





Following is the tentative plans for the tour, rules being under consideration to determine the winners, who will be judged by their durability:

Sept. 28—Detroit to Fort Wayne and Chicago; 29, Chicago to Iowa City and Omaha; 30, Omaha to St. Joseph and Kansas City; Oct. 1, Kansas City to St. Louis; Oct. 2, St. Louis to Indianapolis and Columbus, and Oct 3, Columbus to Cleveland to Detroit

Only commercial planes may enter. The shortest hop will be around 225 miles and the longest 400.


