THE AMERICAN MILLIONAIRE. Not so very long ago an American millionaire was a man reputed to be worth a million dollars or more. Nowadays he is a man whose annual income is a million or more.

Sixty-seven persons admitted officially last year that they were millionaires in the new sense of the word. They admitted it in their personal tax returns for 1922, on which a preliminary report has just been made public; but as the very rich run to exempt investments, such as federal, state and municipal bonds, in order to escape surtaxes, it is safe to say that many more than sixty-seven received incomes of at least a million

that year, and that hundreds do now. The interesting thing was that there were sixty-seven of these millionaires in 1922 as against only twenty-one the preceding year, when the post-war business depression was at its deepest; 33 in 1920; 65 in 1919; 67 in 1918; 141 in 1917 and 206 in 1916. The only explanation of this fluctuation is that men of greatest wealth avoid paying taxes by investing in tax-exempt securities. The millionaire has as much at stake as 1,000 men of modest means but the latter pay the full tax for his benefits and protection.

## BUILDING TRADES STRIKE IMPENDING IN HOUSTON

By United Press. HOUSTON, July 26.—Houston's long delayed building trades strike was definitely called for Monday late today. It will affect all construction work where many of the carpenters and joiners work. Nine striking crafts demand that carpenters abide by the rulings of the national board

of award on certain metal work. The strike has been pending since July 10, when a temporary walk-out was called off and the matter was left to divisional conventions to be held in August and October by national organizations involved. 


