## STORM SWEEPS ACROSS WEST TEXAS TODAY

### TRAIN TRAFFIC IS DELAYED; NO FATAL DAMAGE

#### One Trainman Hurt When Freight Runs Into A Washout

By United Press.  
DALLAS, April 20.—Wind and rain swept across West and Southwest Texas today, leaving in its train deranged traffic schedules and property damage, according to advices here.  
Twenty miles of the Texas & Pacific railroad track between Mochohen and Odessa, west of Big Spring, was under water. A washout near Monahan severed the connection of the T. & P. between Fort Worth and El Paso. The crack Sunshine Special carrying Jack Dempsey and his party was held up at Toyah.  
Railroad officials here indicated that service would not be restored until late today.  
One trainman was injured when a freight train plunged into a washout near Hermleigh, 25 miles northwest of Sweetwater, during the night.  
Wind preceding an inch of rainfall at Del Rio wrecked several houses but no casualties were reported. Traffic on the Southern Pacific at Del Rio was stopped for a time when flood water covered the track.

### BIG TIM MAY SETTLE IN THE VALLEY

KANSAS CITY, April 20.—Timothy D. (Big Tim) Murphy, noted child labor boss of the gas house district and more recently a ward of the government in Leavenworth penitentiary is to build a giant labor colony on an 11,000-acre tract of land in Cameron county, Texas, he announced here today.  
"Big Tim" passed through here en route to Texas from Chicago, accompanied by a real estate broker, who refused to divulge his name.  
Murphy plans a gigantic colony of five and 10-acre farms to be irrigated to produce grape fruit, cabbage and other truck, he explained. The big trader said the scheme involved \$5,000,000.  
"I am going to give those fellows a chance to get out in the fresh air where they can really live and still make a living for their families," Murphy said.  
He was released on March 26 from Leavenworth, where he had served almost three years in connection with the \$285,000 Denbora station mail robbery in Chicago.

### Farmer Is Shot From Ambush; He Will Die

AUSTIN, April 20.—Henry Williams, farmer of Anderson Mill, 29 miles west of Austin, was shot from ambush and probably fatally wounded while traveling alone near his farm on a mountain road Monday night. His assassin, who is supposed to have used a .45-caliber pistol, escaped and is being sought by a posse.

### FARM RELIEF PROGRAM TO BE ATTACKED

WASHINGTON, April 20.—A double-barrel attack on the American farm relief program proposed in the Tichner bill was made today by the democrats on the house agricultural committee and the republican members of the farm bloc.  
As the measure started through its initial legislative journey in the committee, the democrats charged that it was proposed for artificial aid, while the republican farm leaders branded it as incomplete without any provision for the collection of an equalization fee.

### WATER SAMPLES SENT TO AUSTIN FOR ANALYSIS

Samples of the city water of Ranger were forwarded today to the state board of health at Austin by B. H. Peacock, city engineer.  
This action is taken every week in order that the public may be assured at all times that the water provided is pure.  
Ranger has one of the most modern water systems to be found anywhere, it is declared. The filtration system consists of two units and when the plant was constructed, it was designed so that four units might be installed with little added cost. The two units in operation have a capacity of a million gallons a day or more than three times the amount of water used at present by the city.  
With the coming of warmer weather, the consumption of water will increase to half a million gallons a day, or an amount equal to half of the capacity of the present units.  
The plant, to the northeast of Ranger, will soon be surrounded by a veritable park as roses and shrubbery have been set out and the public is invited to visit it. The plant is as modern as can be found anywhere, the only difference between it and the plants to be found in even the largest cities being that it is not automatic in operation.  
The water is first aerated, then goes into the mixing chamber where alum is used to precipitate the solids, the alum being eliminated in the process, and then the water goes into the filter where it makes its way through four feet of sand and gravel. Then, just as the water enters the main, chlorine is added.  
"This chemical is just as readily to germs as strychnine is to human beings but chlorine is entirely harmless to man," declares City Engineer Peacock.

DALLAS, April 20.—Disfigurement for life and blindness faced three month old Geraldine Fulgham today following an attack by a pet dog while the child's mother was absent from home. The child's nose and ears were torn from its face and her little face was gnashed by the dog's fangs as she lay sleeping in her cradle. Physicians say that the child will recover.

