
and piling it is now and not during the designated week," he said. "Prizes will be paid for the largest pile of trash that has been collected, and it makes little difference whether it is collected during clean up

Oakland \$3,000,000 **Expansion** Finished In Only 4 Months

PONTIAC, Mich., March 17.-Last week, less than four months after the first rattle of pneumati chammers signalized the commencement of the latest expansion preject of the Oakland Motor Car company, the new \$3,000,000 car assembly and ping buildings for the Oakland All-American Six were completed and pronounced ready for the installation of conveyors, processing equipment and machinery.

The speed with which the buildings were erected is believed to constitut a record for this type of steel, brick and concrete construction.

The new structures provide the company with 580,191 square feet of additional floor space besides five more railroad shipping spurs, four of them entirely within the walls of the shipping building. The company now has ten tracks in its private "railroad yard."

Nearly all of the machinery to be used in the Oakland assembly will be entirely new. The old assembly plant entrely new. The old assembly plant will cease operating on March 24 in order that a portion of the equipment now in use may be transferred to the new assembly. President A. R. Glancy expects that production in the new plant will start April 2. The old assembly building will be used for matorial starsage for material storage.

Two assembly lines will be install-ed and space has been provided for a third assembly line such as was adde recently in the Pontiac Six assembly plant which parallels that of the Oakland Six. 




