## ALABAMA CONVICTS STAGE RIOT IN MINE

### INFURIATED MEN HURL DYNAMITE AT 2 FELLOWS

Investigation Shows Two Unfortunates, Sick Sent To Work

**BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 30.**—Details of a riot at Flat Top prison mine yesterday when 40 infuriated convicts sought to kill two check runners by hurling sticks of dynamite at them came to light today as officials inquired into the disorders there. Whitey Freeman and Tom Tucker, who had given testimony before the grand jury investigating the alleged cruelty to prisoners in favor of the prison officials, were the intended victims. Both Freeman and Tucker are trustees. As the grand jury resumed its investigation here, it was learned that it was considering ordering the body of a negro and a white convict, said to have died from beatings in the mine, exhumed. In the visit to the prison hospital yesterday, the investigators were said to have found a convict with his feet swollen three times their normal size as a result of an infection, who had been ordered to return to work today. Another white convict with legs affected refused to enter the mines and begged that he be killed to end his miseries. The grand jury ordered him sent to the hospital.

### ANOTHER OIL FIRE RAGES IN CALIFORNIA

**BAKERSFIELD, Calif., April 30.**—Another huge oil fire, the third in California within a month, raged unchecked today in the Standard Oil company's storage field near here. A reservoir with 500,000 barrels of crude oil was a mass of flames and 16 other tanks each containing a half million barrels of oil also, were imperiled by the blaze. The fire, like those at Brea and San Osipe, a month ago, was started by a flash of lightning.

### FURTHER DESTRUCTION BELIEVED AVERTED

Further destruction from the big oil fire in the Standard Oil Company's storage field near here was believed averted today. The fire was still confined to the one huge tank in the center of the field at 10:30 o'clock this morning. Oil men were directing an army of 400 workers and were confident it would spread no further. The blazing tank which contained a half million barrels of crude oil when it was fired by a bolt of lightning last night has been given up. It will cost \$250,000 to rebuild the reservoir, and it is estimated that at least half of the oil would be destroyed before the blaze burned itself out making the total loss \$500,000.

### Prices Of Gas Jumped In East Cent On Gallon

**NEW YORK, April 30.**—Gasoline prices throughout the greater part of the Eastern territory and much of the Middle West have been advanced from a cent to a cent and a half a gallon. The Standard Oil company, the Texas company, the Pan-American Petroleum and Transportation company and the Gulf Oil company announced increased amount to a cent a gallon in most of the territory served by them, and in some of the territory the advances amounted to a cent and a half.

### Three Inspectors Are at Work On Mail Robbery

**LA FAYETTE, Ind., April 30.**—Three postal inspectors were here today investigating a \$100,000 mail robbery which has been kept under cover for a week. Two sacks of registered mail were taken from a truck at the Big Four railroad station here while awaiting shipment to Indianapolis. Although the mail was taken a week ago today, the theft was kept a secret in the hopes of aiding the search for the robbers.

### PLANS ARE LAID TO CALL EXTRA LEGISLATURE

Representative M. H. **GARFIELD, N. J., April 30.**—Sheriff G. P. Nimmo, surrounded by 75 special deputies, county policemen on motorcycles and regular city police, today padlocked the Belmont Park hall here and denied entrance to more than 2,000 striking textile workers who went to the hall to attend a mass meeting.

### SHERIFF USES NINE TAILS ON BACK OF A MAN

Witnesses Enjoy The Scene In Jail; Women are Delighted

**BALTIMORE, Md., April 30.**—James Kingsmore, a convicted wife-beater, went to the whipping post in the Baltimore city jail today. Four women stood among the crowd of 150 spectators who watched Sheriff Potts lay five lashes with a cat-o-nine-tails across the prisoner's back. Kingsmore's bare back reddened but there were no wails. When he was taken down from the whipping post he collapsed from nervousness. "I did not mind taking my medicine," he told his jailers, as they locked his hands around the whipping post, "but I do not think you ought to make a circus of it." Kingsmore referred to the crowd that had gathered in the corridor of the jail to watch the infliction of the flogging sentence. The four women, who were among the spectators, said they enjoyed the whipping, that "it was fine, and there ought to be more of them."

