FRENCH PROPOSALS ARE UNSATISFACTORY

SOUTHERN POWER COMPANIES GETS LEASE ON MUSCLE SHOALS

SUPPLEMENTAL SCHOOL APPROPRIATION

MARRS TO URGE LEGISLATION TO AID EDUCATION

Special Session If Cal-
led May Be Busy on
Highway Questions.

AUSTIN, April 26.—In the event the governor calls a special session of the legislature to validate the highway bonds, State Superintendent of Public Instruction S. M. N. Marrs will urge that she submit the subject of a supplemental appropriation for the state available school funds to increase the per capita school apportionment to \$15 per capita.

If the supplemental appropriation is made, it should be done as early as practicable, Marrs said today.

He warned that if the per capita appropriation is allowed to drop to \$12 per head next year, the school districts must meet the conditions in the following ways:

Increase the local maintenance tax.
Reduce the length of the term.
Reduce salaries or the number of teachers.

It is not known whether or not the special session will be called. The governor has the matter under consideration, and it is understood that she is calling into conference some of the leading lawyers on constitutional law in Texas before she will make her decision.

It is also understood that nothing else but the validating question will be considered.

RESCUE PARTY HOPS OFF FOR POINT BARROW

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, April 26.—Bent on locating Captain George Wilkins and Pilot Ellison, who have been gone for eleven days on a flying trip to Point Barrow, which should have taken only a few hours, the monoplane Detrioteer of the Wilkins Arctic expedition was scheduled to take off here today.

Wilkins and Ellison left here on April 15 carrying supplies to Point Barrow, 520 miles distant, for the proposed Arctic flight. No definite word has been heard from them since their departure.

LEE SETTLE DIES FROM INJURIES

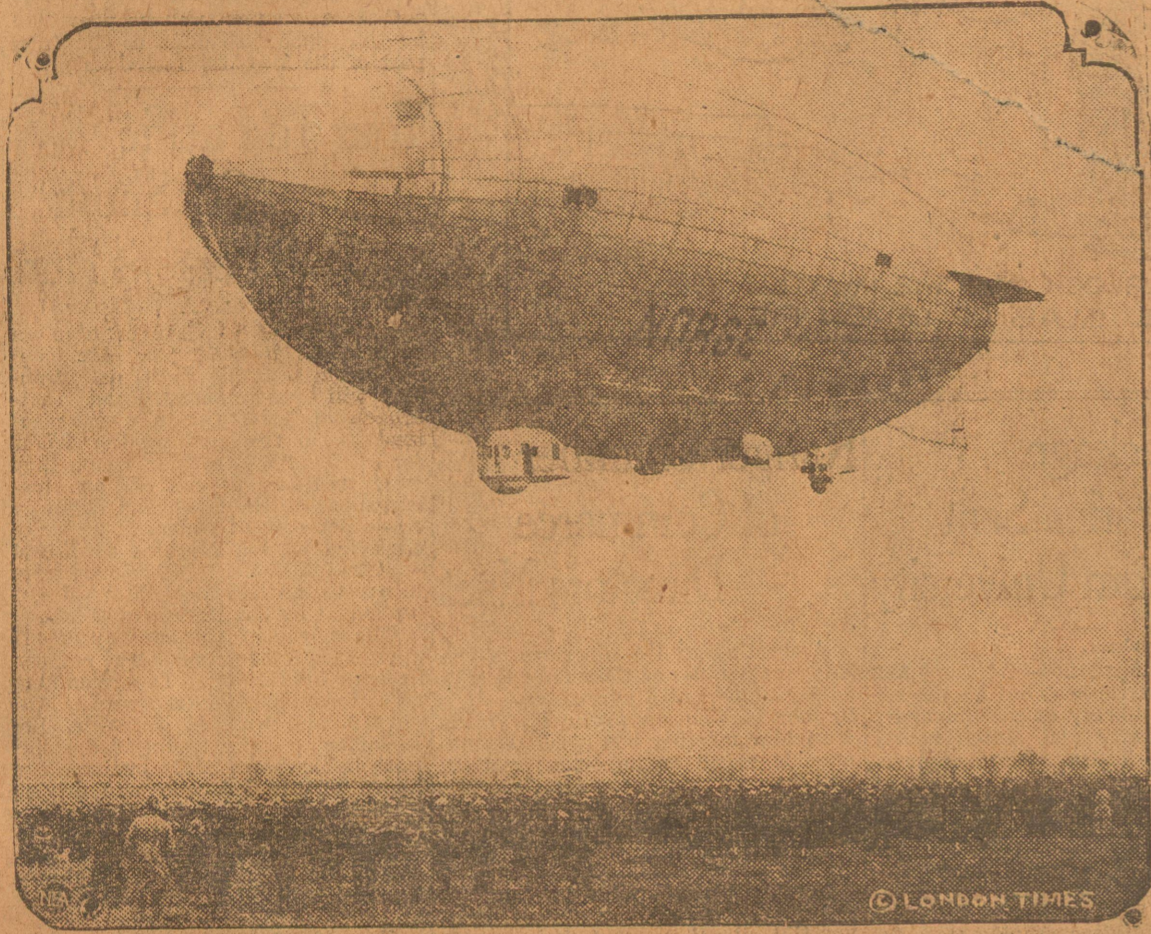
Lad Caught Racing Down Main Street, Made to Pay Fine

