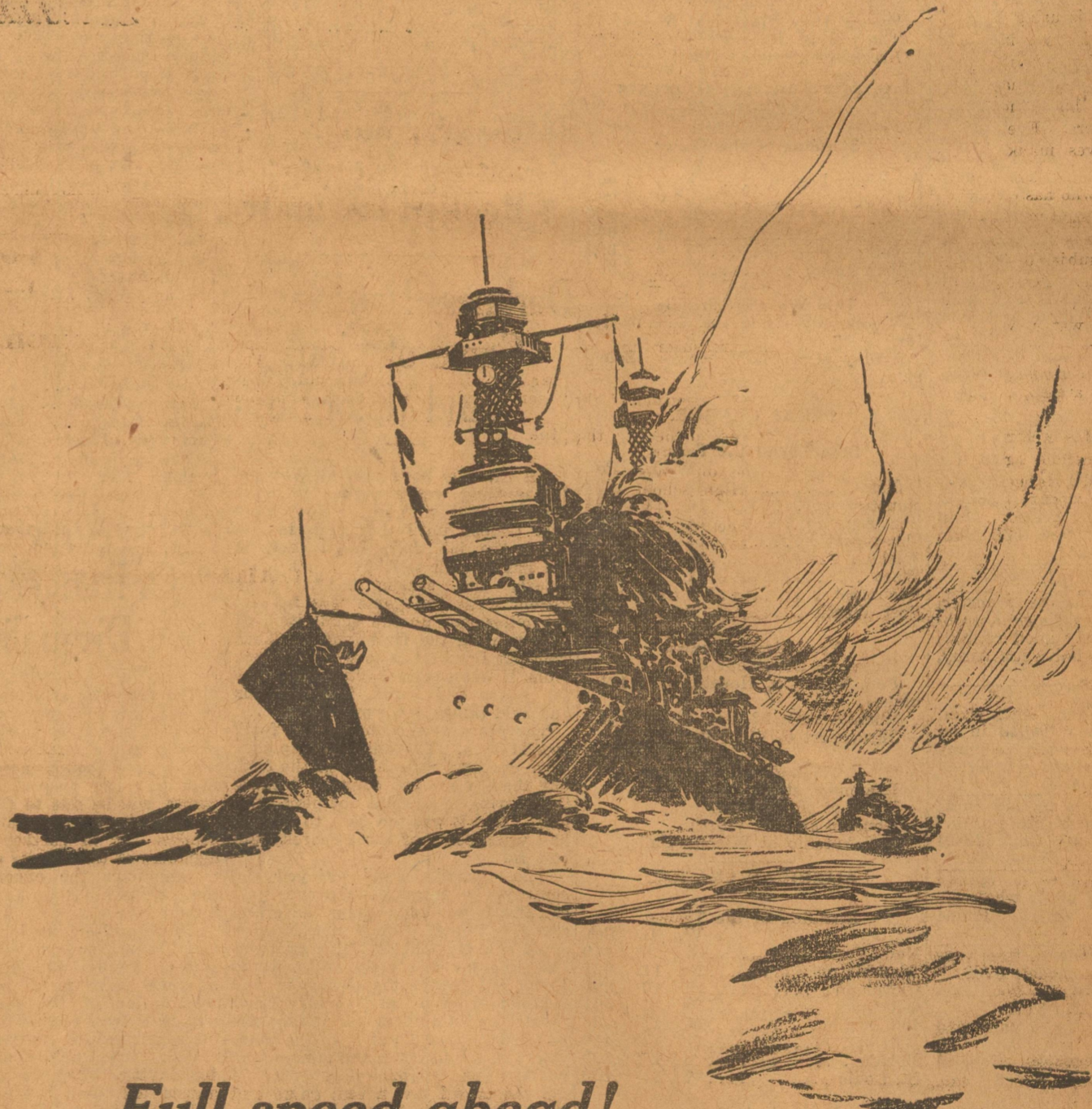

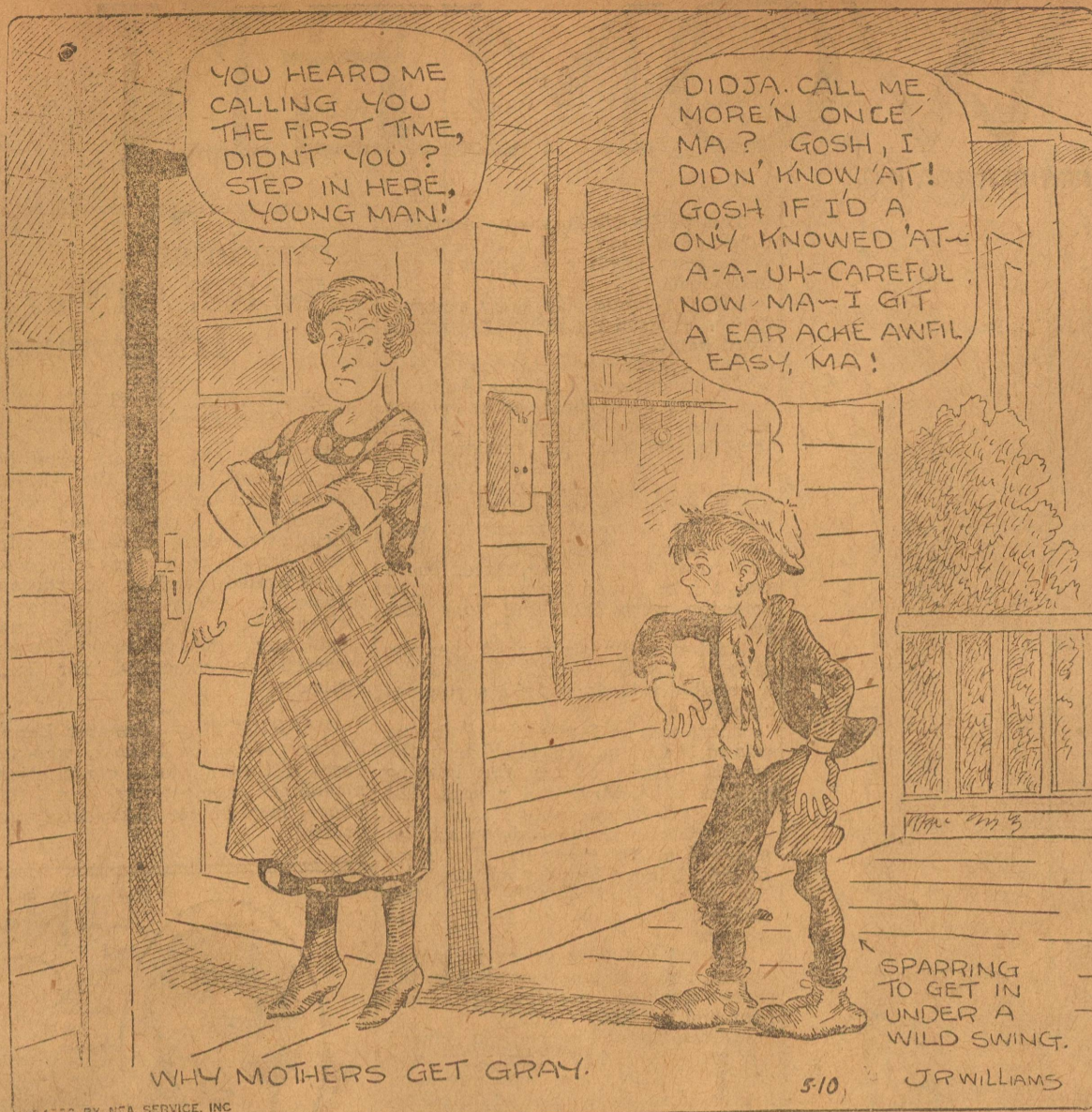

Motor Vehicle Census Reveals Big Investment

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The Department of Commerce announces that, according to data collected at the biennial census of manufacturers 1925, the establishments engaged primarily in the manufacturing of motor vehicles in that year produced 3,655,048 passenger vehicles, valued at \$2,527,356,148; 13, 627 public conveyances valued at \$39,454,025; 1,185 government and municipal vehicles, valued at \$10,183,227; 487,970 business vehicles, valued at \$357,485,239; and 8,531 trailers, valued at \$3,449,017; together with other products valued at \$433,918,149, making a total \$8,371,855,805. The output of motor vehicles of all classes in 1925 aggregated 4,157,830 in number and \$2,934,488,639 in value. There aggregates represent increases of 6.9 per cent in number and 12.4 per cent in value as compared with 1923, the last preceding census year. (The values given in this report are wholesale factory values.)

