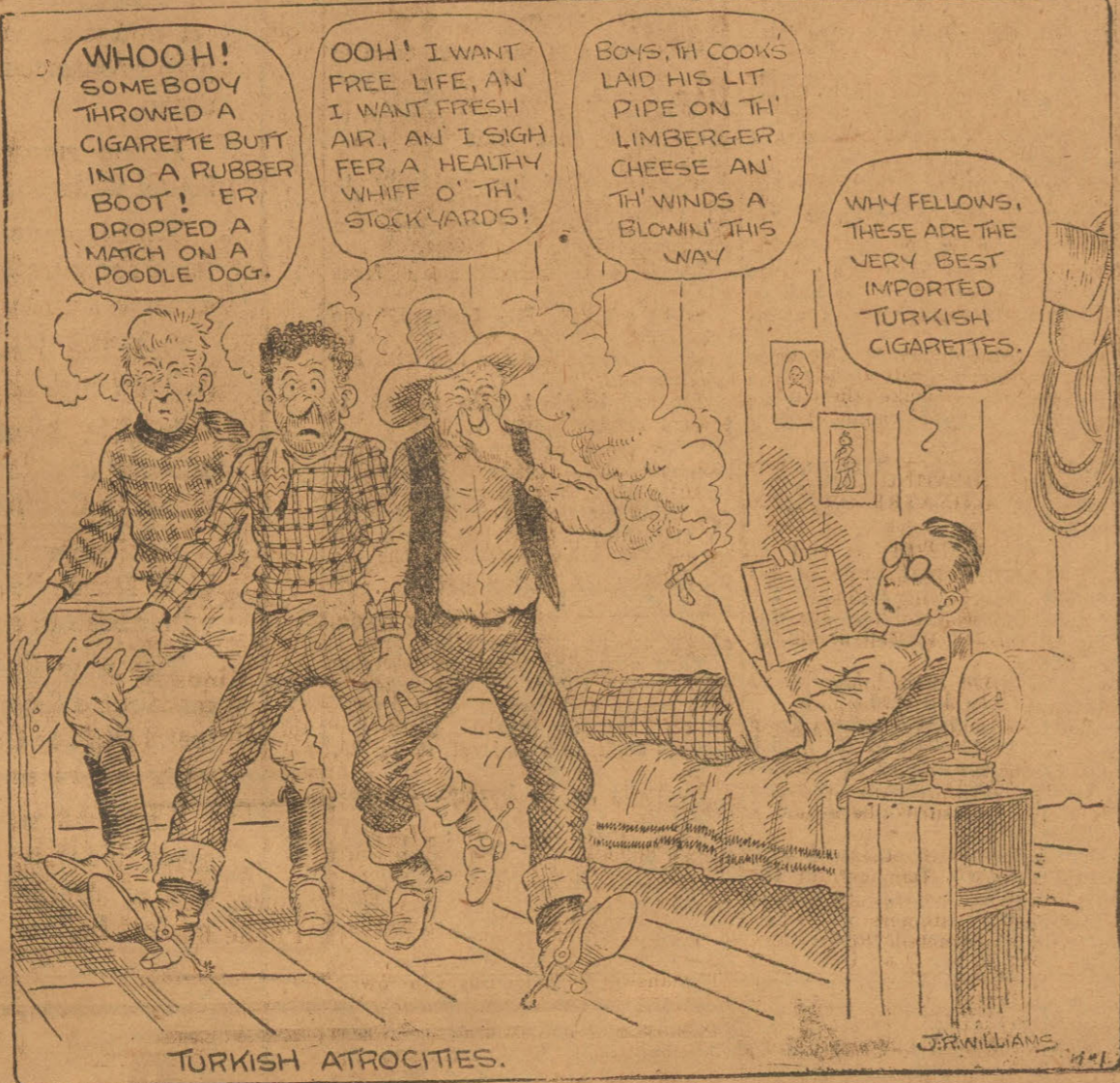

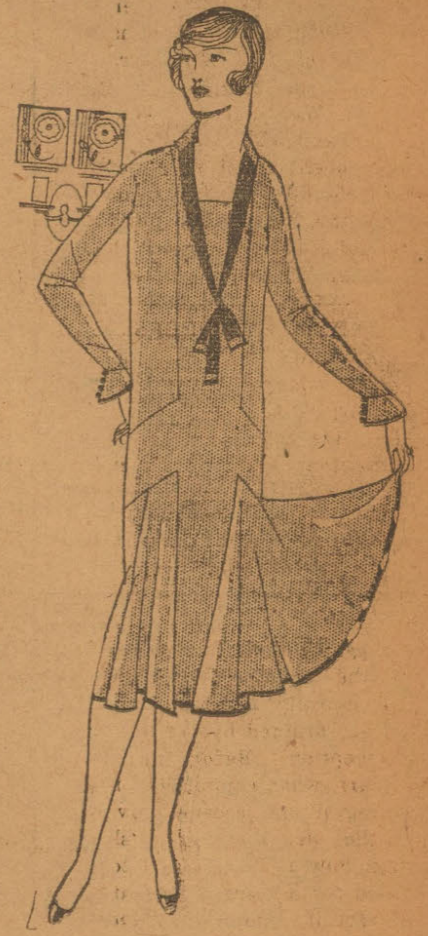

Opportunity Offered Musicians of Texas In State Fair Lists

DALLAS.—Out of the music contest at the state fair of Texas, Dallas, Oct. 10-25 next, there might come the much-desired Texas state song, "My Texas," the composition of a Fort Worth man, received most favorable consideration by the legislature at its last session, in connection with the plan to officially adopt a state song, but no action was had.

Official attention has been called to the state fair music contest this year by Miss Dorothy Drane of Corsicana, president of the Texas Federation of Music Clubs. Prizes of \$50 for first and \$25 for second are offered for both instrumental and vocal compositions, which must be the original work of Texas residents, and never before submitted in contest. All manuscripts must be in the office of W. H. Startton, secretary of the state fair at Dallas, on or before Wednesday, October 7.

TEXAS WOMAN PROPOSES TO OPPOSE "MA" FERGUSON FOR THE OFFICE OF GOVERNOR OF STATE



By NEA Service. FORT WORTH.—It will be "Woman vs. Woman" in Texas next year. For Governor "Ma" Ferguson in her campaign for re-election will be opposed by another woman—Mrs. Edith Willmans of Dallas.

Women never fight harder than when fighting each other and the Texas gubernatorial campaign promises to be a unique battle from start to finish. Both "Ma" and Mrs. Willmans are noted throughout the state as "political amazons." Both are certain to take the stump, and the clan is likely to figure prominently in the contest.

Attacks "Ma" and "Jim." Mrs. Willmans has announced she will be a candidate for the democratic nomination, which, of course, is equivalent to election, and already has started to fight. In the announcement of her candidacy she took a fling at "Ma" by saying that "Husband Jim" Ferguson is the real governor of Texas. Mrs. Ferguson only visiting the capitol occasionally to sign documents.

"No individual will dictate affairs of the state over my shoulder, if I am elected," Mrs. Willmans says, defiantly. "If I go into the governor's office I will form an advisory council, consisting of the president of the senate, speaker of the house, heads of important departments and three prominent Texas women."

"Ma" Ferguson and Mrs. Willmans are exactly opposite types. "Ma" is strongly opposed to the klan and made it a leading issue in her campaign.

