TWO KILLED IN RAID ON CARD GAME

MARTIAL LAW ENDED TODAY AT GALVESTON

Troops Said to Have Reduced Disorders at Seaport Town.

By Associated Press. GALVESTON, Oct. 1.—Galveston's city officials this morning wore the cloak of authority for the first time since July 14, when Mayor H. O. Sappington, the city commissioners and the police force were removed by order of Governor W. P. Hobby for alleged interference with enforcement of martial law.

Forty men were rounded up after the fatal shooting and are now being held. Ten pistols were taken from the prisoners.

HARDING URGES NEED OF PUBLIC WELFARE DEPT.

Federal Department Should Be Formed to Promote Social Justice, He Says.

By Associated Press. MARION, O., Oct. 1.—Creation of a federal department of public welfare for the promotion of social justice was proposed here today by Senator Warren G. Harding, addressing women gathered at the home of the Republican presidential candidate for "Social Justice and Women's Day."

Senator Harding took social justice for the theme of his address. "When making the proposal for a department of public welfare to America," he said, "I am aware that I have made a step in advance of any platform. I have chosen to speak to you on the practical question of how to do the tasks we must do, the things American conscience is calling to have done."

Welfare of the women and children of the nation was dominated the first interests of the new federal department advocated by Senator Harding. The scope of its interests, he said, would include equal pay for equal work by women, the eight hour day for women, fostering of appointment or women to positions on federal and state boards of employment, labor adjustment, etc., where women were concerned, and normal labor for women on the farms.

Regarding industrial workers, both men and women, Senator Harding said he believed the government could assist in abolishing unsteady employment. The unrest arising from this source, he said, is "not a condition to be remedied alone by federal employment bureaus willing in the gaps of employment, but rest largely upon conditions of industry which make for seasonal production and periodic closing and opening of industrial plants and occupations. I am enough of an optimist to believe that government can assist in the abolition of this most unfortunate condition."

Senator Harding added that he thought that the government could "take a large part in the second and, perhaps, even more important campaign" to make a highly specialized mechanical labor interesting. He viewed it as "our duty as a whole people to see if we cannot make every job in the country a small business of its own."

DOCTORS AT KALIHI BELIEVE LEPROSY REMEDY IS FOUND

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—Leprosy, a scourge of humanity since early history, apparently has been conquered by officers of the United States public health service in the leper colony at Kalihi, Hawaii. Forty-eight sufferers of the dreaded malady, who have been subjected to a new method of treatment, have recovered to such extent as to warrant their release on parole, and, after a year, not one has shown a symptom of recurrence.

The pleasure-loving Romans of old had nothing on the French stage favorite of today when it comes to luxury in the matter of bathing facilities—at least if one is to believe a scene in Erich von Stroheim's special feature, "The Devil's Pass Key," now being shown at the Lamb theater.

One of the scenes in the story shows Mae Busch in the role of a Spanish dancer, enjoying her morning bath. The word morning is used figuratively, for the lady in question does not begin her day till long after the noonday hour. Von Stroheim copied the bath room from a picture of the private natorium of a Parisian stage favorite before the war. Several cameramen fought for the privilege of photographing this scene.

Von Stroheim remembered that he had seen Mae Busch play a role similar to that of the Spanish dancer on the musical stage, with Eddie Foy in "Over the River." So when he assigned her the part his only directions were: "Play it just as you did that role on the stage; only remember you are in Paris instead of New York, moving in a set that is broad on views and short on morals." She graduated to musical comedy and played leading roles in many New York successes.

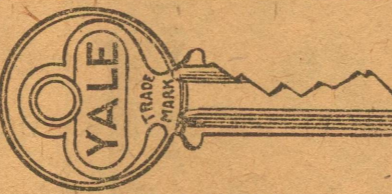

CHINA PLACES PRICE ON HEADS OF PRO-JAPANESE OFFICIALS

PEKIN, Oct. 1.—The fall of the "An-fu clique," commonly identified as the pro-Japanese party of China because of the facility with which the Japanese have concluded loans with China in exchange for valuable concessions and privileges during the period of its dominance, is seemingly complete and irrevocable. So complete is the collapse that its chief representatives at the moment are in hiding with prices on their heads.

