The car had been abandoned in a pasture about four and one-half miles northwest of town and, according to the police, had not been stripped. It was in first class condition, the police said.

The recovery of the Palmer car cuts the total of unrecovered cars by the police department here to six. Police are confident that they will be recovered eventually.

### M'KINNEY TO START WORK ON NEW FAIR BUILDING

### FISH AND GAME LAWS ARE ENFORCED AT PALESTINE

**PALESTINE.**—More than 30 arrests for violation of the state fish and game laws have been made in this vicinity in the past few weeks. More than 60 confiscated fish traps have been sent to Austin, the scores having been destroyed.

Seventeen men have been arrested for dynamiting fish. One man pleaded guilty to killing a deer and paid a fine of \$33.75. Fines assessed run from \$25 to \$50.

Blair Cherry, although a stranger to the majority of Ranger fans, is known to the majority of them. He is one of the bright and shining stars produced by T. C. U., having played football on the T. C. He was assistant manager of the Ranger football team of Texas A. & M. college, D. X. Bible.

### Two Men Killed In Shooting Affray On Farm In the Dark

**WORTHAM, Texas, Aug. 27.**—Jim Moore, farmer, and two other men are in custody following a shooting affray resulting in the death of Arthur Wilder and Frank Gilbert, which authorities say occurred on the Moore farm three miles north of Wortham at midnight Monday.

Frank Gilbert and two other men drove to the Moore farm and asked for Worth Moore, son of Jim Moore, according to Constable Jim Wasson, who investigated the affair. Wilder was already at the Moore place, Wasson says.

Gilbert is alleged to have fired a shotgun at Jim Wilder, who was standing near in the dark. Wilder had called for Worth Moore and was to have driven him to Wortham.

The shot entered Wilder's back, causing him to die three hours later while in an ambulance on the way to a Corsicana hospital.

Thinking the young man who had been shot was his son, Jim Moore drew a pistol and shot Gilbert through the heart, according to his story to Constable Wasson.

The shooting was the culmination of a quarrel, according to Wasson. Moore was placed under arrest when he came into Wortham shortly after the shooting and informed Constable Jim Wasson, according to Wasson.

Moore expressed belief the two men had appeared at his home with the object of attacking his son on an old score.

### GEORGIAN KILLED BY EXPLOSION OF CANNON

**LUMBER CITY, Ga., Aug. 27.**—Paul Brown, tobacco buyer of Elm City, S. C., was instantly killed when a cannon exploded during a Klan demonstration here last night, it was learned today. Brown's head was blown off. The explosion was premature.

Klanmen numbering about 100, came here from Hazelhead, Ga., to stage a demonstration. The cannon was to be set off as a part of the fireworks.

### REPUBLICANS DEFER MAKING NOMINATION FOR GOVERNOR

**HOUSTON, Aug. 27.**—After a three-hour secret session, the state republican executive committee meeting to select a nominee for governor, decided to adjourn to Sept. 5, after the meeting of democrats at Austin, and will meet in Dallas.

### STRAY BULLET CLAIMS LIFE OF BYSTANDER

#### Two Men in Fort Worth Engage in Pistol Duel; Neither Hurt; Another Killed.

**FORT WORTH, Aug. 27.**—Joe R. Duncan, 25, was instantly killed here today by a stray bullet from two men engaged in a revolver battle in a downtown garage. Stony Phillips was arrested and held upon a charge of murder.

Phillips and Bob Brazier, both police characters, according to officers, engaged in a gun battle following a dispute. Duncan, who was sitting in a car nearby had taken no part in the argument.

### Appointment Of Two Ambassadors Officially Told

**PLYMOUTH, Vt., Aug. 27.**—Edward Addison Bancroft of Chicago and James Rockwell Sheffield of New York have been appointed by President Coolidge as ambassadors to Japan and Mexico respectively.

The appointments were announced last night by the president, after both had been unofficially reported for several days. Bancroft has long ranked among the foremost lawyers of the United States and is descended from the New England Bancroft family. President of the Union League club of New York, Sheffield is also one of the nation's distinguished lawyers and a leader in republican politics.

### MANY STUDENTS IN NORTH TEXAS TEACHERS COLLEGE

**DENTON.**—More than five thousand students—a record number—were enrolled during the 1923-24 session of the North Texas State Teachers college which closed for the season last week.

