## MAYOR "BOSSY" GILLIS NOW IN JAIL

### British Sailors Are Freed in Chinese Smuggling Case

### CARDINALS LOSE SECOND GAME OF WORLD'S SERIES SCORE 9 TO 3

#### CHINESE FOUND ON A VESSEL

Two Stowaways Dead, Others Unconscious; Evidence Insufficient.

GALVESTON, Oct. 5.—Cases against three sailors of the British steamship Mabay, jailed here in connection with the death of two Chinese stowaways have been dropped, Immigrant Inspector Lindsay announced.  
There is lack of sufficient evidence to show that the men are guilty of a conspiracy to smuggle Chinese into the country, he said.  
Eleven Chinese were found beneath the bunkers of the vessel last Saturday. Two were dead and nine were unconscious due to failure of the air supply.

#### MERGER OF 2 BIG LINES IS DROPPED NOW

K. C. Southern and M. K. T. Formally Withdraw Application.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—A resolution formally withdrawing application of the Kansas City Southern and the M. K. & T. for permission to consolidate their properties was filed today with the Interstate Commerce Commission. Any plan for unification of the two lines and the St. Louis & Southwestern which is also involved must be developed "in a manner fully in harmony with the indicated views of the commission," the resolution said.  
The commission now has pending against the Kansas City Southern a Clayton act proceedings charging anti-trust law violation in connection with the proposed merger.  
"By their action, the commission has indicated that it looks with disfavor upon the plans for unification of the carriers," the resolution added. The recent revocation of the authority of L. F. Lorcee, chairman of the Kansas City Southern, to act as a director of the M. K. & T., was considered in some circles a further indication of the commission's disapproval.

WACO, Tex., Oct. 5.—Kick-off meeting for District 13 workers of the Greater Baylor University campaign will be held in Breckenridge Monday, Oct. 15, with the Rev. W. H. Andrew of Stephenville as district chairman presiding. An all-day conference from 10 a. m. until 4:30 p. m., will be held.  
Dr. Wallace Bassett of Dallas, an outstanding speaker and prominent in Baptist activities, will speak at the mass meeting following the conference.  
Chairman Andrew will lead District 13 workers toward raising their part of the \$2,000,000 campaign goal. Workers all over Texas are striving toward that goal to retire Baylor's indebtedness and to create additional endowment.  
Plans applicable to every section of District 13 will be discussed by the leaders. The popular campaign dates from Nov. 23 to Dec. 4 simultaneously over Texas, following the Texas Baptist general convention, Nov. 13 to Nov. 18.  
District 13 embraces four Baptist associations. The Rev. Harlan J. Matthews of Mineral Wells is chairman of Palo Pinto Jack association; the Rev. C. R. Shirar, Breckenridge, Cisco association; the Rev. E. W. Goss, Dublin, Erath association and the Rev. Joe Mayes Baird, Callahan association.  
Preceding the popular campaign, "Baylor Sunday" will be observed on Nov. 25th in all larger Baptist church of Texas to inaugurate the state-wide enterprise for Baylor, the oldest educational institution in Texas.

Seven jurors were in the box when court convened today. Many veniremen were excused for having fixed opinion on the defendant's guilt or innocence.

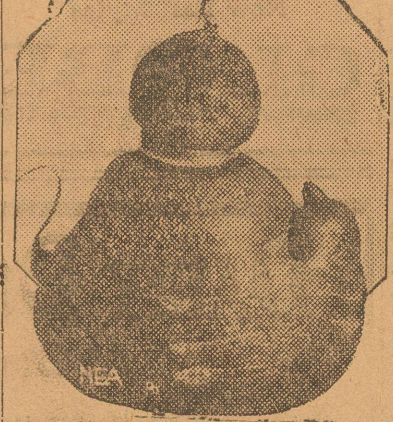
#### R. C. Pep Squad's Uniforms Clever

#### \$1,000,000 FUND AS MEMORIAL

#### DOZEN BREAK OUT OF JAIL

FRANKFORT, Ky., Oct. 5.—Twelve prisoners escaped from Frankfort county jail early today after breaking the lock on the door of a second floor dormitory.  
Stephen Topass, jailer, and his deputy, sleeping in an adjoining building, were unaware of the escape until an hour afterward. Most of the prisoners had been sentenced on liquor charges. A total of 575 were confined in the jail.  
After breaking the lock, the 12 men went to the third floor, which was unoccupied. There they forced open a barred window and tied bedclothing together to lower themselves to the ground.

#### CARNES IS IN ATLANTA

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 5.—Clinton Carnes, charged with embezzling \$935,000 from the Southern Baptist Home Mission board, arrived here today after a trip from Winnipeg where he was arrested a week ago. He was taken immediately to Fulton county jail.

#### District Body Holds Meeting

Neither of the two matters were passed upon, however, inasmuch as a full membership was not present.

#### TODD TO THE PEN FOR LIFE

Ranger Man's Conditional Pardon is Revoked by Gov. Moody.

Willis Wayne Todd of Ranger will return to the state penitentiary to resume his life term for the murder of a Fort Worth service car driver, several years ago.  
The boy, who was given a death sentence for his participation in the murder, lay in his cell at the Parker county jail and heard the nails being driven into the scaffold upon which he was to hang, heard the words of a jailer who told him the governor had commuted his sentence to life, went to the penitentiary, was given a conditional pardon by Governor Miriam Ferguson—and is "going back."  
A week ago, Todd was arrested at Fort Worth for stealing cotton.  
Thursday, Governor Dan Moody issued a proclamation revoking the conditional pardon which had been granted to Todd by Governor Ferguson, and Todd must return to the penitentiary for life.  
Charge of automobile theft was filed against Todd in Justice of the Peace J. N. McFatter's court in connection with the theft of a truck here.