For five days every avenue leading from the legation quarter has been watched day and night and every passer-out, Chinese or foreign, has been subject to inspection, on the suspicion amounting to belief that those wanted are harbored in some one or several of the legations and that they will eventually try to escape from the city. Likewise all city gates are closely guarded to prevent passage of any on the proscribed list.

Pictures Posted.

It is customary in Pekin to post in railway stations and places generally where people congregate posters with the picture of persons known to be pickpockets, sneak thieves or burglars. Never before, however, in the memory of the oldest resident, have men who have occupied high places of authority in affairs of the nation been so placarded.

This time, however, the streets were "billed" with cuts and descriptions of a half dozen of the chief political offenders, subjects of a presidential decree on a broad charge of having been guilty of bringing about the military commotion in July and earlier. Rewards, ranging from \$10,000 to \$30,000, were publicly offered for their delivery into custody.

As an afterthought, the photograph of one of those placarded was removed—General Tuan Chi-kuei's—because of indignity to the uniform which he was shown to be wearing. A new picture is being sought which will present him in civilian garb. Similar measures are contemplated with respect to General Hsu Shu-cheng (Little Hsu) who also appears in uniform. Little Hsu has the distinction of being the most pressingly wanted, to judge from the fact that his capture is the only one valued as high as \$30,000. The others and rewards for their arrest are:

Tseng Yu-chan, former minister of communications, \$20,000; the former ministers of finance and justice, the chief secretary of the senate, the commander in chief of the army, the president of the supreme court and the vice minister of communications, \$10,000 each.

AFGHANS WILL PERMIT HINDU IMMIGRATION

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—The Amir of Afghanistan, for the first time in history according to Dr. N. S. Hardiker of the India information bureau here, has invited Hindus to settle in his country, to accomplish which he has announced the following royal concessions said to indicate a movement for the unification of the peoples of Asia:

- 1.—Non-interference in the observance of Hindus' religious beliefs;
- 2.—Freedom of Hindus to travel and settle in any part of the country;
- 3.—Government protection of Hindus' homes;
- 4.—Hindu representation in the Afghan assembly;
- 5.—Unrestricted travel permitted Hindu women.

There are more than 230,000,000 Hindus and 70,000,000 Moslems in India and a hijrat, or exodus of many of the latter to Afghanistan, according to Dr. Hardiker, already is under way.

"The proposals of the Amir are aimed," he said, "at dispelling the notion that Afghanistan is partial to Islamism. The proclamation clearly shows that all freedom and protection will be extended to Hindu subjects, and that no interference will be exercised in the religious observances of the Hindus, however much these may differ from the beliefs of the Mohammedans and Afghans. The Amir undoubtedly is endeavoring to promote a better feeling between Afghanistan and India."

tended to deflate the price of cotton, especially the low grades.

In line with the pooling movement the board of directors of the Rural Land Owners' association, which operates in more than twenty Gulf Coast counties, decided to experiment next season with various kinds of long staple cotton with a view to standardization of the staple grown in this section. In the pre-war period, it was pointed out, there was little difference in the prices of low grade and average grade cotton, but since the war the price of low grade cotton has reached the point where the grower is not repaid the cost of production.

Confederate Vets to Be 'Billeted' at Houston Reunion

By Associated Press

HOUSTON, Oct. 1.—Final preparations for the reception of delegates to the reunion of the United Confederate Veterans, which will begin next Tuesday and continue through Friday, now are under way and will be completed before the most of the visitors arrive. In addition to the Confederate Veterans who will attend the reunion, of whom it is estimated there will be between 8,000 and 10,000, the visitors will include delegates to the reunion of Sons of Confederate Veterans, and the convention of the Confederate Southern Memorial association.

By next Tuesday morning it is expected 75,000 visitors will have reached the city.

Houston's arrangements for entertaining the visitors need few touches to make them complete. Provision for caring for most of the old soldiers in school houses and public buildings has been made. Hotels will accommodate approximately 10,000 other visitors, and 50,000 or more will be assigned to private homes for shelter.

