## HOUSTON WILL ABANDON PRISON FARM

### INVESTIGATION BY GRAND JURY LEADS TO MOVE

### Mayor Suspends Two Guards Following The Probe That Is Now On

HOUSTON, June 10.—In the midst of the grand jury investigation into the conduct of the city prison farm, Mayor Halcombe today announced that the city would abandon the farm Monday. Bids have been asked on the crop already planted, and the successful bidder will take possession Tuesday. Halcombe said in his statement that the prisoners would not work in view of the investigation and that sentences will be served in the city jail in the future.

The probe which resulted in the city abandoning the farm began when Wiley Zeigler, prisoner, was beaten to death. W. T. Hill is under indictment for beating him to death with a blacksnake whip.

Following charges by State Attorney Horace Soule, to the Harris county grand jury, that City Farm Manager Rube Conner had whipped prisoners on the farm, Mayor Halcombe has suspended two other guards at in the institution until after the investigation. The two suspended guards are A. H. Cross and R. L. Steel.

### VALLEY LOT SALE BREAKS ALL RECORDS

BROWNSVILLE, June 10.—Approximately \$500,000 worth of real estate changed hands at the opening of Olmito, the new resort city near here during the morning, sales officials estimated at noon today.

Twenty thousand persons were concentrated on the new site and many camped on their lots during the night, to claim them in the morning.

### Winter Wheat Yield In The Nation Drops

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The condition of the winter wheat on June 1 indicates a crop of 543,300,000 bushels, a decrease of approximately 5,000,000 bushels for the United States, from the forecast of a month ago made by the Department of Agriculture. The announcement was made by the department today.

There has been a decline of more than 13,000,000 bushels in the prospects in Kansas and Nebraska, due to the drought. An improvement of 5,000,000 bushels in Texas is due because of favorable moisture during the growing seasons.

Oklahoma also reports a good increase because of favorable seasons, during the growing period.

Reports from the Panhandle and plains of Texas are to the effect that a bumper yield will be harvested and harvest hands now are in demand.

### WHITTEMORE MUST HANG FOR MURDER

BALTIMORE, Md., June 10.—Richard Reese Whittemore, head of the so-called "Whittemore gang" of New York and Baltimore, jewel robbers, today was sentenced to hang for the murder of Robert Holtman, a prison guard.

Judge Eugene O'Dunne pronounced the sentence in the criminal court. A jury in the same room on May 21 returned a verdict that they found Whittemore guilty of murder in the first degree. The verdict was an unqualified one.

Whittemore killed Holtman on Feb. 20, 1925, when the bandit escaped from the Maryland penitentiary. He struck the guard with a piece of iron pipe. He had been sentenced to the prison a short time before to serve a term of 15 years on a charge of robbery.

### New Orleans Officer Is Held In San Antonio

### PENNSYLVANIA PRIMARY JOLT HIT COOLIDGE

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The senate is still arguing over how the Pennsylvania primary should have been interpreted from their various viewpoints.

Although William S. Vare, wet running on a beer and light wine ticket, won over Senator George Wharton Pepper, a dry supported by the Mellon organization and the administration, and Gov. Gifford Pinchot, more ardent dry—the senate cannot determine to its own satisfaction of all just what the Pennsylvania republican voters meant.

Recent debate over the question in the upper house has added another proof of the futility of interpreting the meaning of any election.

Here's how the opinions vary as their advocates wish them:

Senator Reed, republican, Pennsylvania—It cannot be interpreted as a wet referendum because the total votes of the two dry candidates were greater than the one wet candidate although the wet won. Likewise a dry candidate, John S. Fisher, was at the same time chosen republican gubernatorial candidate, against three wets.

Senator Bruce, Maryland, democrat wet—It is a sweeping wet victory, more sweeping even than the figures indicate because many wets refused to vote for Vare. Many wet laboring men voted for Pinchot and many other wets voted for Pepper. The fact that a dry gubernatorial candidate was chosen does not mean anything because there were state issues involved.

Senator Robinson, democrat leader, Arkansas—Don't forget that Senator Pepper who was defeated went before the voters on his record of support of the administration and asked his constituents to choose him to vindicate the national republican administration.

