WOMEN LEAD STRIKE RIOTERS AT CHICAGO

Attempt to Burn Home of Man Who Refused to Join Walkout.

CHICAGO, July 7 .- Women took the lead today in the fight of railroad shopmen against strikebreakers. Wives and sisters of strikers directed a mob of 1,000 which stormed through the streets of Burnside, Ill., in a demonstration at homes of workers. They attempted to burn the homes of two Illinois Central employes at Burnside who refused to join in the walkout. Squads of police cleared the district after Mrs. Julia Cable, 59, wife of one of the Illinois Central employes, held the strikers at bay with a revolver when the attackers stormed her home. The attack occurred during a demonstration near the Burnside shops.

Women were on picket duty at all shop centers. The women believe the future of their children is at stake, B. M. Jewell. union president, told the United Press today when asked for an explanation of the part taken by the women relatives of the strikers.

State troops were held under arms today, ready to quell strike riots which have flared up in railroad shop centers throughout Illinois. In Decatur a mob of more than 200 gathered at the station at 2 a. m. and threatened violence and bodily harm to fifteen newly employed men who came from Chicago. The men were forced to leave town.