### ENGLAND IS FACING COAL STRIKE

**LONDON, April 30.**—Approximately 1,000,000 miners and workers in close associated callings were ready today to plunge Great Britain into an industrial war, if the efforts of the union leaders, mine owners and politicians fail to find a settlement of the coal dispute before midnight tonight. The eyes of Great Britain were on Premier Baldwin, who was understood to be hesitating to employ the one sure means of averting a simultaneous strike and lockout. That means would be the continuation of the government subsidy to the coal industry, which since it was first granted in August of last year, has cost the treasury approximately \$102,000,000.

### CALIFORNIA DAM BREAKS, FLOODS LAND

**DELANO, Cal., April 30.**—Scores of ranches between Porterville and Delano were covered by a flood early today when the Quinn dam near Porterville burst as a result of flood waters caused by warm weather. Many ranchers fled before the rushing waters, some in their night clothes. In some places water was ten feet deep. Highways were covered by several feet of water. The damage will run into thousands of dollars. No reports of loss of life.

### 9 Balloons Are In Air After Trophy

**LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 30.**—Nine balloons and their crews, entrants in the national elimination sweepstakes for the Litchfield trophy, were all believed to be riding a swift breeze in a northeasterly course today through Southeastern Missouri and Southwestern Illinois, hoping for new records. The balloons have been in the air over thirteen hours with none yet reported down. The bags took off from here at 4:36 o'clock Thursday afternoon, when the pilot balloon, "Sky Lark," was officially released by H. A. Lambert, St. Louis, referee. A crowd of 20,000 witnessed the start.

### ANOTHER WELL SPUDS IN NEAR DISCOVERY SITE

There is a flutter of excitement in Ranger oil circles today due to the spudding in late Thursday of a well in the same vicinity and what is believed to be essentially the same structure as the discovery well in the Ranger territory. The new test is on the Hodges heirs' property and is being drilled by the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company, the same concern which brought in the first well in 1918 and is within about a mile of the city of Ranger. McCleskey No. 1, as the discovery well was called, set the world by its ears at the time and was the forerunner of one of the most tremendous oil booms known to history, carrying the name of Ranger, "city of flowing gold," all over the world. This well started out with gusher proportions but, for some reason the public has never seemed to get quite clear in its mind, was spoiled and closed. And, strange to say, for the past five years, not a drill had been started in its vicinity until yesterday. The drilling is being done with a standard rig. The well was down 150-feet at noon Friday. No announcement is made as to the depth it is intended to drill, but the fact that a standard rig is being used indicates a deep test. The rig is in plain sight of portions of the city and is already a cynosure of many eyes. Talk has already started of a revival of oil activities akin to the old days, though the company drilling the well is not holding out any such glittering prospects.

### DISPUTE OVER HOLDING MONEY IS NOT SETTLED

Treasurer Doubts Authority Of The Attorney General

**AUSTIN, April 30.**—The controversy between the attorney general and the treasury department over whether or not warrants issued to the Sherman-Youman's Construction Company aggregating \$21,666.68 for road maintenance work in Harris and Galveston counties are to be paid pending the suits brought against the road construction for the cancellation of the company's contract with the State Highway Department, was far from settlement today. State Treasurer W. G. Hatcher made it clear that he will not follow the advice given by the assistant Attorney General Ernest May that payment should be withheld on the grounds that such payment is not authorized by law because the attorney has facts which lead him to believe that the defendant, the Sherman-Youmans Construction Company had been over-paid on their topping contract, approximately \$21,000 more than the amount sued for in their petition for the cancellation of the contract.

### FRANCE PUTS SIGNATURE ON ACCORD

**PARIS, France, April 30.**—The French cabinet today approved the debt funding agreement signed yesterday in Washington by the American debt commissioners on behalf of the United States and by French Ambassador Henri Berenger. France did not make all the concessions in reaching the agreement, Finance Minister Surrert announced, following the cabinet's meeting. The government tonight will issue a full statement in order to indicate the terms of the accord in the most definite manner, so that there will no longer be doubts in the minds of the public.

**SAN ANTONIO, April 30.**—Captured by two men while she was walking on an errand, blind folded and forced into an auto and driven about the city, Isabel Mejarez, 15 years old, forcefully resisted her abductors' advances and finally was rescued by a motorist and taken to her home.

