Our good will ambassador, America's air hero, in other words "Lindy" is back home. Yesterday at one minute after 5 o'clock he landed at Lambert, St. Louis air field, completing a 1,250 mile non-stop flight from Havana, Cuba.

He was a little late and during the late afternoon hours when his plane had not been seen since early morning, Americans began to show some little concern regarding his safety. They had not for a minute lost confidence in Lindbergh's ability, but it was a bad day and it was probably the most trying flight the Colonel has made since his history making flight from New York to Paris last May Weather men said he could hardly bave had a worse day in which to make the long hop that he so successfully completed yesterday after-

Two months ago to a day, on Dec 13, Lindbergh had taken off from Washington, D. C. on a 2,000 mile non-stop flight to Mexico City, which was his initial flight on a good will tour that extended over nearly a dozen Central American, South Ameri can and west Indian countries and which required more than 2,000 miles

When Lindbergh settled down at the flying field in St. Louis late yes terday it was just another day's work for the famous flyer but for the American people it was the concluion of another great history making event and today the American people regard Lindbergh with an even greater degree of affection than when h returned from Paris.