France and Spain May Make Peace With the Rifians

PARIS, April 26.—Peace between the Rifians, France and Spain in Morocco emerged from the realm of improbabilities today when announcement was made at Quai d'Orsay that France and Spain had waived Rifian acceptance of preliminary terms, first presented to Emir Abd-El-Krim's representative a week ago Sunday.

Efforts to obtain peace on new terms will begin to be made today or tomorrow, according to the announcement made here.

SENATE RATIFIES SETTLEMENT OF BELGIUM DEBT

WASHINGTON, April 26.—The \$417,780,000 Belgium debt settlement was ratified by the Senate late today without great opposition. The Democrats joined the administration group in voting for its ratification.

The total debt is divided into two sections, the pre-armistice debt of \$171,780,000 and the post-armistice debt of \$243,000,000. Both were funded over a period of 62 years.

The division is made to grant Belgium repayment of the pre-armistice debt without interest. The post-armistice debt is to be paid with interest bearing bonds, bearing 3 per cent.

Henington Faces Murder Charge For Rock Assault

A charge of murder has been filed in Justice of the Peace J. H. McDonald's court at Cisco against Tom Henington of near Cisco, who waived examining trial and made bond in the sum of \$2,000.

The charges against Henington were filed following the death in a Cisco sanitarium Sunday afternoon of Virgil Maxwell, brother-in-law of Henington, whom Henington is alleged to have hit in the head with a rock at the Henington home last Thursday afternoon, and from the effects of which Maxwell is said to have died.

According to County Attorney W. J. Barnes, who, with Sheriff Bob Edwards, went to Cisco this morning and made an investigation, Henington and Maxwell were at the Henington home in the country some two or three miles south of Cisco, Thursday afternoon when Maxwell got into a quarrel with his sister, who is Henington's wife, and drew his knife. Henington interferred and hit Maxwell in the head with a rock.

Maxwell was taken by Henington to the home of his father and his condition was not thought to be serious, but grew worse and was taken to a Cisco sanitarium where surgeons performed an operation on him in an effort to save his life, but to no avail, as he died a few hours later.

Maxwell, according to the information given the officers, was unconscious for several hours before his death and at no time made any statement about the affair.

SPECIAL BODY FILES REPORT TO CONGRESS

House and Senate Now
Have Final Say on Its
Acceptance of Offer

WASHINGTON, April 26.—The Southern Power companies' joint bid for a lease on Muscle Shoals today was formally accepted by the special congressional leasing committee.

