By Associated Press CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—The Cook county grand jury, which has been conducting an investigation of the alleged "fixing" of the 1919 world's series baseball games, today is to be made a special body to continue its search for crookedness within the national game. The regular session of the grand jury ended yesterday. On Tuesday, John J. McGraw, man-

ager of the New York Giants; Fred Toney, Giant pitcher, and Benny Kauff, former outfielder for the New York club, will take the stand to conclude the evidence relative to Heinic Zimmerman, Hal Chase and Ira McGee, all National league players, who are alleged to have conspired to "throw" games during the 1919 playing season. Kauff and Toney, it is understood, will testify that Zimmer-man offered them \$500 and \$200 respectively to throw games. They refused, it understood they will testify. It is prob

able that before the exposure is over the investigation will be projected back into the history of baseball for a decade.

BROOKLYN'S SLATE CLEAN. The flames for a time endangered four ships at anchor nearby. The fire, which originated at the lower part of section A, filled with sisal, is thought to have been caused by spontaneous combustion. The first warning of the fire came when a mild explosion blew out windows and doors. One hour after the fire started it was still confined to section A, although it was burning heavily. Firemen are using gas masks in fighting the fire.

Wilkinson, pres-ident of district 21, United Mine Workers of America, before his departure for Fort Worth to confer with coal operatom there today. The Texas miners are demanding a flat increase of sixty cents a ton. The mine owners have refused to negotiate until the men return to work. The operators have offered an increase of 16 2-3 cents a ton on screened coal.





MONEY TALKS.

With the end of the presidential cam paign now only a month away, the Democratic national committee is appealing for free will offerings from the Democrats of Texas for the purpose of putting the Democratic cause and principles before the voters of the doubtful states. Literature and traveling expenses and other legitimate items entering into the cost of a campaign require much money Just as other forms of education, it must have financial support.

The League of Nations, the Democratic conduct of the war and policies of the party are being attacked, not on their merits but in a spirit of partisanship. The propaganda of the Republicans is in sidious and plausible, if it is allowed to work without opposition. A deliberate misrepresentation may sound like gospel truth unless attention is called to its fallacy. To open the eyes of voters to the true state of affairs, the party leaders need funds; whatever those who believe in backing their principles with deeds feel like contributing. Democrats who want to help may send their contributions direct to state headquarters, Western Indemnity building. Dallas, or the Times will receive and forward any contributions.

MORE THAN TRAFFIC WILL BEAR.

The large increases made in railroad passenger fares during the war had for one particular object discouragement of the use of motive power and tracks for civil travel to make room for their larger use in moving troops and munitions and military supplies generally. But the recent still further increase in fares, including a 50 per cent surcharge on Pullman accommodations, was imposed only for increased revenue.

Whether it may not have the contrary effect of reducing revenue by reducing travel in greater proportion is yet to be determined. Some railroad executives opposed any further advance of passenger rates in fear of such a consequence. Outside observers are beginning to raise the same question. Urgent business travel will not be affected. 