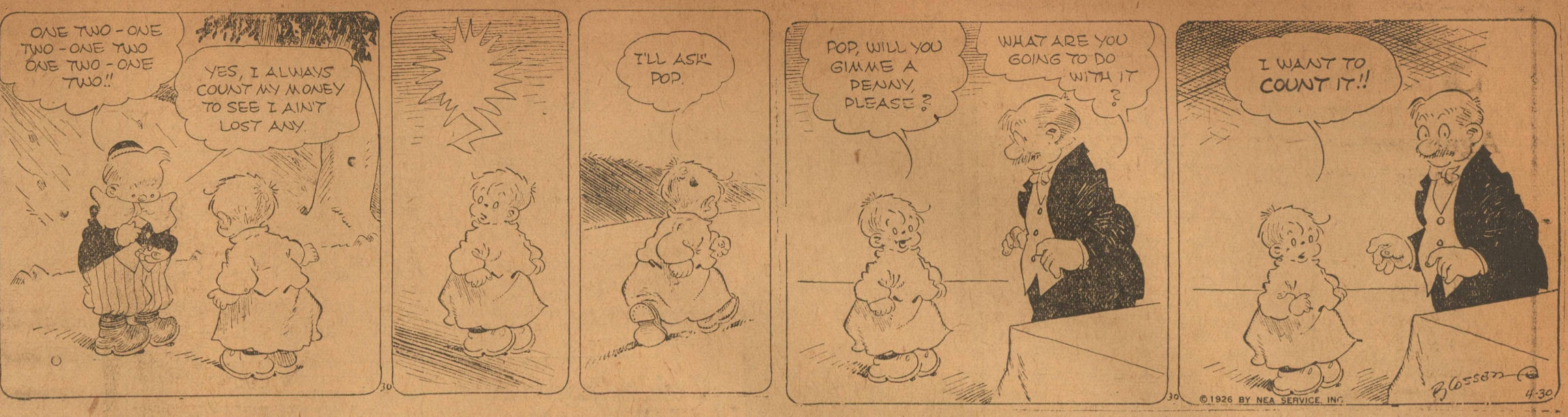

## 'Mags' and 'Dynamos' Promise Fans The Real Old Article

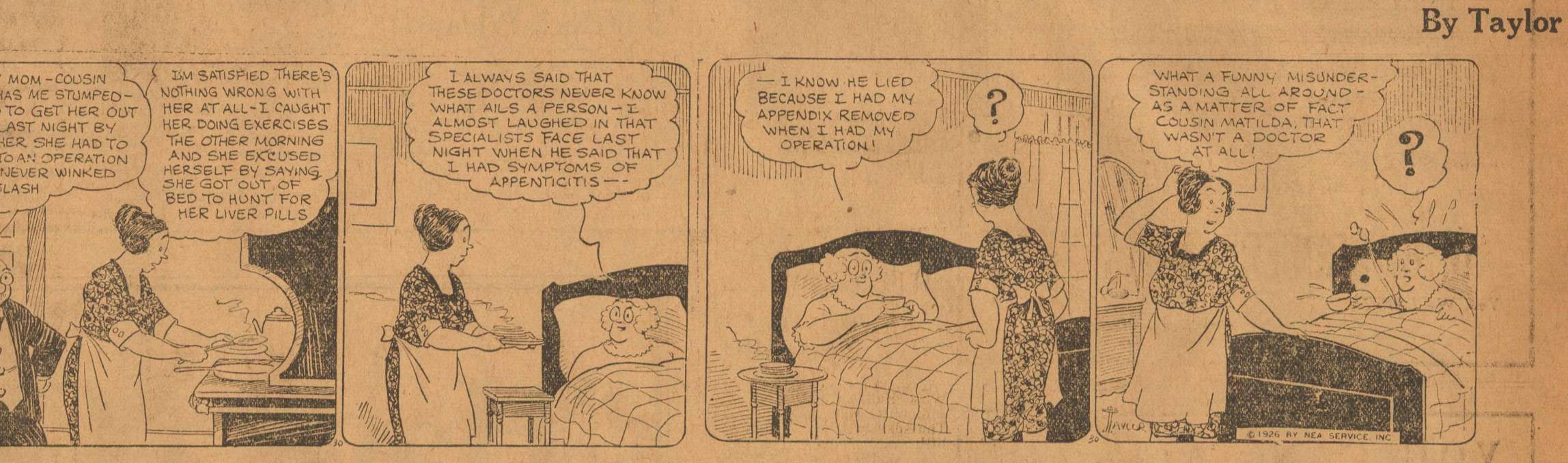

## SCIENTISTS OF SWEDEN STUDY BIRDS

By United Press.  
**GOTENBURG, Sweden.**—The mysterious ways of the birds in the air and the fish in the sea are now subjected to a systematic study by Swedish scientists. What routes the birds of passage follow at the end of each season and where the schools of fish come from as well as why they swim in certain directions are some of the problems investigated. The bird study is under the direction of the National Museum of Stockholm. During the past fifteen years it has sent out thousands of little aluminum rings to be placed about the legs of all kinds of birds while still in the fledging state. This is done by foresters, farmers, teachers and amateur naturalists of all kinds. Each ring is marked in English, "Please return to Riks Museum, Stockholm," and when the birds are either killed, captured, or found dead, the