SENATE LURES MEMBERS OF LOWER HOUSE

By WILLIAM J. McEVROY, United Press Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON, May 6.—The lure of the senate! Every election year, without exception, numerous members of the house who enjoy firmly cemented seats in the lower body, are attracted by the glamour of senatorial togs. In almost all cases, the house members who labor for a transfer to the upper body have established enviable records and valuable pres-

tige and could hold their seats with little difficulty. But yet they court political disaster by seeking senate places. In the coming November elections an even dozen house members will be found reaching out for senate places. Four members have already announced formally that they will run while similar announcements are expected from the others in a short time.

Enjoy Berths. Nearly all of the 12 members hold high places in the councils of their respective parties and enjoy berths on major committees. Some of them, in case of a death or a change or control, would be elevated to chairmanship posts, thereby increasing their standing.

Should they be successful in their campaigns for the senate, these 12 house members would become members of the "freshman" group, and in all probability be awarded places on minor committees.

The reason why members of the house have forfeited their high standing in the lower body and placed their political future at stake for a seat in the senate has never been either explained or solved. Some observers advance the theory that the six-year term has considerable attraction, while others believe the added prestige a senator has is responsible.

Arizona Man. The house members who are out for the senate this year have served terms in the lower body ranging from 16 years down to four years. Representative Carl Hayden, democrat, Arizona, is rounding out eight terms and has his eye on the seat

now held by Senator Cameron, republican. Representative Vare, republican, Pennsylvania, also has been in the house for 16 years, but is now seeking a place in the senate.

Other house members who plan to run for the senate and their terms of service in the house follow: Representative Bankhead, Alabama, five terms; Representative Barkley, democrat, Kentucky, seven terms; Representative Dickinson, republican, Iowa, four terms; Representative Hawes, democrat, Missouri, three terms; Representative Hill, republican, Maryland, three terms; Representative Jacobstein, democrat, New York, two terms; Representative Lineberger, republican, California, three terms; Representative Vaile, republican, Colorado, four terms; Representative T. Webber Wilson, democrat, Mississippi, two terms; Representative Riley J. Wilson, democrat, Louisiana.

Follow Father. In planning to seek a seat in the senate, Representative Bankhead has a desire to follow the footsteps of his father, who held seats in both houses.

Of the 96 senators, 29 have served terms in the house ranging from 16 to one. Senator Gillet, republican, Massachusetts, who was speaker for four years, served 32 years in the lower body before seeking a senate place. In the senate, both senators from seven states have at one time or another been members of the house.

The comparison of senators who have had house service and vice versa is odd. But one member of the present house—Representative Burton, republican, Ohio, has been a member of the senate.

Senator Glass, democrat, Virginia, has the distinction of being the only man on Capitol Hill who has been a member of both house and the cabinet. He served as secretary of treasury during the Wilson administration.

Hard To Secure Divorce In Paris Justice Declares

By United Press. PARIS, May 5.—The famous "divorce mill" of Paris has not been working overtime after all, at least in the year 1925, according to statistics gathered by the Ministry of Justice.

Prominence has been given to the divorces granted by the Paris courts simply because the parties concerned belonged to very wealthy families, lawyers here assert. The official spokesmen pointed out that, although 49,414 Americans obtained identity cards in Paris in 1925, only 120 divorces between American citizens were pronounced.

The proportion of divorces between French citizens is much greater. This is given as proof that it is not laxity of procedure which induces Americans to come here for the purpose of having their marriages dissolved but rather the rapidity and secrecy of the divorce proceedings in the Paris

courts. The secrecy was especially evidenced in the case of the Valentino divorce, even the officials of the courts being unaware when the divorce of Monsieur and Madame Guglielmi was pronounced, that one of the parties was the famous film actor.

Frederic Allain, a Paris lawyer who has had long experience in legal tangles interesting Americans, explained that in reality it is no easier for an American to obtain a divorce in Paris than it would be in the State from which he or she comes. The reason for the divorce must be one justified by the legislation of that state. Thus a person from the State of New York seeking a divorce in Paris must prove infidelity. Persons from American States which do not permit divorce cannot obtain one here.

