

THIS RAILROAD STRIKE.

Whatever the consequences to the country, the strike of 400,000 railway shopmen must undoubtedly be of serious consequence to both the roads and their employes.

It has too often been pointed out that the wage gains made even by a successful strike can never equal the cost of winning for that to be any longer effective as an argument. Technically, it is true that the workmen will lose more in two weeks' idleness than they will gain in a year if they should win their contentions Practically, that may not be true, for the men not at work will give more heed to expenses than when the necessity of spending a pay envelope confronts them every week. However, it is a mystery how they will continue to meet grocery bills. house rent and the like without a continuous income.

The railroads, on the other hand, will by paying increased wages to strikebreakers, to whom the scale set by the labor board will have no meaning, through the employment of extra men as the guards and other inevitable expenses that arise, will in a short time spend more than the saving that is theoretically made by the

Thus, whichever wins, both sides

It is one of the principles of America that men shall stand for their principles and what they conceive as justice, regardless of cost. In that way alone can industrial disturbances of the extent of this one be justified. If one side failed to contend for its rights there would be no stopping the aggression of the other, and for this reason both perhaps feel that the test of strength is well worth

It is unfortunate for American industry that such disturbances should occur. The participants get black eyes. The innocent bystanders get kicked in the solar plexus. And whoever is doctor gets neither payment nor thanks for his trouble

Perhaps some day America will stop this sort of thing, but how, is not apparent. The labor board was conceived for just that purpose, but it failed. To give such a government agency power to enforce its decrees on both men and money would be a dangerous precedent, for if this is to remain in part a free country, men must have some say as to what their job is worth and capital some say as to what it can pay.

This present controversy has two sides. Both have good arguments. So take your choice and pray that they get together.