Two thousand one hundred and one were enrolled during the winter term and 2,765 at the summer session. In addition, 210 pupils were registered in the college training school. Ninety-six degrees were conferred during the year. The new period opens September 24.

### FINE MINERAL WATER IS FOUND IN GARZA COUNTY

**POST.**—Discovery of a mineral water of a quality superior to best known products on the market has been declared by G. Coury of this city. It may in time verify the reports of Ponce de Leon, who stated that a truly marvelous fountain of youth was to be found in Texas territory.

The new mineral water was discovered in a well put down by Coury. Laboratories at Battle Creek, Mich., and Fort Worth declare the water contains several minerals which must be added to most mineral waters to obtain the perfect laxative.

Plans are now under way to determine the volume of the source and to arrange marketing of the product.

### CONCHO COUNTY FAIR TO BE HELD IN OCTOBER

**EDEN, Texas.**—\$1,000 has been raised here as the nucleus for a fund for the holding of a Concho County Fair. The date has been set for October 3 and 3, and the heads of the departments have been named. These departments will cover the exhibits on agriculture, livestock and horticultural prospects, and the livestock classes are open to the world's competition.

Products from the fair are later to be included in the All-West Texas exhibits to be sent out by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

### BRADY MUNICIPAL BAND PLANS FUTURE TRIUMPHS

**BRADY, Texas.**—The Brady municipal band, which made such an exceptionally good showing at the Heart of Texas Fair, held in San Saba last week, was the second prize winner in class B at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention at Brownwood, and plans are now being outlined to take this "Heart of Texas" band to the seventh annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Mineral Wells next year.

### PANHANDLE COTTON CROP AMARILLO.

**AMARILLO.**—The average condition of the cotton crop in this territory is conservatively estimated at 75 per cent, although it is too early to forecast results accurately. Picking will not begin before October. The plant is small and of good color. For the most part it is fruiting satisfactorily, planters say.

### HOPKINS COUNTY COTTON CROP SHORT THIS YEAR

**SULPHUR SPRINGS.**—The crop of cotton for Hopkins county will not exceed 20,000 bales, as against 35,000 bales last year. Farmers say the excessive drought, unbroken for 12 weeks, is making short staple.

### FINE PROGRAM ARRANGED FOR THE TEACHERS

**Eastland County Teachers Institute to Meet Five Days, Beginning September 8.**

The Eastland County Teachers' institute, which convenes in this city, Monday, Sept. 8, for a five-day session, promises to be largely attended and to be one of the most interesting sessions of the institute ever held. A splendid program has been arranged, which includes addresses from a number of the leading men and women educators in the state.

The work of the institute will be in the hands of experienced teachers. Miss Ada D. Pearce of the English department of the Eastland High school and ex-county superintendent of Taylor county, will be director of the high school department. Work in the intermediate department will be under the direction of T. A. Gullett, principal of the junior high school Eastland, for 11 years primary instructor in Eastland and Eastland county schools, will be the instructor in the primary department.

On Tuesday, the second day of the institute, Dr. H. J. Buttlinger of the State university at Austin, will be here to organize the county inter-scholastic league.

Besides addresses by prominent speakers, there will be readings and musical numbers on the program for each day.

Among those invited to be here and take a part on the program are Dr. P. W. Horn, president of the Texas Tech at Lubbock; President S. E. Chandler of Daniel Baker college, Brownwood; President J. F. Holloway of Cisco Christian college, Cisco; Mrs. C. E. Maddocks, president of the first district Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher association, and a representative of the state department of education.

### FRANCE CAN NO LONGER ACT ALONE, SAYS PARIS CONSERVATIVE PAPER

**PARIS, Aug. 27.**—"France can act alone no longer," the Echo de Paris expresses its amazing conservative opinion following the senate's acceptance of the London agreement for settlement of the reparations question.

All opposition newspapers carried bitter editorials on which they consider surrender of the foreign policy of the Poincare administration. The Echo de Paris endorses the senate's action.

### SEVERE FIGHTING BREAKS OUT IN CHINESE PROVINCES

**PEKIN, Aug. 27.**—Severe fighting has broken out in the Chekiang and Yngtsai provinces, according to advices received here today and railroad traffic has been suspended. The Blue express from Peking and Mankiang is not accepting passengers for Shanghai until trouble is over.