The average unit values of both open and closed passenger cars decreased somewhat between 1923 and 1925, but proportion of closed cars (which are higher priced than the open cars) manufactured was much larger in the later than in the earlier year, and for this reason the per cent of increase in combined value of both classes of passenger vehicles was higher than the per cent of increase in their combined number.

Manufacturers

The foregoing figures and the other statistics herewith relate to manufacturers whose principal products were assembled motor vehicles, and do not include data for the production of establishments engaged primarily in the manufacture of bodies, parts, and accessories for motor vehicles.

The proportion of closed passenger cars has increased from 10 per cent in 1919 to 21.6 per cent in 1921, to 35.1 per cent in 1923, and 53.3 per cent in 1925. The number of this class of motor vehicles manufactured in 1925 reached a total of 2,080,033, compared with 1,201,577 in 1923, 304,220 in 1921, and approximately 156,000 in 1919.

Total Production

The total production of motor vehicles as reported at the biennial census of manufacturers differs very slightly from the aggregate of the monthly figures published by the Department of Commerce, namely 4,153,357 (3,678,328 passenger cars and 475,029 trucks.) This difference, which amounts to only a trifle more than one-tenth of 1 per cent of the total number of motor vehicles reported, is due to the following facts: (1) The biennial census figures refer to actual production, whereas the monthly figures relate in some cases to factory sales rather than to production. (2) The manufacturers reported at the biennial census for their fiscal or business years, and in a few cases these fiscal or business years were not identical with the calendar year 1925.

Cotton School Will Be Opened At College June 7

COLLEGE STATION, May 13.—The Eighteenth session of the Summer School of Cotton conducted each year at the A. & M. College of Texas by the Department of Textile Engineering, will begin on June 7 and continue until July 17. The cotton school is held with a view of preparing young men to enter the business of cotton; to train cotton growers to market their cotton intelligently and profitably; to assist cotton buyers to become more familiar with low grade and off colored cotton and to judge staple. This is the official cotton school of the State of Texas and at the close of the school an examination will be held by the State Board of Cotton Examiners. The object of this examination is to determine the qualifications of those who expect to class cotton for fees and to manage State bonded warehouses.

Lectures will be given daily covering subjects of general interest such as the following: Correct grading and how to accomplish it; reasons for fluctuations; some essentials of a successful cotton man; ginning and its effect on grades; New York and New Orleans cotton exchanges—how they operate and their importance to the cotton business; how to determine the spinning value of cotton; cotton damages; causes and preventions; and other similar subjects. The work in grading and stapling will be given by instructors of broad and recent experience, to small groups of men at the cotton tables. There will be one section organized for students who are especially interested in exporting. Two special courses in cotton office methods will be offered to students.

The school will be conducted under the direction of Professor J. B. Bagley, head of the Textile Engineering Department of the College. He will be assisted by L. E. Dowd, head of the division of cotton classing at the College, and formerly with Jett Williams and Co., of Hope, Arkansas; Charles H. Welch, public cotton classifier, Marshall, and former government cotton classifier and mill buyer; James R. Taylor, member of the firm of Taylor and Watson, Shawnee, Oklahoma, and former classifier on New Orleans Cotton Exchange; M. E. Kidd, member of the firm of Ryburn and Kidd, Waxahachie and former government cotton classifier; C. L. Baker, assistant cotton classifier at the College; H. A. Handrick, buyer for Eugene B. Smith and Co., at Quanah; and E. McCaleb manager of the Quanah Cotton Exchange.
