PUBLIC FORUM

V. V. COOPER ANSWERS RECENT QUESTIONNAIRE

To the Public:—
Replying to your questionnaire propounded to the candidates for county Judge of the commissioners court and county commissioners of Eastland county, beg to submit to you the following:

You have propounded six questions to be answered by these candidates and you request that, "You will please answer each of the following questions 'yes' or 'no' without qualification or evasion."

After carefully reading your questions it appears to me that some of the questions could not be answered 'yes' or 'no' without some explanation and I therefore give you the following answers:

Question No. 1.—If you are elected, will you be in favor of and vote for the immediate filing of a suit against the above named bondsmen to recover all of the county funds? Answer.—Yes.

Question No. 2.—If you are elected, will you be in favor of and vote to have this matter investigated by a competent counsel and take such steps as are necessary to protect the rights of Eastland county? Answer.—Yes.

Question No. 3.—If you are elected, will you be in favor of and vote for the immediate prosecution of the suit against the bondsmen of John A. Russell to recover this shortage? Answer.—Yes.

Question No. 4.—If you are elected, will you be in favor of and vote for the immediate prosecution of suits to recover against the bondsmen for approximately \$70,000.00 of the Eastland county school funds on deposit in the defunct Security State Bank & Trust company when its doors were closed? Answer.—Yes.

Question No. 5.—If you are elected, will you be in favor of and vote to discharge the present employees of the highway department and employ a new set of engineers?

Answer.—After an investigation should it be shown that the present employees of the highway department have been negligent in protecting the interest of the county or they are incompetent to fill the position of highway engineers, I will be in favor of discharging them and employing a new set of engineers.

Question No. 6.—In the event the high court should decide that this contract is illegal and void, then would you be in favor of and vote to settle with the contractors on the basis of this illegal and void contract? Answer.—No.

These answers have been made upon the presumption that the statements in your questionnaire are true and correct, and should it develop after thorough investigation that they are not correct, I would have the liberty of changing my position upon these issues.

I stand first, last and all of the time for the protection of the county's rights and if I am elected to the office of commissioner of Precinct No. 1, it will not only be a duty but a pleasure to see that every legal means be taken for the protection of these rights.

The constable was badly beaten last Friday night by a band of masked men and ordered to leave town.

The county attorney, through the local paper, called upon the Ku Klux Klan to state whether or not it was responsible for the affair. The letter found this morning is addressed to him in care of the paper and makes a complete denial of any part in the assault.

The Klan also offers in the letter a reward of \$100 for the arrest and conviction of the parties responsible for the assault.

MORATORIUM REQUEST FORMALLY SUBMITTED

PARIS, July 12.—The German representatives today submitted to the reparations commission a formal note requesting a moratorium on reparations payments for the remainder of the present year. The note stated that 32,000,000 gold marks due Saturday are available if the commission insists on this payment, but recommends that also be waived.

Strong opposition to a three-year cash moratorium for Germany, which has been informally agreed on by Great Britain, Italy and Belgium was believed certain today. John Broadberry, representing Great Britain on the allied reparations commission, made the proposal at an unofficial meeting of the commission. Italy and Belgium immediately agreed. This led to vigorous protest by M. Dubois, the French member. On the plea of Dubois, definite action was postponed and Dubois left hurriedly for a conference with Premier Poincare.

In addition to an agreement on a three-year moratorium, Great Britain, Italy and Belgium informally decided upon an important reduction in payments in kind.

The formal note requesting the moratorium will be presented to the allied reparations commission this afternoon.

DUBLIN, July 12.—Mrs. C. D. Winkler of Leuders is in a hospital here with a broken shoulder and other injuries sustained in a collision with an eastbound "Katy" passenger train near Comyn Sunday, when with her husband, she attempted a grade crossing in their car.
Her husband was not hurt sufficiently to require attention.

CLEVELAND, July 12.—"When the lives of crews and passengers are endangered by faulty equipment the big railroad brotherhoods will act." This was the statement Tuesday of William G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and spokesman for the big brotherhoods.

Lee would not explain what action would be taken. "We have told our members to operate trains as long as poor equipment does not endanger

their lives or those of passengers," he said. "But when the lives of our members and of passengers are at stake,—well, then the brotherhood will act."

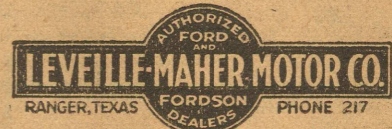
Harmon was in his automobile and apparently misjudged the speed of the train when he attempted to cross the tracks.

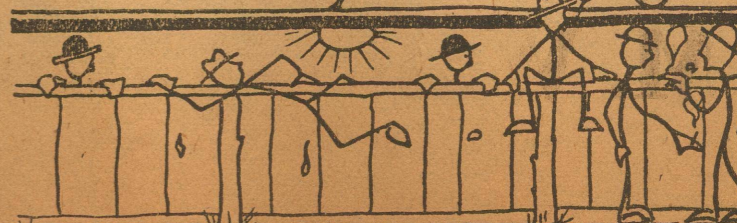
