PROPOSALS ARE

One Aimed at U. S. Influence Meets With Immediate Opposition From Uruguay.

HAVANA, Jan. 23 .- Two important Pan-American proposals—one regarded as aimed at the United States and the other likely to decrease still further the league of nation's influence in the west—met immediate opposition at the Pan-American conference today.

Dr. Jacob Varela, Uruguay, voiced the opposition

ed the opposition. First he expressed disapproval of a Mexican proposal calling for re-organization of the manner in which the Pan-American union is operated. Its sole effect would be to limit the now preponderant influence of the United States in Union matters.

The second proposal was submitted by the Cuban delegation. It called for inauguration in the Union of a department to promote solidarity among American republics to investigate and try to solve disputes among union members and to study means of insuring good Pan-American relations generally. tions generally.

Dr. Varela praised the spirit of that portion of the proposal dealing with the conciliation but said he thought it was premature.

Comptroller Statement Shows Small Income From Big Production.

(The following summary of the oil situation in Texas has been prepared by State Comptroller S. H. Terrell, through whose department gross receipt taxes on oil are received.)

AUSTIN, Jan. 23.—In 1926, a total of 140,989,914 barrels of cil was produced in Texas, having a total reported valuation of \$268,523,559, or \$1.90 plus, per barrel, and bringing a gross production tax of \$5,389,607 to the state, whereas, in 1927 the production reached 209,896,544 barrels, an increase of 69,906,630 barrels, an increase of 69,906,630 barrels over the previous year, having a total value of \$284,160,011, or at the rate of \$1.35 plus, per barrel, but showing slightly more than \$260,000 increase in gross receipts taxes over 1926, due to the great depression in the crude oil market.

From the figures quoted it will be

seen that the price of the product declined approximately 30 per cent during the past year.

Present Santa Claus Suit As Evidence In The Trial

Detailed accounts of the robbery of the First National bank of Cisco on Dec. 23, when four bandits, one masked as Santa Claus and the other three unmasked, held up officers and employes with pistols and took more than \$12,000 in money and a large amount of securities from the vault, were given by witnesses called by the state this morning in the case of Marshall Ratliff, charged Says Visited Wife with robbery with firearms in connection with the holding

up of the bank. Alex Spear, cashier, and Jewell Poe, assistant cashier, of the First National bank, and Marion Olson, son of A. J. Olson of Cisco, and who was in the bank at the time of the holdup, and B. C. Long of Wichita Falls were the witnesses placed on the stand by the state up to noon today. Spear and Olson were both wounded at the time of the robbery, Spear in the face and Olson through the right side.

Both are rapidly recovering. The Santa Claus suit, alleged to have been worn by Marshall Ratliff at the time of the robbery, was offered in evidence after having been identified by Spear as heing the analysis.

A plat of the First National Bank building showing the streets, alleys, etc., was shown to Alex Speers, first witness for the state, and then placed in evidence in the case. This drawing showed the building to be a rick structure facing east on the main street and with an alley along the side on the west and also a narrower alley at the back running north and south.
