

MANY HORSES ARE OFFERED TO RACE ESPINARD

Three Races to Be Run By Nominations to Meet the French Horse.

By FRANK GETTY (United Press Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK, July 31.—Epinard, Pierre Wertheimer's good French colt, came over the seas to meet the fleetest horses on the American turf, and it was a bit of a surprise to find more than 100 thoroughbreds named for the three match races against the visitor.

Of course, 90 per cent of these American animals will be scratched before the time for the race rolls around, but it is interesting to note how many horsemen felt it worth while posting \$250 for each of their prospective contenders.

Many of the horses named would stand no chance against Epinard, and were put in by their owners just for the advertising value of the thing. In after years, they will be saying of some scawny foal:

"Why, his father was named to meet Epinard, the great French champion of 1924!"

Harry F. Sinclair, through Sam Hildreth, his trainer, nominated eight different horses for the three events—17 entries in all—at a total cost to the Ramocas stables of \$4,250. H. P. Whitney named 11, August Belmont 7, Gif Cochran 6.

There are to be three races; the first, over six furlongs, at Belmont Park, September 1. The second will be at a mile, at Aqueduct, September 27; the third, a mile and a quarter, at Latonia, October 11. Entries for the Latonia race are not all in.

The total value of the three races will exceed \$125,000. The nominations afford horsemen with an interesting perspective on the relative value, at different distances placed by the country's leading trainers upon their charges.

The following horses have been named for all three races: Epinard, Grey Lag, Mad Hatter, Zev, Revenue Agent, Ordinance, Ladkin, Whiskalong, Klondyke, Wise Counsellor, My Play, Little Chief, Wilderness and Snob II.

Apparently all these are considered good at the three distances.

In addition to the six-furlong event, the racing association received the following nominations up to July 15, when the books were supposed to close: Bracadale, Autline, Goshawk, Sun Flag, Spic and Span, Lucky Play, Worthmore, Laurano, Apprehension, Baffling, Sun Pal, Miss Star and Rialto.

With exception of Goshawk, Spic and Span, Lucky Play, Worthmore, Baffling and Miss Star, the nominations were the same for the Aqueduct mile, and included in addition: Honor, Stanwix, Princess Doreen, Rockminster, My Own, Polo Ground, Transmute and Gonfalon.

While entries are not complete for the mile and a quarter race at Latonia, the following have been named in addition to those mentioned above: Enchantment, Barbary Bush, Chaccollet, In Memoriam, Befuddle, Audacious and Thorndale.

When the fields are whittled down to barrier size, we may expect to find from six to ten horses remaining in each race.

It certainly would be most inhospitable and most unfair to Epinard to cram the starting chute with animals and run the chances of our guest, who, after all, came over here for match races and not cavalry charges, getting kicked or crowded at the post, or caught in a jam of horses and prevented from putting his best foot forward.

In fairness to the French colt, which can well hold its own in a field of reasonable size, some method of eliminating about 90 per cent of the contenders must be worked out. Epinard is a gentle animal, easily handled by trainer and rider, with a willing disposition, and is a good starter. The colt's handlers in this country have shown none of the disposition to coddle him, such as was displayed in the case of Papyrus at Belmont last year, where every conceivable precaution, and some that savored of theatricals, were taken to safeguard the Derby winner's comfort and feelings.

JEALOUSY AT FOUNDATION OF BRAZIL REVOLT

Trouble Dates Back Two Years Fostered by Ambitious Plotters.

NEW YORK, July 31. — When news was flashed over the cables from Rio de Janeiro bureau of the United Press the night of July 5, announcing a military revolt in the state of Sao Paulo, persons familiar with Brazilian political history knew immediately that the federal government was in for serious difficulty. The spirit of revolt had been brewing in the country for two years and it was typical of Latin-American love for the dramatic that the outbreak was staged to the minute on the anniversary of the bloody rebellion in Rio de Janeiro in July, 1922. To understand the significance of the movement several points must be fixed firmly in mind. All the South American republics have suffered since their beginnings from military domination of politics and in only three countries have advances been made toward a liberalization of politics through divorce of

cliques of generals from the government. In the Argentine this separation is almost complete, and such seemed also the case in Brazil until the disastrous campaign started against the military by President Epitacio Pessoa, who preceded the present incumbent in the Palace of the Eagles in Rio de Janeiro. Causes of Outbreak. The causes of the outbreak may be summarized thus: 1—Military jealousy of civilian political rule. 2—Popular dissatisfaction in the wealthy state of Sao Paulo at what the Paulistas consider the extravagance of the federal regime. 3—Dissatisfaction in the Sao Paulo state army at what the Palista soldiers considered the arrogance of the French military mission of instruction contracted for by the state governor, Dr. Carlos de Campos. 4—Plotting by the old separatist groups, who have contended for years that the progressive states of south and central Brazil are hopelessly handicapped in the struggle for advancement by the backward states of the equatorial north. British Mission Aroused Ire. Apparently it was a combination of these groups that brought about the revolt, centering it on the immediate crisis caused by an investigation of the finances of the republic by a British mission and discussion in the army of a proposal to renew the contract with the military mission. The separatist political plotters found ready tools in the disgruntled soldiers who felt the honor of the army had been trampled on by the drastic action of Pessoa in 1922, when he ordered Marshal Hermes da Fonseca, president of the powerful military club and commander-in-chief of the army, to prison because of his intervention in a political dispute in the state of Pernambuco.
