All ex-service men not permanently or totally disabled have been given an opportunity by the United States veterans' bureau to reinstate or convert their war risk term insurance. The offer is open only to July 15. The necessary blanks may be obtained locally from J. B. Stackable in the Guaranty Bank

If the applicant is in good health and can pass the complete physical examination he will be required to pay only two premiums regardless of how long his insurance has been in state of lapse, it is stated.

If an ex-service man is suffering from a disability, incurred or aggravated by military service he also has the right to reinstate his insurance, but in this case it is necessary for him to submit all back premiums due, with interest at 5 per cent compounded annually. A physical examination is also required.


