Alaska Is Waiting For Expedition To Land And Set Sail

By United Press.

Daring voices of sir explorations held the world's attention today. The airship Norge of the Amund-sen-Ellsworth-Mobile expedition has passed the north pole, flown over the unexplored region of Alaska and is expected to reach Nome to-

Captains Loriga and Gallarza, Madrid-to-Manila flyers, have arrived at Manila.

Cloudy weather at Point Barrow is delaying Captain G. H. Wilkins from beginning his projected flight into the Arctic. Lieutenant Commander R. E.

Byrd, United States navy, now at King's Bay, Spitzbergen, following a dramatic polar flight, is quoted in Oslo, Norway, dispatches as saying that he is prepared to fly in the Arctics again to search for the Norge, should there be any undue delay in that ship's arrival at CROSSES TOP OF WORLD.

Amundsen-Ellsworth-Mobile dirigible Norge has successfully crossed the top of the world and is safe today over Alaskan territory. A landing should be made at Nome during the day. This was revealed, when about midnight, Alaska time, the giant airship radio signals were picked up at St. Paul, Alaska, according to a dispatch relayed to Cordova. It was expected at Nome, Alaska this afternoon

From 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, Norwegian time, until 11 o'clock last night, Alaskan time, no word was heard from the expedition, then the naval radio station at Cor dova picked up the signals of the

'Airship Norge, found Nome, Alas-

"Please answer if any one hears of the dirigible," the message said. Nome, Alaska, Alive.

In the time between yesterday afternoon's message received at Oslo, Norway, and the message last night at Cordova, the Norge apparently has plowed steadily away from the pole toward Nome. It is in the region near the pole and not a great distance from Alaska, a section which civilized man has never seen. In that region, explorers believe will be found whatever land may exist in the polar areas.

The message received at Oslo indicated the Norge, up to late Wednesday night, had not sighted land, but only wastes of Arctic sea and ice.

There was little sleep in Nome last night. About the only persons who remained in doors were radio operators staying in to catch some signal from the craft. There was so much static that stations there so far had failed to talk with the dirigible.



WARSAW, Poland, May 13.— Fighting began in the streets of Warsaw at 1 o'clock this afternoon. It was estimated that 60 persons were

killed and many wounded. The civil war extends throughout the country with all but two of the provinces supporting Premier Wytos against Marshal Pilsudski, who occupied Warsaw today. The province of Villna and Grodno are supporting Marshal Pilsudski.

Pilsudski's troops stormed and captured the Warsaw citadel comprised of police headquarters and the bar-racks. General Sikorski is said to be leading the troops against the Pilsudski forces.

Fighting was reported to have begun this afternoon at Dublin, 95 miles southeast of here.
