### Fines Go Up For 'Regular' Drunkards

"Each additional time anyone comes into this court charged with drunkenness from now on, fine is going to be increased \$5 from \$15.70, the present min imum, until it reaches \$100," lice Judge L. H. Flewellen de clared today as he fined a couple of men \$15.70, both charged with drunkenness.

"The law sets the \$100 limit," the judge explained, "and we cannot go above that."

The ruling means that the first charge of drunkenness against an individual will cost \$15.70. The second fine will be \$20.70, and this increase will be continued until the limit is reached.

It is hoped by the police officials that this method will have a tendency to cure many of the regulars from imbibing enough intoxicants to land them in the police station.

# Japs Refuse to Parley on Occupation GRAND

Apparently Intend to Hold Eastern Siberia; Rebuff New Republic

Parleys were broken off when the Russians insisted that the scope of negotiations should embrace the entire Far Eastern situation, should assume an international aspect instead of parleys between military commands, and has been worked over so as to provide that military operations should be completely suspended while negotiations were






Map showing relation of Dodecanese islands to Greece, Italy and Asia Minor.