rings are sent back in great numbers from Germany, Denmark, Norway, France, Spain, Portugal, Switzerland and Italy, so that the routes of the various species of birds can be traced. The study of the movements of such fish as herring, haddock, and flounder, was a direct economic value, aiding the fishermen in their work. By observing the number of fry on the hatching banks for each season the scientists can forecast, for instance, how large the catch is going to be a certain number of years in advance. The varying salt contents of the water has also been found to have direct effect on the size of the haddock schools, just as the herring have been found to follow a certain kind of crustacean on which it feeds. By radio the fishermen are now informed where the best fish are to be found.

However, Captain Knight will not be able to play at second on account of his game-foot holdover from Tuesday.

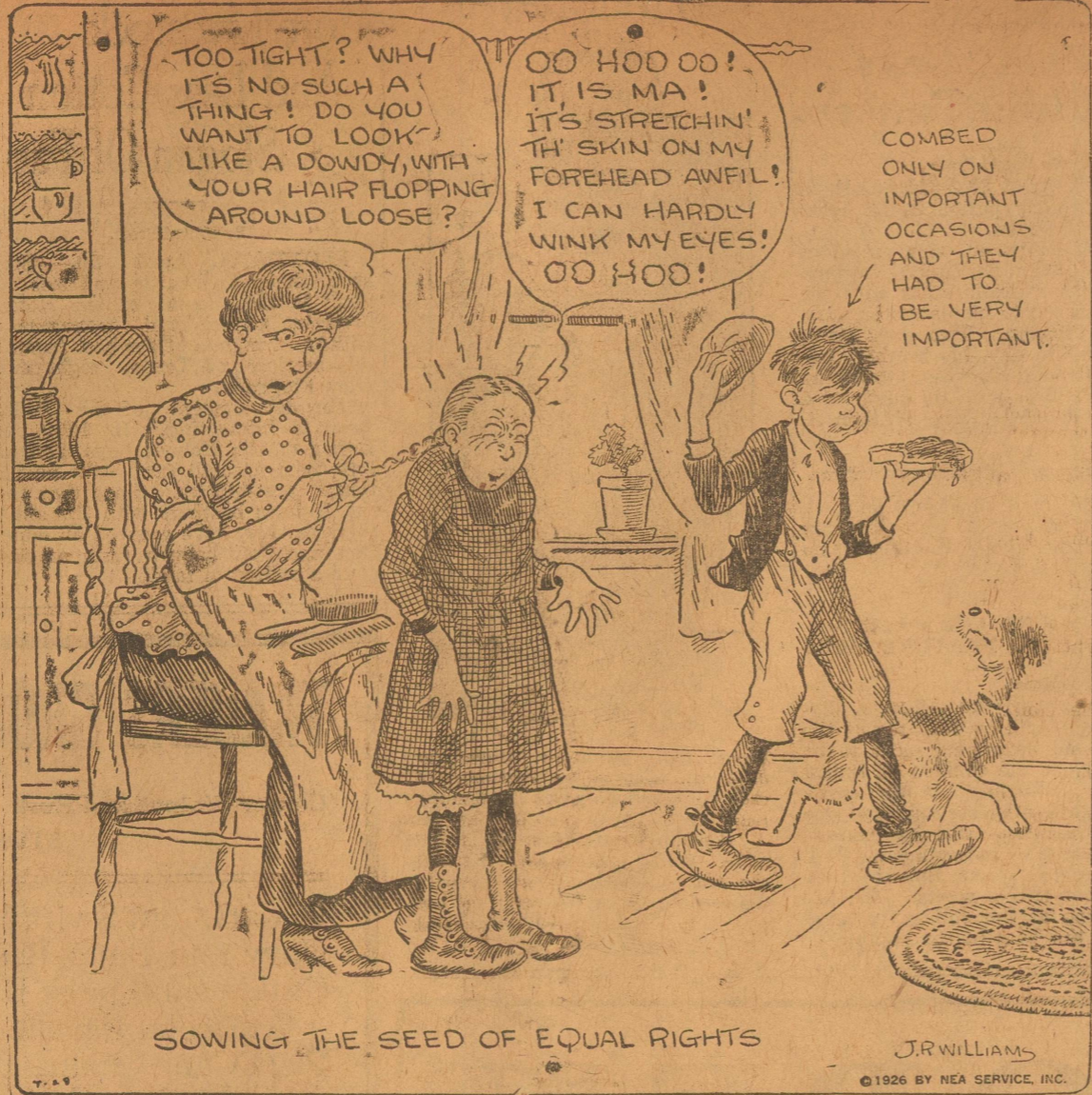
### Commonwealth College Ends Third Year Of Existence

