NEW YORK, June 2.—Efforts to raise the sunken Hudson river steamer Washington Irving were forgotten today and all energies were concentrated on a search for Mrs. Lynn Arthur Hoag and her 3-year-old daughter unaccounted for hours after the boat sank yesterday morning. After the excitement of the rescue of the 200 passengers and more than 100 members of the crew of the Washington Irving had subsided, Bettie and Arthur Hoag, aged 7 and 5 respectively, were found crying for their mother.

**Tax Reduction Will Be Sought By New Joker** By United Press. WASHINGTON, June 2.—A plea for a new tax reduction based on reports of huge surplus accumulated in the treasury, was made in the senate today, by Senator Copeland, democrat of New York. "If reports are true there will be a large surplus in the treasury," Copeland said, "so why shouldn't we have a reduction in income tax," he demanded. He served notice that he would ask the finance committee to report on the matter.

**CHARLES BRYAN 18 Charles Bryan And Skull Cap Parts Company** By United Press. OMAHA, June 2.—After nineteen years of constant association, Charles Bryan and his famous skull cap have parted company. Bryan, Democratic vice presidential nominee in 1924, and former governor of Nebraska, was rarely seen without his cranial decoration during the entire nineteen years. He wore it constantly during the hectic democratic national convention in New York. "I considered the skullcap a necessity for many years," Bryan explained. "The nerves in my head were injured many years ago by my sitting in the sunlight and it affected my sight. "Even when sitting under a brilliant electric light these nerves have been affected. "But I figured they had had a score of years of rest and I ought to try to get my head hardened. I keep the cap in my pocket for emergencies but I very seldom use it any more.

**Calles Signs Law Limiting Number Mexican Priests** By United Press. MEXICO CITY, June 2.—President Calles has signed the law regulating article 130, which limits the number of priests in the federal districts and federal territories. The law also provides that extraordinary powers be added to the article in the penal code establishing a penalty for offenses. Foreign clergymen or others not authorized to exercise the functions of the ministry are liable for a fine of from five to 500 pesos, or to terms of imprisonment of from one month to two years.

**EDUCATION** An educated man is heir to the world. The time has long since passed that a man or woman can make a good living without an education. The flying machine, the dirigible, the radio and the automobile, together with the various other time and labor saving devices has made it necessary for men and women to be trained to fight the battle of life. They must be trained physically, mentally and spiritually, the trio form a strong chain when properly linked together and welded in the school-rooms of the nation. The parent that takes his child out of the schoolroom before it has finished the course is robbing that child of its heritage. The keynote of Americanism is education. Parents owe it to the child to give it the best education they can afford. An education puts the child of the wage earner on the same plane as that of the employer or millionaire. In giving a child an education, the parent is giving that child something that cannot be taken away from it. Even though the educated child loses its heritage in money, it is equipped to enter the battle again, whereas the child that is uneducated cannot, but must be satisfied to be a drawer of water and hewer of wood. The nation, state, county and municipality owe it to the rising generations that they be given an opportunity to obtain an education. They owe them good schools and colleges. They owe them opportunities to secure vocational training along with mental and physical. The institutions of learning that are supported by the state must be free from sectarian or secular training. Religious training should be left to the home and church. However, only men and women with the highest moral character should be employed. The teacher should set the example in right-living for the pupil to follow. The salaries for teachers and trainers of youth should be large enough to insure them a living and to attract the right kind of talent. It appears to us that a school teacher ought to be worth as much as a plasterer or bricklayer. Trained minds should be worth as much as trained hands, especially so since the cost of training the mind is much higher than that of training the hand. Character builders should be worth as much as house builders. The teacher must do both, he must train the hand as well as the mind, while the parent and pastor should reach the heart. Preachers should be placed in the same class as teachers. They are teachers. The average member of the church requires an educated man for a preacher. The average church member wants his pastor to be a super-man, spiritually and other wise, and yet want that preacher demands a salary sufficient for him to properly dress and feed himself and family, there is a howl. Preachers are spiritual leaders and much is required of them. They are subject to more criticism than any other set of men known, and receive proportionately less pay than most mechanics, almost as little as the day laborer. That is the trouble with the world today. The average person expects more from the teachers and preachers than they pay for. Neither profession pays enough salary to attract brilliant minds. Almost daily men are deserting the schoolroom and the pupil to enter other lines. Wouldn't it be nice if you could wear a pair of new shoes a few days before putting them on? ### Farm Leaders From 40 States Meet In Gotham

NEW YORK, June 2.—Farm leaders and representatives of 40 states gathered here today in the heart of the nation's greatest city to plan a back-to-the-land movement.

The national farm school conference attended by more than 3,000 agricultural leaders and educators began a five day meeting to discuss here the dangers of urban over-population and to devise means of replacing the present exodus from farm to city with a movement of the country's youth from city to farm.

The conference was called in answer to a demand that agriculture be made more efficient and that city youth be shown how to take advantage of all resources for securing a free education in the fundamentals of agriculture.

Mayors of 50 of the largest cities in the country have also named their special appointees to represent the cities. These delegates will make a study of the solutions offered, and co-operate with the national farm school at Doylestown, Pa., which trains boys and girls from 16 to 21 years of age in farming and sends them out to farms equipped to work.

Supplementing the conference, a mass meeting has been arranged for the evening of June 6 at Carnegie hall. Various measures of governmental farm relief, now before congress, will be discussed by legislators.

Senators Wheeler, Harrison, and Capper have expressed their intention of attending.

### U. S. Steel Spends Millions For Welfare Work

NEW YORK, June 1.—Twenty years of organized accident prevention in the plants of the United States Steel Corporation has saved 46,000 men from death or serious injury, has averted accidents which would have disabled 322,000 other workmen, and has resulted in a saving of money, according to the 1926 report of the Steel Corporation's Bureau of Safety, Sanitation and Welfare, made public here today.

The report stated the corporation has spent \$158,000,000 for safety, sanitation and welfare in the last fourteen years, the largest item being \$45,000,000 for the relief of injured employees and of the families of employees killed. From 1912 to 1926 the corporation spent \$31,700,000 for sanitation, \$28,000,000 for playgrounds, schools, clubs, gardens, visiting nurses, and similar activities, \$15,000,000 for accident prevention, \$13,000,000 in pensions, and \$22,000,000 for the employees' stock subscription plan.

### Moses To Have Opposition In New Hampshire

CONCORD, N. H., June 2.—New Hampshire's political campaign, involving the question of whether U. S. Senator George H. Moses is to be returned for a third term, is getting under way.

The Republican state primary election will be held on Sept. 7. Because New Hampshire is a Republican state by a substantial majority there is little question but that Senator Moses, if renominated, will be elected in November.

His opponent at the primary will be Robert P. Bass, former governor

and recently a member of legislature from Peterboro. Bass represents the progressive wing of the Republican party; Moses, the "regular" Republican.

Bass was governor in 1911 and 1912 and was one of the "seven little governors" who in 1912 memorialized Theodore Roosevelt to be a candidate for the Presidency. In that campaign, Bass quit the G. O. P. and was titular head of the Progressive party in this state and its candidate for U. S. Senator in 1917. When the Progressive party collapsed, he returned to the Republican fold and was elected to the legislature as recently as 1923.

Senator Moses always has been a straight-party man. He was first elected to the senate to succeed Dr. Jacob H. Gallinger in 1918 and served the remainder of the latter's term. In 1920 he was re-elected for a full term, which he is now completing.

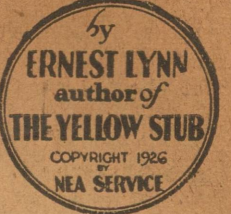