The joint committee in a report to be submitted to both houses recommended that the government's huge nitrate project in Alabama be leased to the 13 affiliated power companies in accordance with their offer.

A large number of bids was submitted by several concerns over the nation. At one time, Henry Ford made a bid on the plant which was rejected. A strong fight has been made in the house and senate to have the plant operated by the government.

The terms of the bid were not made public, but it is understood that the joint bid accepted was the best.

It means a giant power plant to furnish power to practically the entire south, also nitrates at reduced price will be furnished farmers.

The house and senate must pass on the proposal before it is finally accepted.

BERENGER MAY SUBMIT A NEW PLAN TUESDAY

First Five Payments
Are Too Small to Suit
The American Body.

WASHINGTON, April 26.—The French ambassador Henri Berenger, was requested today by the American Debt Funding Commission to revise his offer for settling France's \$4,377,000,000 war debt to the United States.

After the American commission had considered the French proposal for one hour and twenty-five minutes, Secretary of the Treasury Andrew Mellon announced that although discussions were not concluded, Berenger would be advised of the progress made and suggestions to make the proposals acceptable would be offered the ambassador.

The American commission will meet again tomorrow and it is hoped that Berenger will have a supplemental proposition. A demand for better terms from France was expected to be made by the American Debt Funding Commission today at its meeting to consider French ambassador's Berenger's proposal for settling the French war debt to the United States.

After a series of intensive private and informal conferences between members of the commission over the week-end, it was understood a decision was to be reached today to make counter suggestions to Berenger.

The difficulty in the negotiations lie chiefly in France's offer to pay only \$25,000,000 annually for the first five years. The United States desires the payments to start at \$30,000,000 or more and the installments amounts to increase more rapidly than he proposed.

DAN TO OPEN CAMPAIGN AT TAYLOR

AUSTIN, April 26.—As originally planned, Attorney General Dan Moody, will deliver his opening speech in the campaign for governor at Taylor, his home town, instead of at Abilene, as has been erroneously reported in a dispatch from Houston, according to Assistant Attorney General Ernest Mayes.

Late for the opening speech has not been definitely set, but it will be next week, not later than May 8.

4 Legionnaires From Ranger To Go To France

That only four legionnaires have thus far started their fund preliminary to their trip to Europe during the fall of 1927, was stated by W. W. Housewright, active vice president of the Citizens State Bank, Ranger, today. Indications point to a far larger number's signing up for the trip, or at least starting the fund for that purpose, Mr. Housewright said, urging the importance of promptness in making the start.

It will be recalled that monthly deposits of \$3.50, \$5.00, \$7.50 or \$10 (according to class of passage booked) will cover all expenses of the trip including passage money, hotel bills, side trips, etc. Only one bank in each city is designated to receive these deposits, it is stated.

NURSE REFUSES FIEND SHOT IN ARM, ATTACKED

AUSTIN, April 26.—Climbing up a fire escape, a dope fiend broke into the operating room on the fifth floor of the Seton infirmary today, attacked and beat a nurse when she failed to comply with his demands for morphine.

Confronting the nurse, the man demanded he be given a "shot in the arm." When the woman said she would ask the head nurse, he cursed her, knocked her down and escaped by the fire escape.

FAMILY DISPUTE ENDS IN DEATH

CLARENDON, Texas, April 26.—Dick Bates, 60, and Walter Patterson, 26, negroes, were killed here during the night in a gun duel, climaxing a family dispute. Bates ordered Patterson from his home and opened fire with his revolver, which order was not complied with. Patterson returned the fire with fatal effect.

