

Waves His Hands Near Radio Set and Pulls Music Out of Air

By WILLIAM J. FAGAN, United Press Staff Correspondent.

There is no witchery in the youthful Russian's feat. The music which he evokes from his instrument is not supernatural, though it may possess an unearthly quality in sound. The device is merely an elaboration of the familiar "regeneration" or "squeal" which countless radio listeners have experienced in working with a regen-

erative radio receiving set.

Thus far, Theremin has exhibited his device in private at the Hotel Plaza before a distinguished gathering of invited guests and in public at the Metropolitian Opera house and Carrecia hall. He has extended the Carnegie half. He has astounded the musicians and the music writers, many of whom are entirely unversed in the technicalities of radio, or even electrical mechanics, to be sure. But even more than that, he has aroused in hard-boiled radio engineers and

writers on technical radio subjects an exceptional interest in his machine, if machine it can be called.

Theremin admits that he is an engineer, not a musician. He apologizes for his playing of his instrument and expresses the hope that some gifted musician may see fit to nerfect himself in the technical mas-

paper fantastically, or not so fantastically as you may judge it, suggests future use of a whole orchestra of trivial position to have an effect up-

This is the first time, however, that we have been able to combine the two, so as to get relatively large power cut-puts on the short wave-lengths. This new be is a step in the development of nort-wave radio transmission, or which we have been intensively en aged for several years. At present can generate the power, but we have not yet devised a method of ontrolling its frequency within th lose limits necessary for commercial

When asked what plans were un-erway for the future of the high-ower short-wave investigation, L Hawkins, executive engineer of Research Laboratory, said that eneral Electric had no definite ans for this investigation. "The proposition was to build a

h-power tube of this type," he adid, "and our time has so far been aken entirely with the development the apparatus itself. Vacuum ube technique had to be improved considerably before it was possible to design and produce an oscillator which would give the large power output we wer seeking. We have not studied the applications of the new tube at all, except to make a record of the interesting sidelights which its operations has brought out. The demonstrations indicate that many the high-frequency phenomena may be worth investigating, and it is likely that in the future applications will suggest themselves, as they al-ways do when a new field is entered." In the radio cooking a wire was suspended over a table at some distance from the radiating aerial, and parallel to it. A sausage, placed in glass tube, was hung from the end this receiving aerial, and in a ew minutes it began to steam. On being removed, it was found to have been beautifully cooked by the highrequency currents induced in it, alhough no flames or other visible eans of heating were applied.