Mrs. Willmans is a klanwoman. Governor Ferguson is a quiet woman of the rugged type. She is frank and blunt in her few speeches and talks little about things strictly political.

Mrs. Willmans a Politician. Mrs. Willmans is a good mixer, possibly more of a politician in the accepted sense of the word, and delights in discussing state issues. She is the only woman ever elected to

the state legislature and is an attorney. Last winter she was secretary of the house appropriations committee.

She can make as good an extemporaneous political speech as any man, while "Ma" on public occasions usually reads a brief typewritten statement. The only point of similarity in the two women seems to be that both are excellent housekeepers, for "Ma" still finds time to preserve large quantities of peaches.

Mrs. Willmans' law practice has been concerned mainly with cases involving domestic relations, but occasionally she handles a criminal case. She has three daughters and her husband is dead.

While in the legislature she sponsored measures to compel all children up to 17 to attend school; to require good health certificates for all persons desiring to marry; to give financial aid to families when the father has been sent to an asylum; to provide more humane treatment of prisoners.

Jazz music, sensational movies and extremes in women's dress grate on her nerves. One of the first laws she hopes to have passed if elected governor will be one giving a married woman the right to sell her property without the consent of her husband. She can't do this now in Texas.

Special Courses at University for the Journalism Degree

AUSTIN, Aug. 31.—Although the department of journalism at the University of Texas has been abolished through the veto of its appropriation by Governor Ferguson, seven journalism courses will be offered during 1925-26 in the school of business administration.

Paul J. Thompson, formerly associate professor of journalism, who now holds the same position in the school of business administration, will continue his courses in advertising, business management of newspapers, agricultural and educational journalism, and writing for trade journals. William L. McGill will offer a course in editorial writing in addition

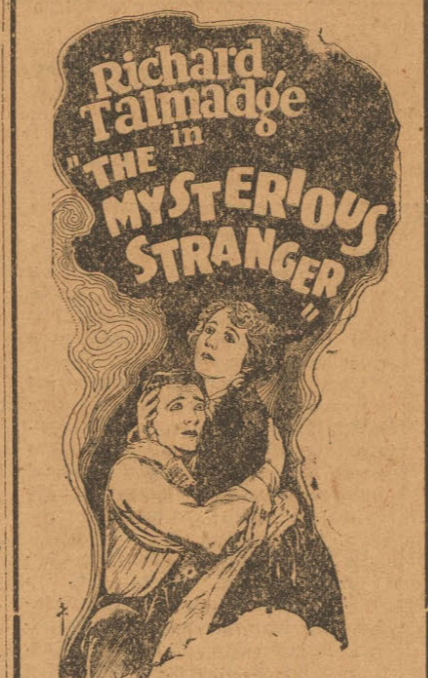
to his work as supervising business manager of the university students' publications.

