CLEM GRAY IS ELECTROCUTED

Goes to Chair With Throat Cut In Effort to Take His Own Life.

HUNTSVILLE, Aug. 7 .- Defeated in a last minute attempt to end his life, George Clem Gray, 40, for-mer prohibition agent and deputy sheriff of Titus county, was sent to death in the electric chair here early today for the slaying of Otis Ballard in 1923. Gray protested to the end that he was innocent.

The doomed man was dragged to the chair with blood streaming from his neck, having slashed himself with a safety razor blade. He was pronounced dead at 12:08 o'clock, four minutes after the current was applied. Gray went to his death after a long fight to obtain a commutation a long fight to obtain a commutation of the death sentence.

The former deputy sheriff was sentenced for the slaying of Ballard, whose stripped body was found weighted down in a creek. Gray denied striking the fatal blok, but said he had helped the negro, Earl Kemp, dispose of the body.



On the other hand English history has been taught to three generations of Americans in thousands of their schools and colleges, and it has done much to dis-

sipate old prejudices,

"Here however the British youths get their ideas of America largely from the motion pictures and these American films mostly present a distorted view of American life. They are all very well for the United States for which they are primarily intended as their purpose is mostly to serve as a romantic compensation for the humdrum life of Main street. But their effect here where the background is different, is, I be-lieve, unwholesome."


