ARGENTINE GIRL WILL TRY TO SWIM CHANNEL

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One Thousand Homes Costing \$75,000,000 Planned at Miami

MIAMI, Fla., August 6.— Announcement of a \$75,000,000 home building program, the largest single house construction operation in history, has just been made by George E. Merrick, owner of Coral Gables, ten thousand acre real estate development adjoining Miami.

Contract for the first section of the work, which is the largest home building contract on record in the U. S. in point of value and quality of construction, has been awarded to the American Building Corporation, a \$2,000,000 organization formed by a group of Miami capitalists.

Twelve well known architects of New York and Miami have been retained to work out an interesting general plan which will make this development unique in architectural history. All buildings now at Coral Gables are restricted to the Mediterranean type, which is a composite of the styles native to semi-tropical countries bordering along the Mediterranean sea.

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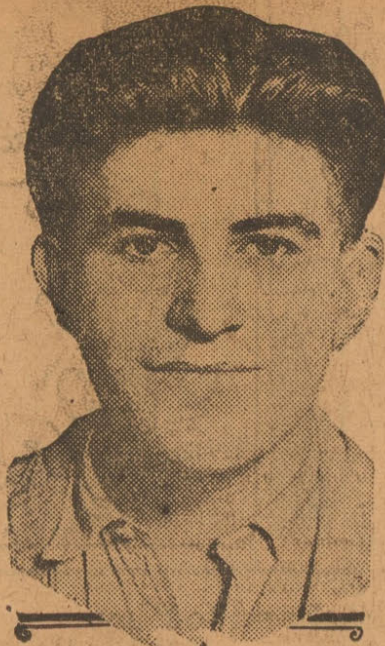

**Birth Registration Work in Brown Co.**

A special "birth registration" week in Brown county, sponsored by Miss Nell Stoltzfus, public health nurse, was held the last month according to the report of the public health nursing service of the state board of health.

Miss Stoltzfus was assisted in this campaign by Katherine Hagquist, state advisory nurse, and the local parent-teacher organization. A birth registration chairman was appointed for each of the 57 school districts, and under their direction, intensive work was done to arouse interest in the communities in the behalf of reg-

istration. The campaign was a very successful one, resulting in a big boost upward of the Brown county birth registration rate.

At present, there is approximately 74 per cent of births in Texas being reported. Of the other 26 per cent of children, the state has no record of their existence. To be in the registration area of the United States, each state is required to register 90 per cent of all births and deaths, consequently Texas is not included in this registration area. Some of the reasons why a child's birth should be made a part of the state's record are:

Birth registration proves the child's age, an essential point in admission to and leaving school; in marriage, voting, or qualifying for jury or military service. Proof of age is also necessary in the prosecution of certain statutory offenses and right of jurisdiction of juvenile courts.

Birth registration proves the

child's identity, an essential point in administration of property; settlement of inheritance and pensions; passport and residence in foreign countries; and readmission to the United States after residence abroad.

**CHILE CON CARNE NOT FROM MEXICO**

MEXICO CITY.—Whatever the origin of that succulent dish of kidney beans, meat and chile now produced in vast quantities by American packing companies under the label "Mexican Chile Con Carne," if there ever was such a dish native to Mexico it must have been before the conquest by Cortez.

No one in Mexico ever heard of it until it began coming from across the Rio Grande.

True enough the component parts of this American culinary invention exist in vast quantities in all parts of Mexico, but one has yet to hear of a native mixing them up in any such

fashion as that so common in the States.

Authoritative on the subject are inclined to believe that the dish originated among the pioneers of Texas, who may possibly have adopted it from the American Indian, who like the Irish, are famous for their stews of meat, vegetables, etc., that is, inasmuch as few Mexicans have ever tasted this form of chile with meat, they are neither incensed nor boastful that their American brothers have credited them with its concoction.

**American Movies Distort History for British Youth**

LONDON, Aug. 6.—American history—contemporary and past—as imparted to British youth through United States films is giving Britain “an unwholesome and distorted viewpoint.”

