THE ELECTION AFTERMATH.
Ranger by an emphatic vote Saturday reratified its recent determination that open liquor selling and gambling shall not exist here.

While not an open issue in the campaign, that at least was the issue and that stood out in people's minds, though good government and law enforcement were pledged by both candidates. Mr. Cole, however, had been a leader in the recent liquor raids, and his election was urged by the law enforcement committees, who cited his masterly direction of the campaign as evidence that with him in office, such matters hereafter would be handled by the duly constituted authorities.

That made him the logical candidate of those who indorsed what has already been done, and though there is no need to question the sincerity of Mr. Right's good government platform, or the good intentions of many persons who supported him, unquestionably the supporters of lawlessness gathered to his standard, in the belief that he would be easier to deal with. Thus, in the main, whether Mr. Right liked it or not, he became the candidate for the "open town" adherents and a cleant cut division was called before.

That, all circumstances considered, Mr. Right should draw the "open town backing" was inevitable. The vote therefore, is no reflection upon his principles but merely a natural outcome.

The thing to do now is for Ranger to go on about its business. The issue is settled and there is nothing to cry about. Those who cannot endure an orderly town can leave. Most of Ranger will stay, and be well content with the town we will have.

TRAINING AVIATORS TO DIRECT GUN FIRE

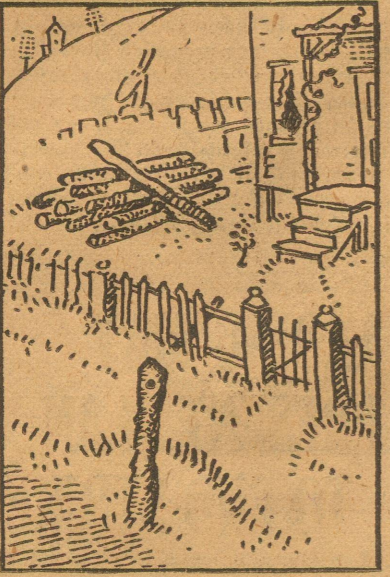
WASHINGTON, July 3.—Naval aviation students at the Pensacola air station are now given a "post graduate course," which gives them actual practice in "spotting," an innovation just put into effect making it possible for them to be trained under conditions similar to fleet service. One of the most important functions of a naval aviator is to act as the eyes of the fleet gunners observing and controlling the fire. Flying high up over the scene of action he is in an ideal position to view the splash of the battleship's salvos and to signal down what corrections must be made so as to bring the shells into the enemy fleet. In order to teach the young flyers these tactics before he goes with the fleet for active service, a battery of three-inch guns has been installed at the Pensacola station so as to reproduce on a reduced scale the conditions in actual warfare.

The student aviators are sent aloft in the standard naval spotting plane over targets representing enemy ships. At the first salvo they observe the fall of the shells, figures out the change needed and instantly, by means of his radio telephone transmits his correction to the gunners below. This correction is made, another salvo fired and usually the target is riddled for spotting from the air, with the sea spread out below like a map, is far more accurate than spotting from the fighting top of a battleship with the target barely visible on the horizon.

WOMAN'S ARREST AIRS DISAPPEARANCE MYSTERY

MONTREAL, Que., July 3.—Two strangers who registered at the Vigor hotel as Dr. and Mrs. Gray of Rochester, N. Y., but traveling in a car bearing an Ontario license number, are believed to have a guilty knowledge of the disappearance of Ambrose J. Small, the missing theatrical millionaire who vanished Dec. 2, 1919, after receiving a check for a million dollars as part payment for the purchase of his properties by the Trans-Canada Theatre company Ltd., Montreal.

The strangers disappeared without paying their board bill or garage rent after an unsuccessful effort to dispose of the automobile in which they aroused suspicion of being automobile thieves.

The woman was traced to New Brunswick, where she was placed under arrest, and is said to have informed the police of the part taken by her husband, who the detectives predict will be arrested soon.

The woman said she traveled in the automobile in which Small was kidnapped and her husband drove it. The millionaire seemed under the influence of a narcotic. He didn't speak during the journey, and allowed himself to be lifted out of the car with the docility of a child.

PEASANT'S CHILD MAY RULE OVER PRINCIPALITY

PARIS, July 3.—The beautiful Duchess de Valentinois, wife of the Comte de Polignac, may become the reigning Princess of Monaco, the smallest principality in the world.

Paris today is agog over the problem as to whether or not Prince Louis, son and presumptive heir of the late Prince Albert of Monaco, can ascend to the throne of the tiny principality. As an officer of the French army and legally a French citizen, the question has now arisen as to whether he can reign over a foreign state. In addition to this, he abhors gambling and has intimated he wants nothing to do with Monaco.

In the event that his French citizenship bars him from succeeding his father the Dutchess de Valentino, whom he legally adopted as his own daughter in 1920, will become the reigning sovereign.

She is the daughter of Prince Louis. Her mother was Mlle. Louvet, a beautiful girl of peasant stock, with whom the young prince fell in love more than twenty years ago. From this love a baby girl was born—the now Duchess de Valentinois. He never denied her parentage.
