DARROW LIKELY TO GET TRIAL LONG EXTENDED

Question of Leopold and Loeb Sanity May Go to Jury After Change of Venue.

CRIMINAL COURT ROOM, Chicago, Ill., July 30.—The state today rested its "perfect hanging" case against Nathan Leopold, Jr. and Richard Loeb at the judicial hearing for the murder of Robert Franks.

Clarence Darrow, chief attorney for the defense, is said to be engineering a surprise for the state. Reports are that he expects the question of the sanity of the two boys to go before a jury after all. State's Attorney Crowe announced that if any defense witnesses testified that the boys are insane, or even partially insane, he would demand a jury hearing on their sanity, and Darrow is said to have taken that into consideration, in fact, to have planned that very thing.

Should Chief Justice Caverly decide to place the matter before a jury, a change of venue would be demanded together with a long continuance. The defense would have the sanity hearing deferred several months to give time for public opinion to quiet down.

State's Attorney Crowe contends that the court has no right to consider any question as to the sanity of the defendants after they have pleaded guilty.

Dr. Wm. A. White of Washington, D. C. was called to the witness stand as the first to testify for the defense when the state rested.

Walter Bachrach, defense attorney, started to question him, but Crowe demanded that the court exclude the medical testimony or empanel a jury to try the defense of the question of sanity.

"These boys have pleaded guilty and any attempt to introduce the question of sanity should be stopped," he said. "If this question is to be considered your honor must empanel a jury."

The lawyers argued the question and introduced court decisions.

American Aviators Hopp Off for Their Trans-Atlantic Trip

BROUGH, England, July 30.—The American round-the-world flight was resumed today, Lieutenant Lowell Smith and his comrades taking off at 10:30 a. m. today for Kirkwall in the Orkney Islands, 450 miles to the northward.

ON BOARD CRUISER RICHMOND AT KIRKLAND, Orkney Islands, July 30.—American round the world flyers were at Head-on Bay today at 4 p. m. The three planes roaring in unison came out of the haze and settled gracefully over the Richmond before alighting on the bay. Tremendous cheers from hundreds of bluejackets who had been watching the horizon for more than an hour accompanied their landing.

FRANCE AND BELGIUM WISH TO ENCOURAGE GERMANY TO PAY UP

LONDON, July 30.—France and Belgium are negotiating a private arrangement with Germany to provide for progressive evacuation of the Ruhr, it was learned today. The offer depends upon certain conditions from Germany.

France and Belgium are willing to promise a withdrawal of military forces if Germany shows good will in paying reparations and in effectuating the Dawes reparations program. It is that Germany carry out the Dawes demands, especially those requiring the payments, some months before the dates specified in the London conference, and the evacuation of the Ruhr is promised in the ratio and periods of such payments.

CHARLES P. ROWAN, DALLAS MILLIONAIRE, IS DEAD

DALLAS, Texas, July 20.—Charles P. Rowan, 80, veteran Dallas business man, died today at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. C. Blessi.

His estate is estimated worth more than \$1,000,000. Surviving members of his family are: His widow, Mrs. Ellen Rowan, two daughters, Mrs. Blessi and Mrs. E. F. Fleanor of San Francisco, and a son, Albert L. Rowan.

DEAD AND WOUNDED IN SAO PAULO REVOLT UNCOUNTEED

RIO DE JANEIRO, July 30.—Official figures on the number of dead and wounded in the rebellion at Sao Paulo which now has been dominated by the federal forces, are still withheld by the minister of war today. Official Journal de Commercio in describing the fighting from July 11 to 24, mentions 120 federal troops wounded, but gives no figures on the dead or rebel casualties.

Candidate to Test Strength With Robertson In Run-Off Not Definitely Known.

DALLAS, Texas, July 30.—Returns from 238 counties out of 252 in the state, including 123 complete, show the following totals in the gubernatorial contest at noon today.

ANTHRAX SPREADING IN THREE STATES AND IS AROUSING MUCH CONCERN

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 30.—Two additional deaths in Mississippi from anthrax were reported today bringing the total to six. A white man and white girl died yesterday near Waynesboro, Miss. The disease has extended into 29 counties of that state and scores of live stock are dying daily in Mississippi, Tennessee and Arkansas.

Little hope of checking the disease before cool weather is held. Several new infected areas were reported today in Arkansas. The disease is not widespread in Tennessee.

PAGE OF BASTROP PROMISES TO SUPPORT MRS. FERGUSON

AUSTIN, July 30.—Former State Senator Page of Bastrop, who was a member of the senate of the 19th district which impeached ex-Governor Ferguson and who voted for all of the counts, announced that he would support Ferguson's wife in the run-off if she was to oppose Robertson for the nomination.

Senator Page predicted that Mrs. Ferguson would beat Robertson in the run-off. "I prefer Mrs. Ferguson to Robertson and the possibility of the Robertson regime," the senator said, "and another thing the election of Mrs. Ferguson would give Texas the honor of having the first woman governor."

