They plan to spend two and one-half months in idling around the United States before sailing for the Orient from San Francisco.

Coolidge to Speak.

President Coolidge will deliver the principal oration at the unveiling of principal oration at the unveiling of the new John Ericson memorial in Potomac park, on May 29 at 3 p. m. Crown Prince Gustavus Adolphus, who will attend as the representa-tive of the inventor's native country, will make a short address in English, while Crown Princess Louise will of-ficiate at the actual unveiling of the ficiate at the actual unveiling of the monument. The sculptor is James Earle Fraser, the designer of the buffalo nickel. All proceedings will be broadcast by radio.

According to the program, announced by Congressman Chindblom of Illinois, chairman of the John Ericson memorial committee, a preliminary concert will be given and the American Union of Swedish Singers will render several selections, while the music will be furnished by the United States navy band and the United States marine band.