**LONDON, Aug. 27.**—Opposing bands are facing one another across the river, 15 miles from Shanghai, according to a Central News dispatch from Shanghai today.

### REICHSTAG HAS BLOODSHED TO HELP DEBATE

#### Fighting Enlivens Session During Discussion of London Pact.

**BERLIN, Aug. 27.**—President Ebert today signed a decree providing for dissolution of the reichstag in case it refuses to ratify the pact of London making the Dawes program effective. A new election would follow this action.

Disorders broke out anew at the evening session of the reichstag and for the first time in the history of the German parliament police were called in and three recalcitrant communists forcibly ejected.

**BERLIN, Aug. 27.**—The reichstag was thrown into an uproar this afternoon and the first bloodshed of the session occurred during the debate on the so-called Dawes laws, which will make the London agreement effective.

The fighting grew out of a motion by the fascists for general amnesty following communist proposal to allow nationalists to vote on Dawes law. There was fighting for several minutes and one deputy was knocked down and carried bleeding from the hall. The nationalists lost their inning when the chairman ended the session by leaving the hall.

### Co-Operative Plans In Poultry Raising Being Developed

More than half of the required number of hens have been signed for the Bankhead Poultry Producers' association, the actual number being 13,500.

Secretary George W. Briggs of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, said this morning that Stephens county has just sent in contracts for 2,000 hens and that they expect to sign up several thousand more. Mr. Briggs said that many farmers were voluntarily signing and sending in contracts. He also said that contracts would be sent to anyone desiring to sign.

According to those in charge of the campaign, Bishop Star has signed up the greatest number of hens of any one place. Stephens county, it is said, is planning to put on an extensive campaign for contracts and will reach many of the poultrymen at a series of community fairs planned for that county in the immediate future.

All contracts must be signed and in the hands of the committees in charge of the organization on or before Nov. 1 of this year and at least 25,000 hens must have been signed before the organization can be completed.

### TWO CHICAGO BOYS CONFESS TO ROBBERY AND MURDER

**CHICAGO, Aug. 27.**—Another of Chicago's "mystery" murders was solved today by the confession of two boys in their teens. William Leyden, 15, and Osten Galinas, 19, who admitted killing Mrs. Jessie Bessie Genselen, 40, in her apartments during a robbery, police said. Two girls, the boys said, helped them.

Several suspects were arrested but released. A girl in a girl's detention home told officers yesterday that two girls told her they were with the boys when they murdered Mrs. Genselen. The officers arrested the two girls on suspicion and they told of the boys and gave their names. Upon being arrested and confronted with the evidence against them the boys confessed to the deed.

### LAKE LOMONDE TO BE IMPROVED FOR BATHERS

**LONGVIEW.**—Lake Lomonde, 50-acre lake on the outskirts of this city, will be drained to enable the laying of a concrete bottom along the swimming beach to eliminate water weeds.

The lake was made by a stock company 20 years ago and is well stocked with game fish. It is fed from live springs and is in a natural forest.

### GUARD ORGANIZED TO STOP SMUGGLING OF COTTON

**SAN ANTONIO.**—A force of 25 non-paid guards has been organized by Customs Collector Roy Campbell to check the smuggling of cotton from Mexico through Roma and Brownsville. Most of the men in the guard are plantation owners and foremen.

The invasion of the pink boll weevil, thought to have been carried in cotton from Mexico, was the cause of the formation of the guard, which was authorized from Washington.

### Airmen Preparing To Hop Thursday On To Indian Harbor

**ON BOARD THE U. S. CRUISER RICHMOND, Aug. 27.**—America's two round-the-world flyers expected to take off tomorrow at Ivagut and hop to Indian Harbor.

Lieutenant Locatelli today received a message from Lieut. Lowell Smith congratulating him on his rescue and condoling with him for the hardships he had undergone. Locatelli sent the following message in reply: "We thank you for what you have done for us. You are not only a good pilot but also a good friend. We hope your flight will continue to success."

**TEXARKANA.**—A few leaf or army worms have been reported in the Red river country north of here. Liberal quantities of calcium arsenate were spread over the infested areas, which were small.

### TORRENTIAL RAINS CAUSE LANDSLIDES IN JAPAN

**TOKIO, Aug. 27.**—Many persons have been entombed by landslides in Haykome mountains, following torrential rains which have been falling several days. Homes surrounding the factory district in Tokio are partially submerged and more than 3,000 homes partly under water today.

