Bankers in Detroit To Have June Weather All the Year Round

DETROIT, March 6.—Electrical ice boxes will be hooked up with steam heat, air washers, air filters and giant ventilating fans, to manufacture perfect weather in all seasons for Detroit's mammoth new Union Trust bank building, which is now under construction


All a tenant of the new building will have to do on a sweltering, hot summer's day is to open a register in his office and refrigerated, clean air, cooled to a temperature of 70 degrees or less, will pour forth to soothe his feverish brow and remind him of his summer camp at Lake Placid. Every room in the new building will have its individual air control so that tenants may be comfortable and free from the city's dust and other

sources of air pollution.

The air conditioning and ventilating apparatus alone in the new building will cost more than \$250,-Twenty-four fans will blow 440,000 cubic feet or 33,000 pounds of air per minute to ventilate the building. This is equal to 990 tones of air per hour. The refrigerating machines, to be used for cooling the air, will have a refrigerating capa city equivalent to the making of 700 tons of ice per day. Conditioned air will be driven even into the bank vaults to keep these spaces cool and well ventilated at all times.

Challenging the architectural su-premacy of banking institutions in other large industrial centers, Detroit Bankers believe that the new tuilding will be one of the most unique of its kind and stand as a monu rient to banking in the United States It will rise 40 stories above grade with three basements below grade and its cost will run into many mil lions of dollars. The lower six stories and two basements will be occupied by the bank and the third basement by machinery for independent oper ation of the building. The thirty-sec ond floor will be used entirely dining rooms, cafeteria and kitchen for the owners.





WARTIME ALLIES MAY AID FRANCE ON TEUTON PLEA

Briand of France to Have Hands Full In Settling Disputed Claims.

By JOHN O'BRIEN (United Press Staff Correspondent)
PARIS.—Looking at the European political horizon from the French observation post there are apparent only filmy clouds which, it is confidently expected, will vanish in the course of the present year. Starting with the signing of the Franco-American arbitration treaty, with its preamble against war, the year is destin ed, in the eyes of competent observ

ers, to be one of peace.

This does not mean, however, that
Aristide Briand, the French foreign
minister, will not have his hands full of problems calling for solution. Germany is impatient for a settlement of the Rhineland occupation. Relations between France and Italy, while friendly, cannot become cordial until something has been done toward settlement of many outstanding dif-ferences, notably the Tunisian situa-tion and Italy's relations with the Balkan countries. With Spain the problem of Tangier is hanging fire The future relations with the government of the Soviets depends to great extent on the attitude adopted by Moscow regarding foreign

ed by Moscow regarding foreign propaganda.

"I do not believe," said Foreign Minister Briand in the senate in his carefully prepared speech on France's foreign policy, "that the year 1928 can pass without bringing the settlement of big problems. We must seek comprehensive solutions and if, as I believe, all the peoples interested lend themselves to the task we shall find in these solutions fresh guaranfind in these solutions fresh guarantees of peace which will be certainly

It is emphasized here that France already has taken important steps to demonstrate her desire for peace Military service has been reduced to a period of one year, beginning in 1930. Her military budget has been reduced by 200,000,000 gold francs, compared with that of the year preceding the Great War Her army et fectives have been reduced 45 percent and her naval effectives cut in

Although M. Briand's proposal for a pact outlawing war has not received the approval of the great nations it is believed that the action of the United States in accepting the introduction of the peace preamble in the arbitration treaty signed on the anniversary of the first treaty between the two republics is the first step toward a worldwide movement along similar lines. France has signified her willingness to take thinitiative in this respect.

Foremost among the problems facing M. Briand is, naturally, the demand of Germany for the withdrawal of the Rhineland army of occupation before the expiration of time limit set by the Treaty of Versailles. The treaty is, of course, the main obstacle to a settlement on the German lines. All the signatories of that treaty must be consulted and whatever settlement is reach ed must be in accord with the Locarno pact, which was drawn up in

conformity wiht the Versailles treats Such a consultation of the wartime allies may take place in 1928. But as M. Briand has repeatedly pointed out, Germany has been asked to take measures to demonstrate her good will, notaby by hastening reparations payments or by offering financial guarantees capable of being accepted as taking the place of the military guarantee constituted the presence of the army on the Rhine. 


