In the June Harper's Magazine David F. Houston has a constructive article which shows that this country is sound in spite of the workings of pessimists, agitators and demagogues.

the heroic days of George Washington are reminded that he was by some of his own day called a hypocrite, an impostor and a murderer. Those whose political demigods are the Clays, the Websters and the Calhouns are told that Cleveland, Wilson and Richard Olney were more worthy to be followed than these statesmen of the former days. And to those who do not look back at all, but only about them in bewilderment and disgust upon scandals, class conflicts and blocs, Mr. Houston brings the conclusion that no one class or "bloc" has sense enough to govern all the other classes, and that present "blocs" will disappear even as did the ones against which Washington warned the people.

There is, with a safeguarded economic stability, a spirit in the people which will insist upon a clean national household from cellar to attic and which prompts this financier whose roots are deep in the soil of America to advise the public that "the United States is today the safest investment in the world."

We have succeeded, the ex-secre tary contends, despite all our mistakes and failures and official shortcomings, because we have had, on the whole, a "competent people." And he adds the corollary that the right kind of people can run any sort of government, while the wrong sort cannot run any kind.

One cannot read Mr. Houston's article without new hope for America, and even for Europe, unless a chronic and irreclaimable pessimist.'

BUSINESS BECOMING STABIL-IZED.

There appears to be little doubt existing in the nation's financial centers that manufacturers of all sorts far overshot their marks during the latter part of last year and the first quarter of this year. They were providing against the day of demand which did not dawn. It was postponed because of a combination of circumstances: one of them political uncertainties, another unseasonable weather. As a consequence there was something of a surplus of goods

The most dependable barometers of "consumers buying" are bank clearings and railroad car loadings. Both have kept up a steady and measured tread.

With consumption holding its pace, and production declining, there must exist a point, at least an imaginary one, at which they will meet and from which the curve will start upward. It is the forecast of the stock markets, at least, in their recent advances, that these points already have met and that the curve of production once more is traveling upward. Thus far it is to be observed, on the surface, in only a few lines. There is every reason to believe, however, that optimism is growing in all parts of the country.

People have plenty of money and credit to keep things going in good shape. This is shown by the manufacture of 349,141 motor vehicles in February, a gain of more than a fourth over the previous February record, in 1923. Auto owners pay their bills and the money keeps turn-