Fire broke out in Hakobakate, where public services were demoralized by the downpour and 98 houses burned.

### FIFTEEN MEN MAROONED IN ICE FLOE OFF ALASKA

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.**—Fifteen men have been marooned for weeks, helpless in the ice floes off Alaska, according to a radio message received here by the war department. A radio call came from a ship in the ice jam and was relayed. The ice-locked vessel is the Lady Kenderley and her present position is 40 miles east of Point Barrow.

### WEST TEXAS BAND MASTERS TO MEET IN STAMFORD

**STAMFORD, Texas.**—The West Texas Band Masters' association will meet in this city on Sept. 6. They will be tendered a banquet by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

### POSTOFFICE INSPECTOR IS UNDER ARREST

#### Charged With Being Brains of Big Recent Mail Train Robbery.

**CHICAGO, Aug. 27.**—William F. Fahy, known as the "dread" postoffice inspector in the business district who investigated the Dearborn station robbery several years ago and put big Tim Murphy behind the bars, himself was a prisoner today charged with being the brains of the \$2,000,000 train holdup on June 12. His arrest was brought about by investigations by A. E. Germer, chief postal inspector of the Chicago area. He has been working on the case since a few days after the robbery.

The brilliant postoffice sleuth was taken to the Crane county jail, adjoining Chicago, after bond was fixed at \$50,000.

Postal Inspector William Fahy, held in connection with the \$2,000,000 train robbery near Landout, Ill., today confessed to Charles H. Callaghan that he "tipped off" Jimmie Murray, an alleged "fence," concerning activities of the secret service men in their investigation of the robbery, according to a claim by Callaghan.

Fahy said, according to the official, that he received inside information that secret service men were going to make further investigations into the robbery. Postal Inspector Callaghan declares that evidence points clearly to Fahy's implication in the robbery and he said he would go before a federal grand jury and ask for an indictment. No other postal inspector was involved, he said.

Secret service men are tracing a secret banking account Fahy is reported to have.

Fahy denied that he was involved in the hold-up and characterized his arrest as inspired by jealousy, it was said by his friends, who denied he had made any confession.

### REPUBLICANS PLANNING FIGHT ON FERGUSON

**Creager Says Clean Candidate For Governor of Texas Will Be Selected.**

**HOUSTON, Aug. 27.**—A clean, honest republican gentleman will be selected as our candidate for governor of Texas, R. B. Creager, republican national committeeman from Texas, said today following close of republican executive committee meeting here. He said:

"The Ku Klux Klan is not an issue and need not be made an issue. The stand of the Texas republicans has always been against that order, because we believe a secret society has no place in American political life."

"The issue in this campaign is clean government and I promise the people of Texas we will select a man who will be the exact antithesis of James E. Ferguson, impeached governor of Texas, who seems to have regained the confidence of the democratic party. Mrs. Ferguson will not be the governor if she is elected and we believe the better element among the democrats will support our candidate against Mrs. Ferguson."

**PANHANDLE CATTLEMAN DIES.**—AMARILLO, Aug. 27.—J. B. Shurford, 63, prominent cattleman of the Panhandle section and for nearly 35 years livestock agent for the Fort Worth and Denver railroad, died at his home here Tuesday after several weeks' illness.

The body will be taken to Denver for burial.

### PASSENGERS ON SHIPS ARE SUFFERERS IN BIG STORM

**NEW YORK, Aug. 27.**—A terrific hurricane has been raging at sea since Aug. 24 and is still delaying many vessels, shipping circles said today. A number of liners are overdue and wireless reports from them are being received. One White Star liner asked that eight ambulances be sent to meet the ship and take injured persons to hospitals. It is supposed these persons were hurt during the storm.

## Plants Supply Enough Light to Take Photographs

By stimulating certain kinds of small plants with an intense beam of light, Prof. Francis E. Lloyd, of McGill University, has devised a method for taking color photographs of them by the rays which they emit. In the experiment, the plants glowed with brilliant red, orange, and yellow lights and details of their structure which could not be observed under the microscope, were revealed. The pigments, which are believed to be the source of the luminous glow, are thought to play an important part in the growth of the cells.

