HONG KONG, Aug. 8.-Typhoon-stricken Swatow, a mangled and miserable resemblance of the port of a week ago, today went about the first ghastly task that falls to the survivors of the storm-burial of the dead. County Attorney Takes Injunction Route, Following Citizens Raid Sunday.

EASTLAND, Aug. 8-A temporary injunction restraining Bertha Ray from selling intoxicating liquors has been obtained by County Attorney Ove E. Overson, following the woman's arrest Sunday in a raid on an alleged bootlegging establishment by Eastland citizens, headed by Deputy Sheriff Porter Hearn. The injunction was issued by R. B. Truley, acting as judge of the Eighty-eighth district court during the absence of Judge E.

The injunction is returnable Saturday, at which time the county attorney will ask that it be made permanent, he announced. The injunction route through the state courts as a means of stopping bootlegging in Eastland county is something new, although such steps have been taken through the federal court in the case of an Eastland hotel.

Liquor Is Found. A gallon of corn whisky, two large gunny sacks filled with bottles of choc beer and a large number of empty bottles were found by the raiders when they swooped down on the establishment said to have been run by the Ray woman, three or four miles east of Eastland.