Special Correspondence.  
 MENA, Ark., April 2.—Commonwealth College, a school whose students and teachers put on overalls and work side by side four hours each day for their room and board, completed its third academic year on April 17.

As the term ended on the college's 320-acre farm in the Arkansas Ozarks, students from the fields and factories of a dozen states left for New York, St. Louis, Salt Lake City, Chicago, and other places to work until school begins on Oct. 2. Some of these young men and women will "hitch-hike"—that is alternately walk and pick up rides on the highway—for 2,000 miles.

Commonwealth is a school for young workers and farmers. The college is a part of the rapidly grow-

ing workers' education movement and has adopted an unusual plan to bring education within the reach of those who must work while they learn. Money won't pay for room, board, or laundry service at Cor-

monwealth College. Every student earns them by ploughing the college farm, building dormitories or preparing meals.

"Overall Democracy" The school community is a sort of "overall democracy," for teachers do industrial work along side their students. The industrial manager is a 25-year-old preparatory student with ten years' experience in farm and carpentry work, and it is not uncommon to see student foremen showing teacher subordinates how to pick cotton, stretch fence, or wait tables.

Forty or fifty students will have the opportunity for self-support next year. Commonwealth is developing its farm and is building up small shops—a cannery, shingle mill, saw-mill, etc.—to provide work for a larger number. The school aims to raise most of its own food and to derive an income from the shops to meet other expenses, thereby becoming completely self-maintaining.

Pioneer conditions still prevail on the Commonwealth farm, but students cheerfully reconcile themselves to drawing water at a spring, studying by kerosene lamps, and tasting butter but two or three times a week. Organized athletics do not exist. The dining hall, where the Saturday evening dance is held, and the swimming hole in the nearby mountain stream are the college social centers.

"Prexy" Has Several Jobs William Edward Zeuch, who has studied at four universities and

taught at four more, is education's director. He came from the economic department of the University of Illinois three years ago to help found Commonwealth. He teaches economic theory, makes blackberry jam, butchers hogs, and is now building his own house.


The ten other instructors come from the fields of teaching, law, engineering, and from other professional work. Courses are given in economics, sociology, history, psychology, English, public speaking, law, physical science, mathematics, languages, stenography, and several other subjects. A collegiate course of three years and a preparatory course of two years are offered.

A council which assists the school in an advisory capacity includes United States Senator Frazier of North Dakota, James A. Phillips, vice president of the Order of Railway Conductors, Albert E. Coyle, editor of the Locomotive Engineers' Journal, and Miriam Van Waters, referee of the Los Angeles juvenile court.