News gathering and reporting will be given by W. D. Hornaday, director of the department of publicity, who has given the course for many years. Hornaday will also offer three journalism courses by correspondence in feature story writing. One of these will be a non-credit course for vocational students which will embody essentially the same work as the other two courses.

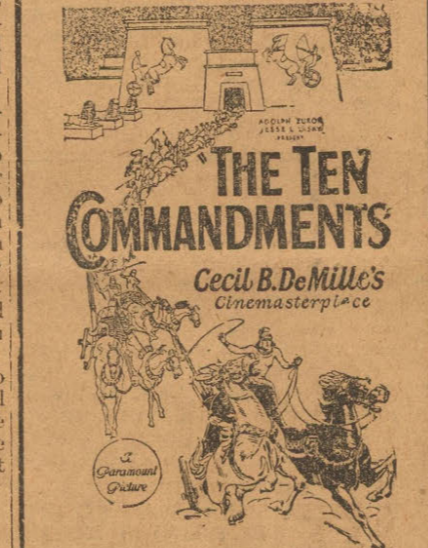
Arrangements have been made to give a course in short story writing in the department of English to replace a similar course heretofore given in the department of journalism. J. Frank Dobie, assistant professor of English, will have charge of the short story course.

These courses will count towards the degree of bachelor of journalism, and will enable these students to complete their work who began the study of journalism before the department was cut out.

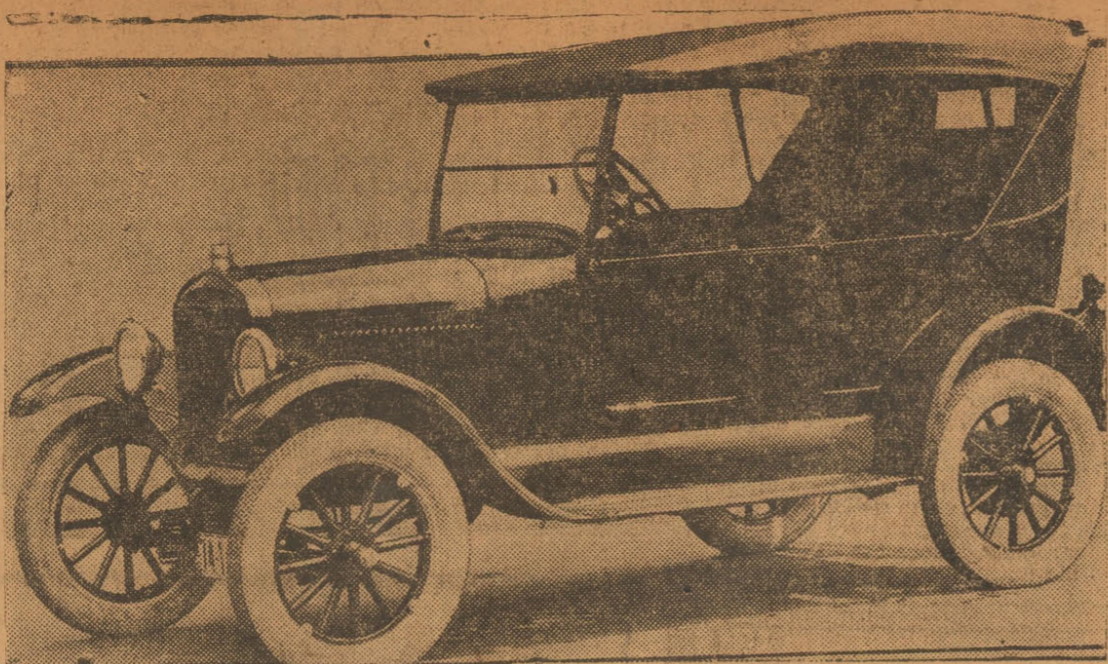

WASHINGTON—Every time another country comes to terms with the United States concerning its war indebtedness to the latter it becomes just that much harder for France to continue stalling off a settlement. To that extent the recently concluded Belgian-American agreement, which otherwise isn't a very brilliant bargain for this nation, is a good thing. Probably it insures some sort of an arrangement when the French debt commission drops in at Washington in mid-September. The commission would look pretty foolish trying to make out that France can't do at least as well as poor little Belgium. On the other hand the French certainly will ask as good terms as Belgium received. The Belgian compact lops off more than 200 millions in interest, and in the same ratio, France's debt being much larger than Belgium's, the former would get a cancellation amounting to something like a billion and a half—quite an item.