"What is important here," he added, "is that the law of 1880 forbids the newspapers to give details of the divorce proceedings in the Paris

strict. They must be residents of Paris, although the law does not specify for how long a period. Both parties must accept the competence of the French courts. Thus, there cannot be forced consent on the part of husband or wife. The motive invoked by the person bringing the suit must be one which is valid in the state wherein he or she habitually resides or in which the marriage was celebrated."

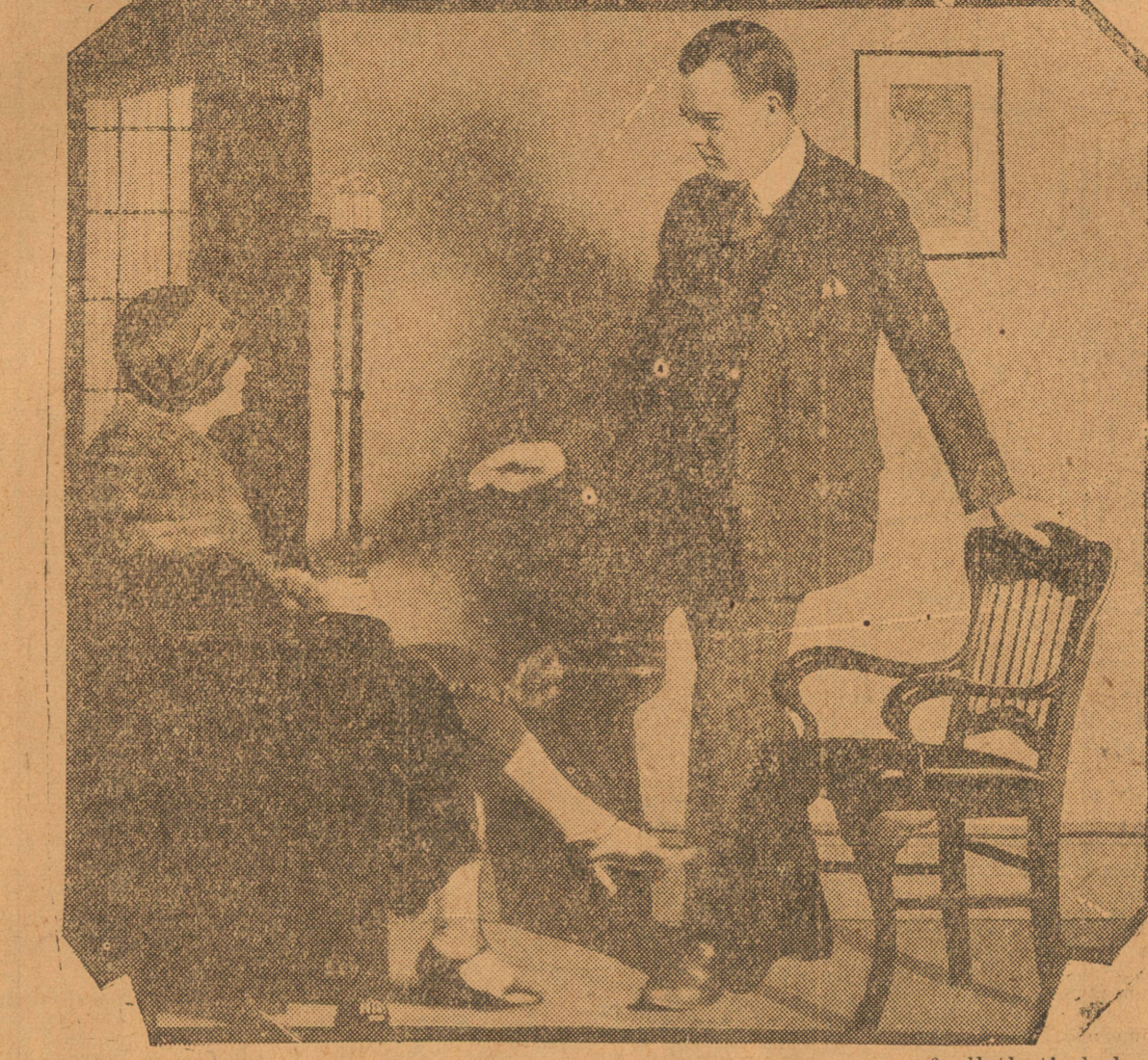