The senate farm bloc held a recent luncheon to discuss ways and means for adopting agriculture relief legislation which was attended by about a dozen senators. It was supposed to be a "Dutch treat," each one paying his own way.

When the luncheon was over, however, the bill was brought to Senator Gooding, republican, Idaho, long a champion of the farmers.

Gooding raised his eyebrows but paid the check as another contribution to farm relief.

### Indians Re-enact Famous Last Stand Of Custer's Troops

PAWHUSKA, Okla., June 10.—The historical famous last stand of Custer will be re-enacted today by Indians, who are here to the number of 3,000 for the annual pow-wow of the society of Oklahoma Indians.

Singularly, the famous battle of a half a century ago from which the Indians emerged a victor failed to stop the white man from coming into the land of the aborigines of America.

About 200 men were representing Custer's band, while 500 Indians riding madly and dressed in war regalia were circling the mighty amphitheatre north of here effecting a capture.

### Police Unable To Find Ward Gone a Month

TRENTON, N. J., June 10.—Two state police and two bloodhounds have not been able to solve the mystery surrounding the latest "clue" to lead to the whereabouts of Walter S. Ward.

Walter S. Ward, a son of a wealthy family, which made its fortune in the Ward Baking company, disappeared a month ago, and later his auto was found abandoned in Trenton.

Yesterday, a contractor found a carrier pigeon bearing a message signed with one word, "Ward," and saying the writer was held up by kidnapers three miles from Trenton. A thorough search has failed to find him.

### TELEGRAM SAYS DOTY DID DESERT

PARIS, France, June 10.—Gilbert Clare or Bennett Doty, member of the French Foreign legion, who was erroneously reported to have been sentenced to death for desertion, did actually desert the legion in the face of the enemy according to telegrams from Syria.

The telegram says, "Clare deserted before the Druses at Suedia. He was arrested on investigation orders. The investigation may last a month after which he would be court-martialed."

The usual sentence for desertion in the face of the enemy, unless there are extenuating circumstances, is death. It is believed that extenuating circumstances will be found to have influenced Clare.

### Crossing Signal Installation Is Now Reported

### JURY RENDERS A VERDICT IN FAVOR OF BANK

### Money Deposited By Salesmen Was Not A Trust Fund, Decision

Bitter denunciation was handed out Wednesday in Eighty-eighth district court, to alleged professional bank promoters, in the case of the Ranger First National bank and its receiver, R. B. Caldwell, in a suit filed against the bank for \$10,977 by W. W. Price, V. A. Noble, C. W. Wick and H. A. De Vaux, who claimed that when the money was placed in the bank it was as a trust fund for the purpose of organizing the proposed Guarantee and State bank of Elliasville, Young county.

The case has gone through all the courts in the state since litigation started in 1921, being finally ordered back for trial in the district court at Eastland in 1925. The receiver for the Ranger bank has all along claimed that the money placed in that bank by the promoters was nothing but a checking account on which the organizers freely drew. This contention was upheld by the jury in the case that ended yesterday.

Council for the bank promoters were Pearson, Funderbeck and Richardson, while the Ranger bank was defended by Turner, Seabury & Springer, with Virgil Seabury leading the defense.

Farmers Convicted.  
It was stated in evidence that when the bank was being organized in Elliasville in 1921 the promoters canvassed the farmers of the district and collected \$22,000 in notes and \$13,000 in cash. This money was placed in the Ranger First National bank until such time as they had collected \$60,000, when they would apply for a charter for the new bank from Austin, but before this happened the Ranger bank closed its doors.

The promoters of the bank claimed that the Elliasville money was a trust fund on special deposit, but it was shown in evidence that defendants made sworn statements that the account was a checking account at that time. Later it developed that other stockholders claimed that the cash was a trust fund and suit was filed for a preference claim on the assets of the Ranger bank.

Tossed Around.  
The case when first tried in 1923 gave the promoters the verdict and the case was appealed, taken to the court of civil appeals at El Paso when the case was sent back for a new trial. In 1925 the case went to the federal court at Abilene where the court decided that the case was one for the district court at Eastland county.

Back the case came to Eastland and in April, 1926, it was gone over again and the result was a hung jury, but in the re-trial that has taken place this week and ended last night the jury at last found for the bank and the receiver.