This at any rate is the conclusion reached by Prof. S. E. Morison, the retiring Harmsworth professor of American history at Oxford university.

Delivering an address on “The Study of American History in England” before the Anglo-American History conference, Professor Morison declared, “So far as I know there are only three English schools where the history of the United States is taught. On the other hand English history has been taught to three generations of Americans in thousands of their schools and colleges, and it has done much to dissipate old prejudices.”

“Here however the British youths get their ideas of America largely from the motion pictures and these American films mostly present a distorted view of American life. They are all very well for the United States for which they are primarily intended as their purpose is mostly to serve as a romantic compensation for the humdrum life of Main street. But their effect here where the background is different, is, I believe, unwholesome.”

**World Ship Tonnage, Despite War Losses, Greater Than Before**

LONDON, Aug. 6.—Despite shipping losses during the world war the world's shipping tonnage is now nearly 40 per cent greater than it was in 1914.

Statistics contained in the new edition of Lloyd's shipping register places the present world shipping tonnage of vessels of over 100 tons at 58,785,000 in 1925 against 42,514,000 in 1914.

**Pacific Maneuvers Continue to Arouse Japan's Suspicions**

TOKYO, August 6.—Reassuring statements from Washington and London have by no means satisfied Japanese public opinion that American naval maneuvers in the Pacific are not in the nature of a military gesture by the United States.

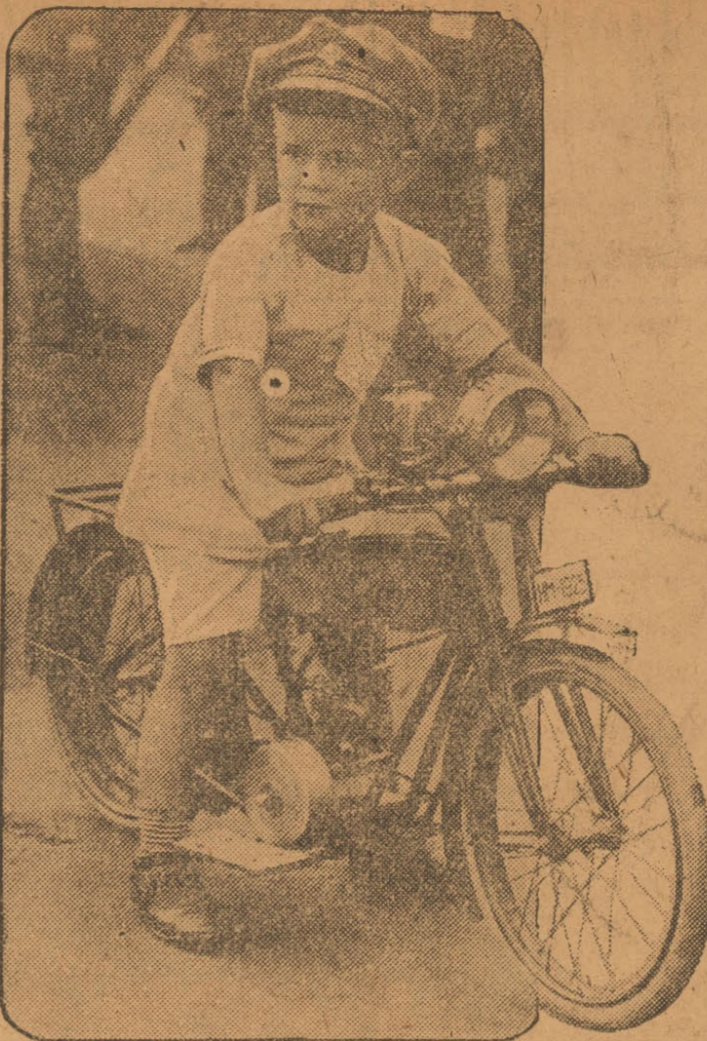
Japan still feels keenly the humiliation she suffered through the immigration law and many observers see in the naval maneuvers a silent demonstration by the Washington government that it is able to back up its stand on immigration by force if necessary.

