WASHINGTON, May 6-"Our nation can maintain its existence only through the adherence to the eternal verities of religion," President Coolidge told the board of bishops of the Methodist church here today, on their quadriennial visit to the white house "Our government is founded upon the basic truth of religious thought," the president said, "and these truths must be continually borne in mind, if our nation is to be preserved."

"If we are to maintain our national existence, we must continue to cherish and foster this spirit which underlies and pervades all enduring achievements," the president said.

"So long as we adhere to these eetrnal verifies of religion we shall not fail to keep that inspiration which has carried us through nearly 50 years.

From the evidence left behind, prison au-thorities reconstructed the jail break and decided that seven convicts had assailed Deputy Warden Peter M. Klein in his office, stabbed him to death, then kidnaped John Keeley, a guard, and forced him to aid them in their escape under threats of death. The convicts marched Keeley to the garage where they commandered the garage where they commandered Keeley's auto and threw open the prison gates for the motor car to drive out to freedom with seven A trusty, John Cassiday, was em-ployed as chauffeur. Keeley and Cassiday were forced to accompany the fugitives until they reached Mar seilles, where they were unloaded and handcuffed to a tree with Kee-ley's handcuffs. Keeley and Cassi-day were found this morning. In the shooting affray at Lenore, more than 100 shots were exchanged, and when it ended, two of the convicts were picked up.