Meals at Mess Hall.

The veterans "billeted" downtown will be furnished meals at mess halls erected on city property four blocks from the city auditorium, where reunion headquarters will be maintained. The feeding arrangements will be in charge of E. A. Pickens, who has had charge of this work at seven previous reunions.

A mass of color will greet the visitors when they arrive. The dislocations will start at the three railroad terminals with the Stars and Bars of the Confederacy as the basis and from the stations lanes of color will lead the visitors to a Court of Honor in the center of the downtown district. From the Court of Honor visitors will be assigned to their "billets" or other places provided for their accommodation.

Decision to shelter the veterans in buildings instead of in a tent camp, as at first announced, was the result of refusal of the quartermaster general of the United States army to lend anything except tents for equipping such a camp. It was explained that the army officer, in his refusal, was following to the letter a law passed by congress last July which provides that tents may be loaned war veterans for encampments, but which failed to mention any other equipment.

The veterans were instructed to bring their own blankets and mattresses for 10,000 "shake-down" beds were obtained from Memphis.

MANY SNARLS IN SYSTEM OF TRAVEL THROUGH EUROPE

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 1.—Nine visas are required to carry a traveler from Constantinople to Paris on the Orient Express, and the task is so great that most travelers take steamers to Marseilles or Venice in preference to the jumbled rail trip across the Balkans which necessitates endless controversies with border control officials at various frontiers.

An American who desires to go to Paris by rail must start with the visa of the United States consulate on his passport. Then the tourist must go to the Swedish Legation to get the Bulgarian visa. The Serbian stamp is next in order. It must be followed by three Greek stamps, that of the Greek high commissioner, of the Greek military control and of the Greek consul. Then visas must be had of the Italian and the French military controls.

Many passports are not large enough to carry all the stamps. An Englishman who recently attempted to get the collection on an old passport exhausted all the blank space in four calls. His embassy would not permit him to attach a blank sheet to his passport. Consequently he had to have a new one issued and started over again on the round of vexatious queues.

Since the Polish disaster, Bolshevik agitation has become so acute in Turkey that travelers are watched more carefully than ever before by the allied officials. On a recent passenger ship from Batum a so-called Russian colonel, whose conversation with British officials showed a decided ignorance of military affairs, was arrested. He had five passports in his trunk, together with great quantities of soviet literature in many languages. The bogus colonel was sent to General Wrangel in the Crimea.

Files Novel Suit

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 1.—It is worth \$1,000 per block to walk two blocks in a "disreputable neighborhood," in the opinion of J. Butler McCormick, attorney at law, who has filed suit against the United Railways, alleging that he was carried two blocks past his station.

McCormick charges that he was forced to walk two blocks through a disreputable neighborhood filled with highwaymen, bandits and assassins, in constant fear of attack, causing him to be "broken up" and remain at home for several days to the neglect of his law practice. He asked \$2,000 damages.

NIGHT WATCHMAN IN MADRID ARE GUARDIANS OF HOUSEHOLDERS

MADRID, Oct. 1.—The serenos or night watchmen of Madrid feel highly flattered by the announcement that London is about to follow the example of Spanish towns and organize a corps of guardians and keyholders in order to prevent burglaries.

Since the year 1798, the corps of serenos has existed in Madrid. From 10 o'clock at night until 7 in the morning in winter and until 6:30 in summer the sereno is on duty around every block of houses in the city. Citizens arriving at their house doors after 10 in nearly all cases find them closed and as it is unusual to carry the key—generally of inconvenient size—they are compelled to call the watchman. This is done by clapping the hands, a call which brings him to the scene with his lantern hanging on a kind of lance and the keys of all the houses hanging in a bunch. In most instances he knows the occupants of the houses and he precedes them to their flats if they have not the apartment key in their pocket, or gives them a small taper lighter from his lantern to light them up the stairs if they do not need his masterkey.

The payment is small, usually two cents for a pedestrian, but double that amount for persons arriving in
