TRIPLE MURDER **NEAR AUSTIN**

Two Negro Suspects Prove Alibi; Two White Suspects Being Held.

AUSTIN, Aug. 11.—Evidence un-covered in the last 48 hours in connection with the slaying of three pernection with the slaying of three persons at Delvalle, Sunday, is not sufficient to warrant filing of charges, the sheriff's department admitted today. Two negroes who have been questioned furnished alibis and were released in the morning. Two white men, neighbors of the Engler family, and two Mexicans will be subjected to further questioning.

In an attempt to force a confession officers took the two white suspects to the morgue at midnight, Monday, and had them view the slain.

The slaying of S. E. Engler, 60, prosperous farmer; his wife, 55, and their adopted daughter, Emma, 25, occurred at the Engler home at the little settlement of Mooreview, east of Austin, Saturday night or early

The theory first advanced that a negro had committed the slaying with criminal assault on Miss Engler as the motive, was abandoned Sunday night when physicians reported that an examination failed to show that an assault had been committed. That robbery was not the motive shown by the fact that jewelry valued at approximately \$1,000 was found undisturbed in the Engler home, and also the watch of Engler

home, and also the watch of Engler was found under the pillow upon which he slept, when the fatal shot was fired into his head.

Miss Engler's nude body was found on the floor of the bedroom with her feet lying in the doorway leading to the front room of the house. There was evidence that Miss Engler struggled desperately with the murderer before she was killed. She was shot twice, both wounds being in the head. Engler was also shot in the head and apparently was asleep when murdered. Mrs. Engler also died from a wound in the bead.

A torn and bloody night garment of Miss Engler was found in the front room, a few feet from the body.

Of every 100 women and girls over 15 years in the United States 23 are earning their own living, and a majority of them work more than 48 hours per week for less money than is paid to men for similar work. Nine of these 23 are married. The total number of working women is more than 8,250,000. The "average" wages paid in some of the states are: Rhode Island, \$16.25; New Jersey, \$14.95; Ohio, \$13.80; Georgia, \$12.95; Missouri, 12.65; Kansas, \$11.95; Arkansas, \$11.60; Kentucky, \$10.75; South Carolina, \$9.50; Alabama, \$8.80. 