## Camera to Detect Forgery Snaps Face and Name

Simultaneously photographing the depositor and his signature, a double camera arrangement has been perfected by an eastern inventor for use in banks and business houses to detect forgeries. Upon a special plate the machine at one "snap" registers a picture of the person and of his handwriting, which is affixed to a blank and kept with the photograph for reference in case dispute later arises as to the depositor's identity or his signature.

Weighing 500 pounds and modeled accurately after smaller instruments, a huge saxophone was displayed not long ago in California. Securely bracketed to the outside of the manufacturer's shop, the giant instrument formed an impressive advertising display, and to emphasize its

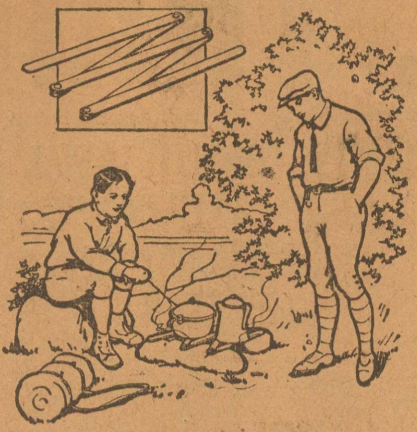
tremendous proportions, a young woman who attempted to play it was compelled to mount a ladder to reach the mouth-piece.

## New Capitol Built over Old Saves Rent for State Offices

Replacing the old Nebraska state capitol with a \$5,000,000 structure on the same site, while government work goes on unhampered in the present one, is a feat being accomplished at Lincoln. When the new building is near completion, the old one inside will be torn down. The wrecking promises to be an interesting engineering operation, as the present capitol is built entirely of stone and has a dome that rises 300 feet from the ground. Just enough room is being left between the new walls and the old building for a railroad track to carry away the debris. While six or seven years will be required to complete the project by this method, the contractor expects to save the state two or three years' rent on offices.

## A Simple Camp Grate

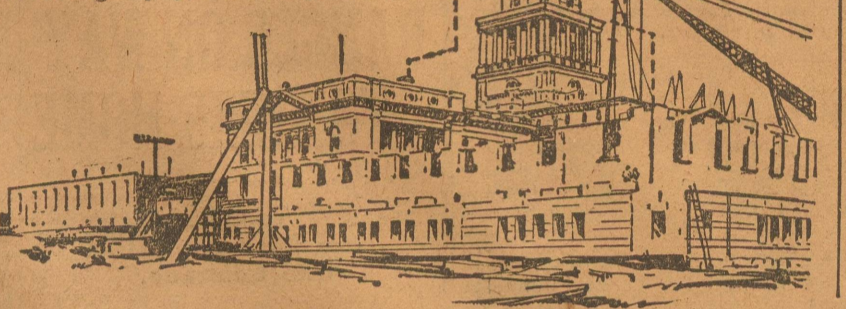
A simple and convenient camp grate that does not take up much room and can easily be made by anyone, is shown



in the drawing. It is made from a number of 18-in. lengths of 3/4-in. flat iron, about 1 in. wide. These lengths are pivoted together at the ends as shown in the upper detail, which arrangement permits them to be folded compactly or drawn out for use. The fire is made between two rows of rocks, as flat as can be found and of fairly equal height, as shown, and the grate placed on top of them. When not in use, the grate is folded up and put in a canvas pocket made to hold it.

## Cranking a "Stiff" Car

After repairing a car by fitting some new bearings and taking up the old ones, it was found impossible to crank the engine, and a heavy snow prevented towing the car. However, the following scheme proved effective: Another auto was run up alongside it so that the two adjacent rear wheels of both cars were in line and could be lashed together with a rope. The axles of both cars were, of course, jacked up to keep the wheels in alignment and prevent the cars from moving. The second car was then started and both cars thrown into high gear with the result that the first one was quickly started.

## EASTLAND WILL HAVE DEFENSE DAY PROGRAM

Afternoon of September 12 Is Designated as Holiday; Parade Planned.

A national defense day program will be given in Eastland September 12. City Manager J. H. Cheatham has issued a proclamation designating the afternoon of Friday, September 12, as a half holiday for the occasion. At that time all stores and other places of business are expected to be closed.