### BRIAND INFORMS CABINET TERMS ARE ACCEPTABLE

#### Francis Reach Lowest Point In History On The Bourse At Paris

PARIS, France, April 20.—A preliminary agreement for funding the \$4,200,000,000 French debt to the United States has been reached by the French ambassador, Henry Berenger, and Secretary of the Treasury Andrew Mellon. Premier Aristide Briand told the French cabinet today.  
The agreement, Briand said, had not yet been signed. The premier laid the terms of the proposed preliminary agreement before the cabinet and they were unanimously ratified.  
While Briand was reporting progress toward debt funding, the franc slumped to a new low record on the local bourse, where one dollar would be 30.5 francs compared with yesterday's closing of 29.70 francs.  
Today was the fifth consecutive business day in which the franc had established a new low record. The record smashing slump began last Thursday.

### DEMPSEY ON SPECIAL IS DELAYED

Rickard, the greatest fight promoter in the world, was associated with Ringling at the time the Eastland, Wichita Falls & Gulf railroad was built.

### Rescuers Hear Men's Voices Caught In Cave

The words were unintelligible. The four or five feet of debris estimated to lie between the men and the outside, effectually closed in the calls.

### SISTER SHIP OF ONE SUNK 1925 IS THE VICTIM

NEW LONDON, Conn., April 20.—An explosion partly wrecked the submarine S-49 as she was tested at the pier of the submarine base here today.  
Fifteen men, all sailors, were listed as injured, several having been seriously hurt.  
The members of the crew had just gone aboard for their regular daily duty when the blast occurred. The batteries exploded but the exact cause of the explosion has not been determined. The hull was badly damaged.  
The injured men were removed to the base hospital and an investigation started. The extent of the damage was considerable. Lieutenant Challenger, assistant executive officer, told the United Press.  
The S-49 is a sister ship to the S-51 which was sunk off Block Island last fall by the City of Rome with a loss of 34 lives.  
Nine men were seriously injured, one perhaps fatally and a dozen others received lesser injuries here today when the batteries of the submarine S-49 blew up while the crew was at breakfast.

### DOCTORS FAVOR LIFTING LIMIT ON USE OF LIQUOR

DALLAS, April 20.—The American Medical association in annual convention here today went on record as favoring the lifting of the quantities' limitation of the use of liquor by physicians for medicinal purposes and instructed its board of trustees to seek legislation for the removal of current restrictions.  
This action was taken by the house of delegates in executive session and little explanation as to the discussion was given out.  
Whether the medical profession will make any headway to remove the restrictions is largely dependent upon the pending decision by the United States supreme court upon the appealed case of Lambert-Yellowley of New York, it was pointed out. The case in question brings up the issue of whether the state or federal government has the authority to regulate the amount of liquor that may be given to patients by physicians.