WARNING IS ISSUED AGAINST UNRESTRAINED SPREAD OF ANTHRAX

AUSTIN, July 30.—The outbreak of anthrax in southeast Texas was reported today by Dr. L. G. Cloud, state veterinarian of the live stock sanitary commission, to be growing serious and warning is issued that every precaution be taken to prevent further spread of the disease, which is taking heavy toll of animal and human life in Arkansas, Tennessee and Mississippi.

BURNED OVER SECTION TO BE REBUILT WHEN TENANTS ARE READY

The ruins of the McCleskey hotel will in all probability be cleared away and a one or two-story fireproof building will be erected within a short time if there appears any demand for them, Nolan Queen of Weatherford, part owner of the property, announced today.

With virtually all insurance adjusted, the owners are now at liberty to proceed on the work of rebuilding. Mr. Queen said that he hoped by tonight to own the entire half block facing on Austin street on which the Southland and McCleskey hotels were built. A deal for the McCleskey hotel property was pending, he said. It is Mr. Queen's plan to allow a salvage company to clean up the ruins, taking everything but the brick, fire escape and safe. Then a one-story fireproof building will be erected, depending upon how many people desire space.

COMPENSATION FOR EX-SERVICE MEN IS OFFERED

Each Must Submit His Application and Delay Will Be to His Disadvantage.

Ex-Service men have been invited to visit the rooms of the Carl Barnes Post of the American Legion on the second floor of the Guaranty-bank building, Ranger, tonight, where they will be given assistance in filling out their compensation blanks. There are said to be a large number of ex-service men in and about Ranger who have never joined the Carl Barnes Post and are not members of the American Legion, but their comrades in the World War are desirous of aiding all of those needing help in applying for adjusted compensation.

In a communication sent out from Washington it is said: "Early action on an application blank is good business for the veteran. Although insurance policies are not dated until January 1, 1925, if the applicant had a policy coming that policy becomes effective from the moment he executes his application.

If a veteran dies before submitting an application, his dependents will collect something if it is true, but they will collect about two and one-half times as much if he gets the application in before he dies.

"Twenty-five thousand veterans will die between now and the first of the year, and some of them will be those who least expect it today. An unfortunate circumstance has been the public announcement by a national welfare organization which also is distributing application blanks that veterans need be in no rush to obtain their forms and send them in because the distribution of insurance policies will not begin until January 1 next and no cash payments will be made until March 15, 1925. These dates are fixed by law.

"This announcement ignores the fact that the veteran obtains immediate insurance protection on filing his application, and that the earlier the applications come in the easier and less expensive it will be for Uncle Sam. Although the insurance policies cannot be distributed and the cash payments begin until the dates just given, the Veterans Bureau wants applications in its hands as soon as possible so that it can begin filling out the policies and writing the checks now.

The bureau expects to have a couple of million policies ready and hundreds of thousands of checks made out and ready to put in the mails on the dates mentioned. The programs cannot be carried out unless applications come in thick and fast now. That's what the government is up against.


"In other words, the situation is squarely up to the individual veteran. If he wants prompt action on his case he must act promptly himself and get his application to Washington with the least possible delay.

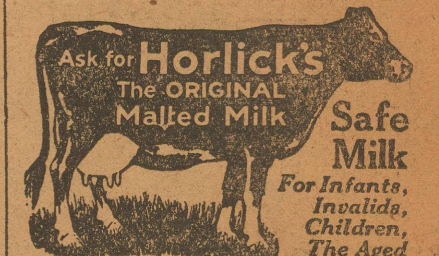

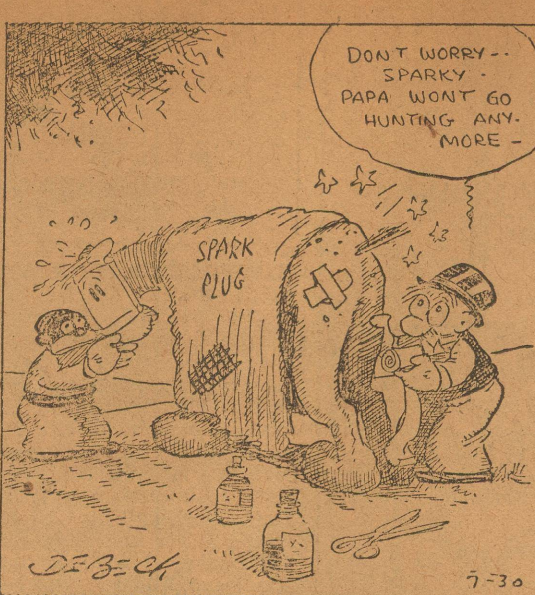

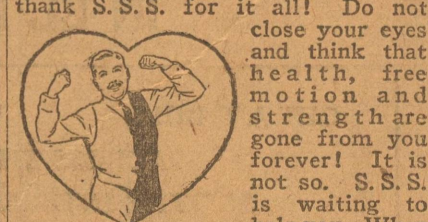