At the request of Governor Pat M. Neff, C. U. Connelley and Dr. J. L. Johnson of Eastland, both citizens of long standing, have consented to serve as members of a civilian committee in charge of national defense day ceremonies in Eastland, Friday, September 12. J. H. Cheatham, city manager, will serve as chairman of the committee. Harry Brelsford, major field artillery reserve, U. S. Army, will assist the committee in arranging the military feature of the ceremonies. When asked to lend his services, Mr. Connelley said:

"I am glad to do anything that I can to further the purpose of this patriotic celebration. It is to be hoped that citizens everywhere will unite on this day to avow and renew fealty and allegiance to our country. All else should be forgotten in a united demonstration of patriotism."

Dr. J. L. Johnson was equally prompt in consenting to serve, saying: "I regard this idea of a patriotic celebration as an excellent one. In a country as great as ours where there are so many different schools of thought and such greatly diversified interests, the bringing together of the people on a day set aside for patriotic purposes cannot fail to have a wholesome effect. It is in keeping with our democratic traditions and I am glad to serve."

The program for the day will consist of a patriotic parade, in which all organizations are urged to enter; a patriotic address, and a military flag lowering. The Eastland band has donated its services for the parade and will play the national anthem at the flag lowering. The speaker for the day has not yet been decided upon but his name will be announced later.

The Red Cross, American Legion, Rotary club, Lions Club, Masonic lodge, Boy Scouts, Elks, United Confederate Veterans and all other patriotic organizations are urged to notify Harry Brelsford of their willingness to participate in the parade. The assignment of position and order of march will be announced later. Prompt attention to this is requested by the committee.

Officers and men of the army reserve and the national guard are directed to report to the senior officer present on Sept. 12, in order that proper report may be made to the commanding general of the Eighth Corps Area.

The numbers played ranged from marches to popular pieces and all who waited appreciated the music, judging from the applause at the end of each number.

## WOMAN WITH A RADIO MIND IS RANGER VISITOR

After Spending Day in Caddo Expects to Be In City for Several Days.

Mrs. Carrie May King of New Orleans, announced as "the woman with the radio mind," arrived in Ranger yesterday and was the guest for today in the family of Peter Swenson, on his ranch, seven miles southwest of Caddo.

Mr. Swenson is said to have submitted an educational plan to the World's Federation of Educational associations in competition for a prize of \$25,000, one of several thousand plans submitted, and wishes Mrs. King to pass judgment on his plan, even though it may not win a prize.

Mrs. King was recently in San Antonio and the San Antonio News reported that she had solved several mysteries that had puzzled the police, had revealed the names of some murderers and told where other criminals were to be found. Her mind runs in other channels, too, it is claimed, and it is along another channel that Mr. Swenson is seeking information from her.

Mrs. King said she expected to return to Ranger tomorrow and would be a guest at the Gholson hotel for several days. She said that she charges nothing for the information she gives.

## SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS CONFERENCE OPENS THURSDAY

Portales, N. M., has been chosen for the annual conference and camp meeting of Seventh-Day Adventists for New Mexico and West Texas.

Meetings will be attended by delegates from all over New Mexico and West Texas. Camp tents are being erected on the camp grounds to accommodate 200 people.

The headquarters for the Texico conference, which includes the aforementioned territory, is at Clovis, N. M. Rev. R. L. Benton, president of the Texico conference will preside at the convention and make the opening address. Rev. G. B. Thompson of Washington, D. C., and Rev. M. B. Van Kirk of Oklahoma City will speak at this convention.

The Adventists claim to be preaching the gospel in 196 languages and printing gospel literature in 119 languages. Their membership is reported to be over 200,000. Their headquarters are at Washington, D. C.

The chief tenets of faith of Seventh-Day Adventists are: That Christ will soon return to this earth in visible form; that Saturday is the original seventh day Sabbath instead of Sunday; that the dead are unconscious; and that the wicked are completely destroyed and do not burn throughout eternity. They advocate an abstemious diet and quite largely are non-flesh users. Their ministry is supported by the tithes and their missionaries by free will offerings. They have a religious educational system that operates throughout the world. They advocate that church schools are proper and should be conducted up to standards prescribed by the state.

Because prolonged dry weather has forced a large California electric service company to generate electricity by steam power, at a material higher cost, the California railroad commission has authorized this company temporarily to increase its rates for lighting and power service 10 per cent for a period of eight months beginning on Sept. 1.