Holding of the naval maneuvers “not long after the anti-Japanese immigration law by congress was extremely unfortunate,” says the Osaka Mainichi, one of the most powerful Japanese dailies.

“It was on so large a scale as to invite suspicion,” the newspaper asserts, and cannot but be regarded in this country as a brazen attempt to study naval warfare with Japan as an imaginary enemy.

The journal answers arguments forward in justification of the maneuvers by American and British publicists by asserting that these do not touch the fundamentals of the question of peace. It points out that Sir Herbert Russell is one British naval critic who admits the real reason for the tests in his statement that other powers (Australia) merely that “the fleet is too large for visit for the purpose of international courtesy.”

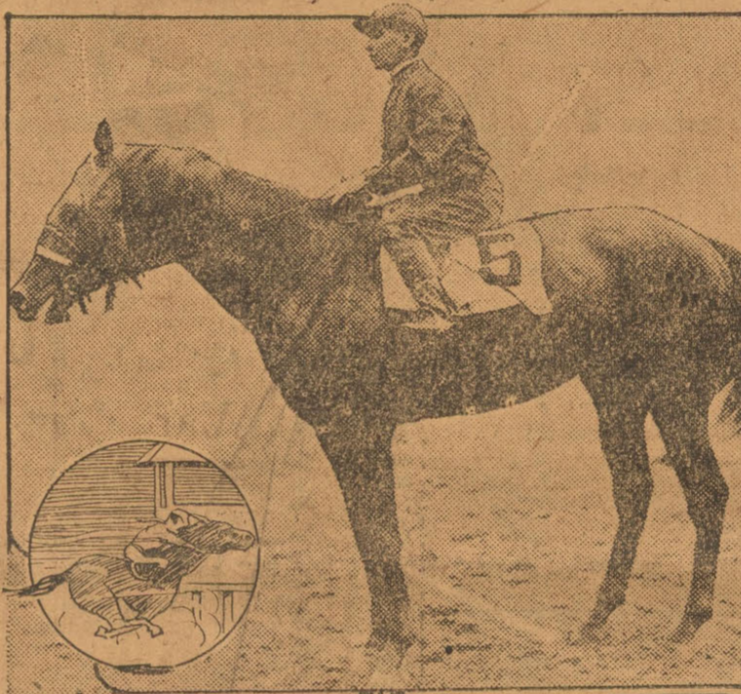

**OUTCH INVENT NEW WAY PRESERVE FRUIT ENROUTE**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—A new method for preservation of tropical fruits during long shipments has been invented by Dr. P. J. Cramer, director of the station for the selection of plants, at Buitenzorg, Java, according to advices received by the department of commerce from Harold D. Finley, American consul at Naples, Italy.

Cramer's method consists of covering the fruit, picked slightly before maturity, with a thin coat of liquid rubber preparation (hevea). Each piece of fruit is then wrapped in waxed paper, thereby retarding the ripening period. The coating also prevents to a great degree, the action of microbes which cause deterioration.

### Early American Antiques Sought For White House

By WILLIAM J. MEVOY, United Press Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON.—The "terrible" furniture and interior decorations of the White House are being taken away.

The white and gold of the French empire period will have disappeared entirely from three rooms, the Green room and the two bedrooms of the president and Mrs. Coolidge, by the time they return from their summer vacation in Massachusetts.

Adam period furniture, also known as "early republic" type evolved by American craftsmen after the revolution, and approved by George Washington, will replace the present furnishings, which is "terrible, artistically speaking," according to R. H. T. Halsey, of the Metropolitan museum of fine arts, New York. Halsey is in charge of the renovation work, as head of advisory committee of artists which directs the work.

Not Enough Money. There is not enough money available to furnish the famous state dining room, the Red room or the Blue room, in "early republic" so those rooms must remain in their present colorful "jumble."

Congress last spring appropriated \$50,000 for the white house, and the money is being spread as far as possible. The white house roof, which was in danger of falling on the president's head, is being repaired and painted. The kitchen is being refurnished and made more efficient for production of the famous flapjacks. An elevator is being installed, and the vacuum-cleaning system is being modernized.