### Ranger's Fancier's Chickens Still In Race For Prize

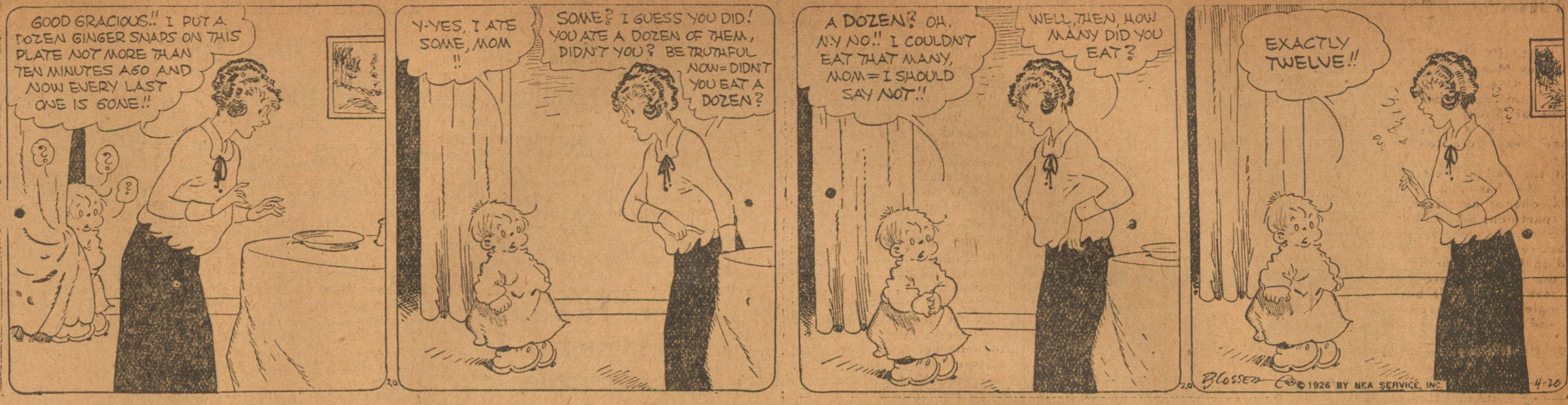

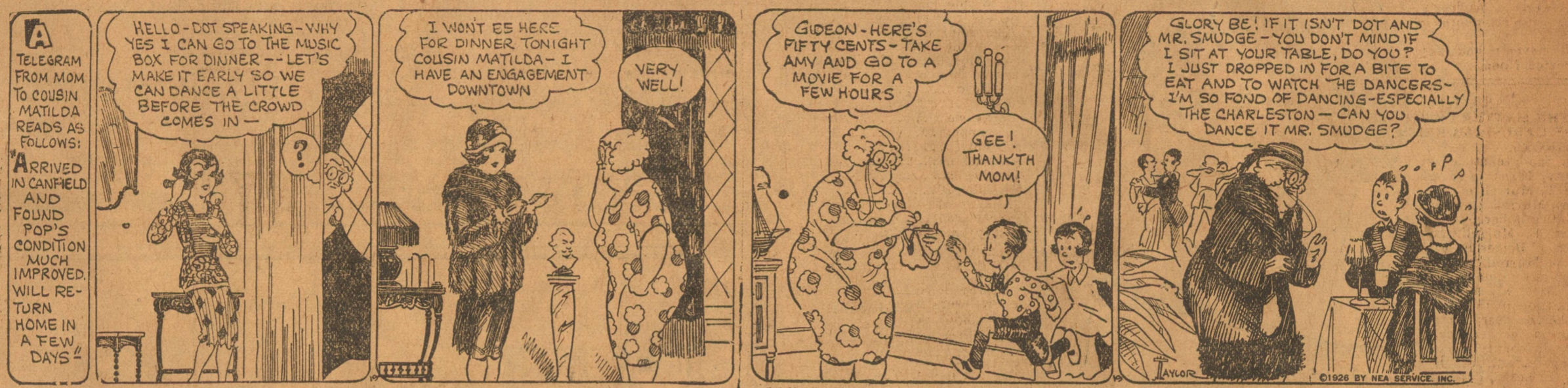

### Chapman Hanging Causes Revulsion Of Public Feeling

WASHINGTON — Probably the hanging of Gerald Chapman was no worse than any other execution. Due, however, to Chapman's wide notoriety, news accounts of it were unusually horrible in greswome detail. Judging from unofficial congressional comment, they've caused a decided revulsion against capital punishment under any circumstances.

Of course congressmen, as such, have no responsibility for state laws, but they do, individually, have influence in their respective states.

Besides, the Chapman case, in one way, was peculiarly linked up with the federal government. The bandit enjoyed — or, rather, by no means enjoyed. The destination of being only man ever pardoned by the president of the United States in order to be hanged.

President Coolidge, in signing this pardon, relinquishing the Atlanta prison claims on Chapman and thus thus allowing the Connecticut authorities to string him up, really sent the outlaw to his death in a more direct sense than he was sent by the jury which convicted him, the judge who sentenced him or the board which refused him mercy at the last.

The Connecticut proceedings at least were automatic — the usual thing, done in the usual way. President Coolidge set a precedent, perhaps in all legal history, in granting a pardon which meant the noose.

While the supreme court turned down Chapman's contention that a pardon can be refused by the man it is offered to, some lawyers in Congress do incline to believe there may be merit in the argument that the so-called Chapman pardon wasn't actually a pardon at all—a pardon being a remission of punishment, not its infliction.

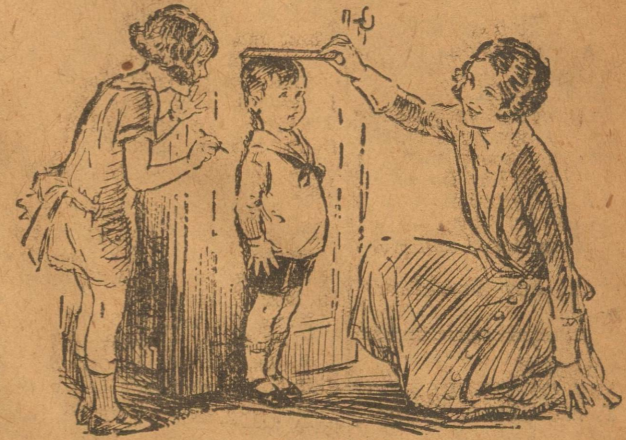

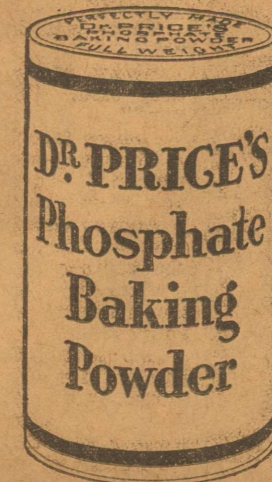
