STAMFORD, June 22.—An amazingly good defense and a consistent offense could not quite overcome the heavy hitting of the Colonels yesterday, and Stamford took the second game from Ranger, 6 to 5.

Lefty Phillips was touched for sixteen hits, an accomplishment that amazed Stamford fans, as they had been hearing he was a demon hurler. Those blows kept him in hot water all through the game, but they could not break through with any success until the seventh, when they ganged a cluster of safeties and counted five times. At the time, the Nitros were leading, 2 to 1. When topped 6 to 2, they wouldn't admit they were beaten and came right back with two more tallies in the eighth. They added another when Clayton, first up in the ninth, hit a homer, and after Ammons, pinch hitting for Craig with two down, had belted a single, Conley was jerked and George Knadler sent to the rescue. Knadler fanned Dockery for the final out.

NITROS PLAY ON HOME YARD FOR THIRTEEN DAYS

The Nitros return home tomorrow for a stand of thirteen days, during which probably fifteen games will be played.

Sweetwater opens a three-game series tomorrow. Following Sweetwater comes Amarillo for three games, on June 26, 27 and 28, during which it is probable that at least one double-header will be played, as two games were rained out during the first trip here. This series will close the first half, which ends with the games of June 28.

Opening the second half, is a four-game series with Lubbock, which team has early pummeled the Nitros to date, and following Lubbock comes Abilene, as guests from July 3 to 5, with two games on July 4. On the Fourth of July, for the first time in the history of Ranger baseball, a morning game will be played, at 10:30 o'clock, with the afternoon game at 3:30.

Following the Abilene series, the Nitros hit the road for three days at San Angelo, return home for a three-day series with the same club and then hop to Amarillo, Sweetwater, Lubbock for nine games. That's lots of mileage, but perhaps it can't be helped.

BABY UNINJURED IN FALL FROM UPSTAIRS WINDOW

DALLAS, June 22.—Falling from the second story of a residence, Charles Roberts Jr., a 21-months-old child, escaped practically uninjured here Wednesday, according to doctors at the Emergency hospital, where the child was treated. The child was rendered unconscious, but examination showed that he was not seriously hurt. The baby boy was playing about the home within an hour after the accident. He rolled out of a bed through a window on the second floor, and struck in a flower bed, which had just been spaded.

GET SUPPLIES, ORIENT WARNS TOWNS ON LINE

SAN ANGELO, June 22.—Warning to merchants and stockmen in towns served exclusively by the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railroad to obtain and store needed supplies before July 1, "as there is no reason now to believe other than that the Orient will cease operations on that date" was issued Wednesday by Alex Collins, general attorney for Orient in Texas. All efforts by management to finance further operations have failed and but \$46,000 remains in treasury, Collins said in emphasizing that warning should be taken seriously. So far, realization that the Orient trains will stop July 1 with subsequent scrapping of the line is likely, says Collins. Many persons are refusing to believe abandonment is at hand, as it has been averted before.

STAMFORD READY TO HANG AUTO THIEVES

STAMFORD, June 22.—A determined set of citizens of Stamford, it is reported, having had their patience exhausted by a series of robberies of automobiles, are planning to take drastic action, it was learned here today. Feeling is high and a robber taken in the act of removing a car might stretch him from the nearest telegraph pole. Some citizens have suggested that men detected stealing cars be tied to a post and given a thrashing with a "cat-o-nine-tails." The latest thefts were cars Saturday night and Sunday night. Recently garages have been broken into and cars removed.

DALLAS MAN STABBED TO DEATH WITH ICE PICK

DALLAS, June 22.—Dave Henry, 29 years old, is dead and Arthur Tatum, 34, is in jail charged with murder following a fight between the two men Wednesday afternoon. Tatum is alleged to have been in an argument with his wife when Henry came to the house. A few minutes later, with eight stab wounds in his breast, inflicted with an ice pick, Henry's body was in the morgue.

HART POOL EXTENDED NORTHWARD TWO MILES

CADDO, June 22.—The Hart oil pool in the extreme western part of Palo Pinto county, has been extended two miles to the north by bringing in of a well on the Couger ranch. The well was drilled by the Dalton-Davis interests. The well was shot into production with 220 quarts of nitro-glycerine. After the shot which was placed at 3,457 to 3,489 feet, the hole bridged. Upon being cleaned out later, the well was reported Wednesday to be flowing between 500 and 1,000 barrels daily. The new well is two miles north of the principal development in the Hart pool and means an extension to the field of that distance. The Hart Oil corporation drilled its No. 3 Hart into a gas sand Tuesday at 2,000 feet and the well is reported to be making 6,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily. The gas well is only a short distance from other wells in the field which are producing oil at lower levels and which had gas showings at the 2,000-foot level. Whether the well will be drilled deeper or stopped at the present depth and the gas utilized has not been determined by the company. Of the 78 former service men of the United States army who were awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor during the world war, the whereabouts of 20 of them are only vaguely known, while four others have vanished without leaving the slightest trace.

Dancing No Cause For Firing Teacher, Is Kansas Ruling

TOPEKA, Kan., June 22.—Another chapter in the controversy between the members of the school board of Eminence, Finney county, Mrs. Clara White, Eminence school teacher, and State Superintendent Lorraine E. Wooster, was written yesterday when Attorney General Richard J. Hopkins ruled that at-

tending and participating in a dance is not sufficient grounds for refusing to renew a school teacher's certificate. Dancing is not prohibited by state law, the attorney general holds and, moreover, the state superintendent has no authority to revoke a teacher's certificate. This power, the opinion states, is vested only in the state board of education. It also is pointed out that the state board of administration, to which Mrs. White appealed when Miss Wooster refused to renew her certificate for attending a dance, has no authority to act in the matter. "It is within the power of the state board of education to make dancing a ground for refusal to renew a certificate," the opinion declared.