Judge Elizo Been occupied the bench while a special jury was empaneled to try the case.

### Harvest Is Ready Hands Are Needed To Gather Sheaves

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 10.—An urgent call for 5,000 harvest hands has been sent out from Northwest Oklahoma. The call went out Monday from the Oklahoma labor commissioner's office and was signed by W. A. Murphy, assistant labor commissioner. The hands are wanted in at least five counties in the Northwest Oklahoma wheat section.

Part of the territory is inaccessible to be reached by railroad and laborers are asked to proceed to those counties by autos or other means of transportation.

### JUNIOR COLLEGE FACULTY TO BE ANNOUNCED SOON

A full program for the Junior College for Ranger, with names of new faculty members, to replace those who have resigned since the election will be made public at an early date, according to information from a member of the school board this morning.

Teachers supplying those places made vacant by resignation, must come with the highest recommendations and highest qualifications and are usually recruited from Texas University, San Marcos Normal of the College of Industrial Arts.

One member of the board laughingly said that there was one thing that the board could promise the applicants and that was matrimony, as it invades the rank and file of teachers who come to Ranger, and will be responsible for several changes in Ranger schools before fall rolls around.

Some of the faculty will not be named until the Junior College program is arranged, it was stated.

### PISTOL AND POISON TWO INSTRUMENTS

DALLAS, June 10.—A pistol and poison were the instruments of self-destruction used by two men here today. E. A. Kyle of Urbana, Ill., died after taking poison. Friends said that he had been despondent since the death of his wife six months ago.

J. R. Brannon, 21, of Rome, Ga., shot himself at his rooming house, here, and died on the way to the hospital. No motive was assigned for his act.

### OSAGE PROBE TO CONTINUE SAYS LAWYER

PAWHUSKA, Okla., June 10.—A federal investigation of the Osage reign of terror will go ahead uninterrupted, Assistant U. S. Attorney Edwin Brown declared today.

Brown said there were many inquiries in the huge ring that conspired to murder the aborigines of America for their wealth.

"We are not going to relent because one of the ring members has confessed," Brown said.

"As soon as the supreme court's mandate arrives from Washington transferring the Osage murder cases from the state courts to the federal courts, we are going ahead with the trial of W. K. Hale and Johnny Ramsey."

### Melhorn Second In Tournament of North England

### America Wants Naval Armaments Discussed Separately From Air

LONDON, Eng., June 10.—An Exchange telegraphic message today says Brazil has tendered its resignation from the League of Nations council, but stipulated that it was not relinquishing its membership in the league.

Mello Franco, the Brazilian council member, tendered the resignation today, according to dispatches.

Continues as Nonpermanent Members, is Geneva Report

GENEVA, Switzerland, June 10.—Brazil will not continue as a non-permanent member of the League of Nations council after September, Mello Franco, the Brazilian council member announced today.

The announcement puts Brazil's future status in the League of Nations up to the league itself. The league meets in September, and it would be possible then to make Brazil a permanent member of the council which is what Brazil desires.

### AMERICA'S PROTEST ON DISARMAMENT DISCUSSED

The United States today protested against the efforts of the sub-commission of the League of Nations preliminary disarmament conference to discuss the inter-dependence of the naval military and aerial armament.

Only the plenary preliminary conference should discuss or decide that question, the Americans urged.

The Americans seek a separate consideration for naval armaments.

An effort to harm Premier Count Bethlen of Hungary failed today when a Hungarian republican, Ivan Dujutsch, penetrated the police guard supplied the premier and struck him a blow in the face.

### HEIRS WELL GIVEN SHOT CLEANED OUT

A shot of nitro was given the Hodges heirs well yesterday afternoon, and today the well is being cleaned out, showing possibly a little better than it did yesterday.

It is thought that the well will maintain a production of about forty barrels.

This well, drilled in by the Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company early yesterday morning, has revived interest in drilling operations among local and foreign operators.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—President Coolidge probably will be driven to living in a hotel here while the white house is being made safe for him. The alarming condition of the roof of the mansion has caused the building commissioner to insist on repairs before another winter, when a heavy snow might cause the roof to crash.

The roof, actually, is resting, to a large extent on the partition of the great colonial mansion and not on the trusses built to hold it up, Major U. S. Grant, of the Third engineers reported.


