blows were found tied together in the scorching sun, while hundreds of men and women looked on and laughed at their pleas for water in the name of God. 