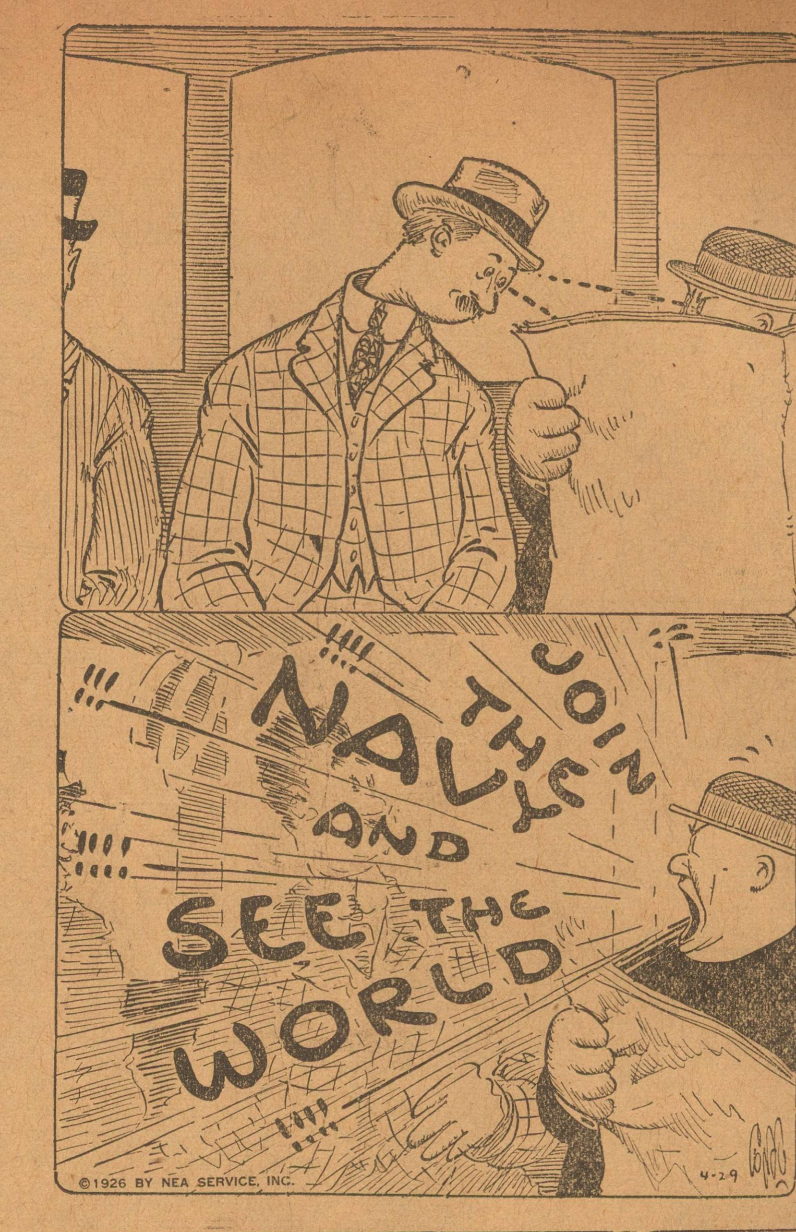
He sat on one of the small folding seats, and with great care turned his back to Nona. Morton sat in the middle, between the two girls.

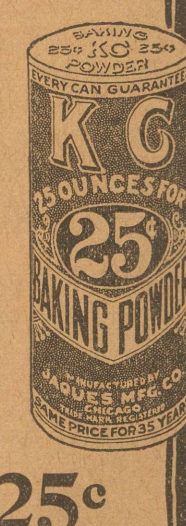

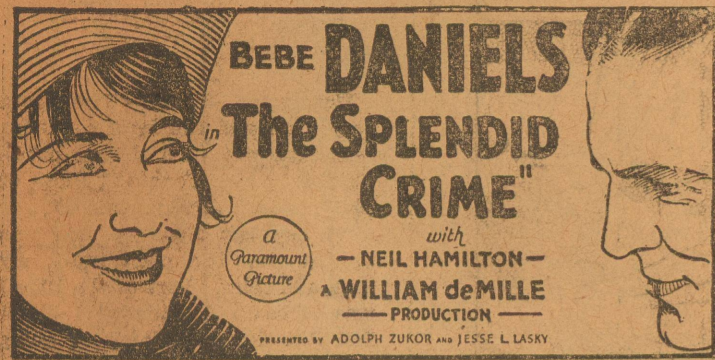

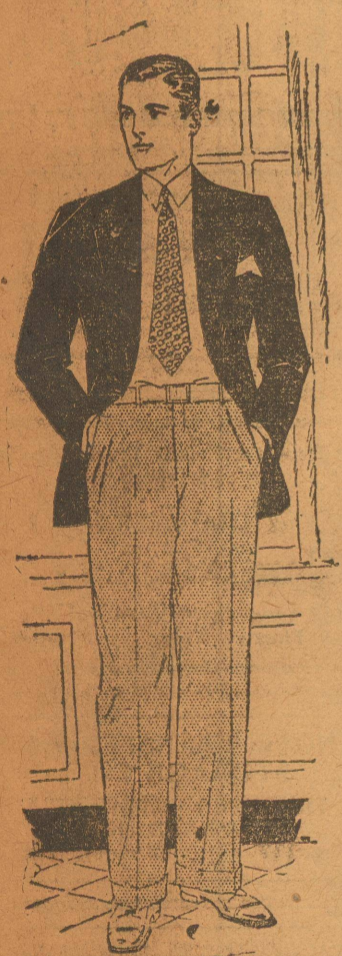
