



**Renew Study of Suns** Spots Effect on Health

By United Press. PARIS.—Possible connection be-tween sun spots and the prevalence of epidemics of cholera and grippe is eing studied again in the light of ecent researches by a Russian savant, S. Chichewski, who has com-municated the results of his re-searches to the French astronom.r, Professor Charles Nordmann.

Prof. Chichewski cites statistic ending to show that the virulence of cholera epidemics is coincident with the maxima of solar spots and that when the sun is not spotted the opidemics are of little gravity or exten-Regarding grippe, Chichewski sion. finds that they have a periodicity of 11 years and four months, that is to say, the same as the periodicity of the sun spots, which reach their maximum. Thus an epidemic of grippe may be expected three years after each minimum of solar spots "Without accepting all the conclu-sions of the Russian savant," said said Prof. Nordmann, "it cannot be denied that they point the way to study of a field which has been too neglect-ed—that of cosmic influences on human health.