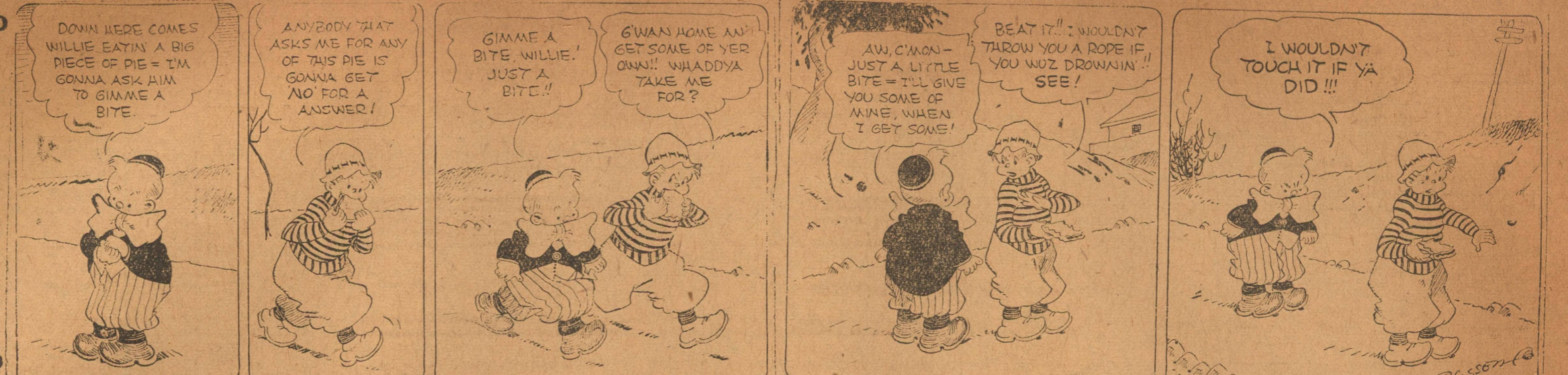

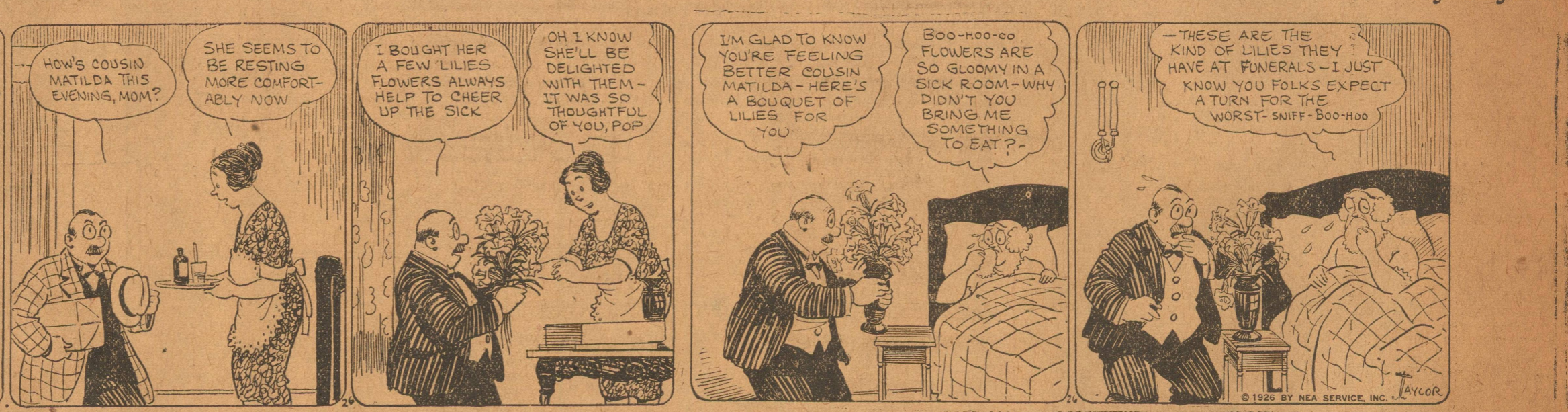