Gifts of the finest American furniture may be solicited in order to make "the first house of the nation" an example of the best cabinet-making of the United States. The congressional appropriation

was not enough to carry out fully the "early republic" refurnishing which the experts have agreed upon. Congress recognized this and adopted another measure which provides for acceptance of suitable furniture.

May be Asked to Donate. The experts on the commission planning for the renovation know the history and location of practically every authentic and valuable piece of "early republic" type of American furniture, and some of the present owners may be asked to donate part of their collections to the United States government.

Maryland and Virginia have a rich store of the worth-while pieces of colonial furniture, and Philadelphia and some of the New England cities and towns also may be drawn up.

The two bedrooms of the president and Mrs. Coolidge, and the Green room, are being refitted from what is left of the \$50,000 appropriation after the repair work necessary is done. Any work carried out at the present time, however, on the other rooms, must be without expense to the government.

If no furniture can be obtained free, congress may be asked next fall to appropriate an additional sum of money to purchase suitable outfitings.

The deafening clatter of the riveting gun may soon be heard no longer when the steel structure of a modern building is being put in place. Instead of the riveting gun, engineers predict, electric arc welding will be used. Thus the framework of such a building will be a single welded unit. The work done will be just as strong as the best riveting and considerably cheaper.

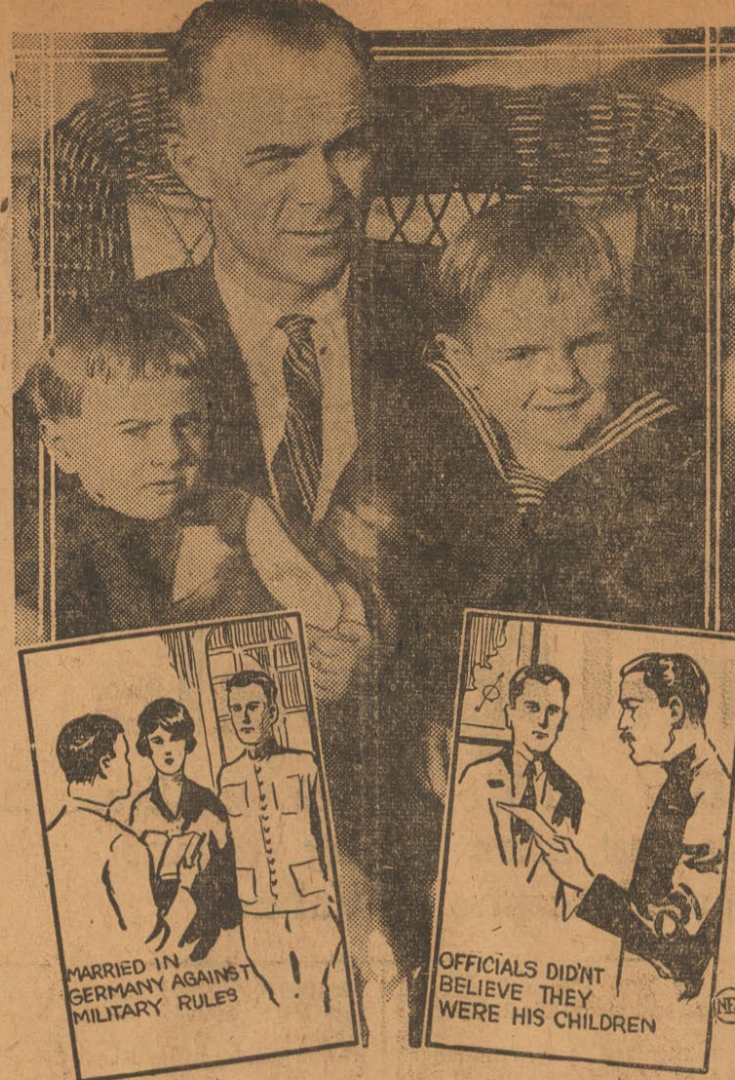

AUSTIN, Aug. 5.—Revenue amounting to approximately \$66,000 annually is received by the University of Texas from rental of residences and summer camp sites.