#### SAN ANTONIO ADDS 100,000 STREET LAMPS

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 5.—In carrying out the most elaborate scheme of decoration ever planned for an American Legion convention, workmen are busy stringing pennants, hanging flags and draping telephone and electric light poles along approximately 60 city blocks in San Antonio, Texas. Nearly every business house in the downtown district is decorating as never before, and when the 1928 convention opens Monday, San Antonio, city of conventions, will be more gaily attired than ever before in its history.  
By day San Antonio will be vivid with its red, white and blue pennants, flags of all the allied nations and Legion emblems, and by night it will glow with brilliant street lights. The skyline will be outlined in lights.  
The Legionnaires are being greeted at the railroad stations with welcome banners and huge American flags. The streets from the station to the downtown district are continuously decorated in their honor. The hotels are flying flags, flaunting banners, pennants and streamers, welcoming their guests.  
Approximately 30,000 feet of pennants, making a continuous overhead canopy, are being used in three main streets alone. All the telephone, trolley and electric light poles throughout the downtown section and along streets from the stations to the business district are draped with American and Texas flags. In the center of the street, flags of the Allied nations are suspended from all of the wire running across the streets. It is estimated that more than 3,000 flags are being used in this manner.  
Never in the history of the city have local business houses and firms been so lavish in their individual decorations. But not all the festivity and gaiety is confined to the downtown sections. Community centers in the residential sections are gay for the occasion, and vast numbers of the residences will be flying the American flag.  
More than 50,000 additional electric lights will be used to illuminate the city streets at night. Another 50,000 will outline nine of San Antonio's most prominent buildings. The effect will be a skyline developed in red, white and blue, or combinations of orange and red; red and green, and other colors.  
Not only are the exteriors of the buildings being decorated but many merchants are devising novel displays in their windows and in their stores to carry out the spirit of the convention. The large department stores are giving special attention to their windows.

#### MAN OF MANY ESCAPES ONCE MORE CAUGHT

HUNTSVILLE, Oct. 5.—Alvin Ireland, convict, who escaped from Imperial state prison farm when Dog Sgt. Ward was murdered and who later escaped from Fort Bend county jail, after he had been given an examining trial on the murder charge, has been recaptured, Criminal Record Clerk Jordan of the State prison was advised today.  
He was taken at Ashdown, Ark., by sheriff Jas. Sanderson of Little River county. With him were two men who are ex-convicts from Texas.  
Ireland was turned over to railroad officers and will be tried for road officers and will be tried for mail and express robberies which are federal offenses, before being returned to Texas officials.

#### FRANK SNYDER HAS RESIGNED

HOUSTON, Oct. 5.—Frank Snyder, who led the Houston Buffs to their first Dixie series title this year, resigned today.  
Snyder, a former major league catcher with the St. Louis Cardinals and New York Giants, declined to discuss his reasons other than to say that there was a wide difference of opinion between him and President Fred Ankenman of the Houston team.  
Ankenman's only comment was, "I believe Frank acted hastily."

#### Ranger is Asked to Aid Florida Storm Victims

To aid in relieving the suffering of the people of Florida—destitute as the result of the great hurricane that claimed 2,000 lives and did many millions of dollars worth of damage—Eastland county citizens will contribute \$300. This is the amount asked by the Red Cross.  
Cisco has allotted itself one-third of this amount, leaving only \$200 to be given by the remainder of the county. Cisco contributions up to yesterday totaled \$60.50. Ranger perhaps is getting off to a "late start" to use an athletic term. But undoubtedly the citizens of this city will respond to this call for aid.

#### Will Run Affairs of City From Jail Cell for 60 Days

(By United Press)  
Fiery-Tongued Mayor Who Threw Himself on Mercy of Court is Jolted With Jail Sentence, Half of it at "Hard Labor."

SALEM, Mass., Oct. 5.—As prisoner No. 4886, Mayor "Bossy" Gillis directed Newburyport municipal affairs from a cell in Salem jail during the next two months. Today the fiery-tongued ex-sailor who, for the past nine months has ruled his conservative home town with the iron hand of a Mussolini, occupied cell 79 at the county house of correction facing 60 day's imprisonment, half of it at hard labor.  
The sentence with an additional penalty of \$545 in fines was imposed last yesterday by Superior Judge Nelson P. Brown, before whom "Bossy" pleaded guilty a week ago, to charges of unlawfully storing and selling gasoline at his own famous filling station in Newburyport.  
Having thrown himself upon the mercy of the court, Gillis had expected to escape with a fine but the court decided that the "bad boy" mayor must go to jail.

#### COMPASS IS UPSET BY METAL

BRANFORD, Conn., Oct. 5.—His compass affected by a conignment of metal he did not know he was carrying, Pilot J. O. Webster of the National Air Transport company found himself miles off his course from New Brunswick, N. J., to Cleveland, O., and crashed in making a forced landing on a farm near here today. Reports indicated that the pilot was not injured.

#### SPLENDID WELL IS BROUGHT IN NEAR EASTLAND

S. A. Hopkins and Associates have completed their No. 1 well on the N. H. Jones farm, Sec. 43, Blk. 4, H. & T. C. Ry. Co. survey, about three miles northwest of Eastland, for five million wet gallons in the lower Ranger lime at 3580 feet.  
The Consolidated Gasoline Co. of Eastland has extended its 6-inch line to the well and is now taking the gas into its Eastland plant. A test shows this gas to contain a very nice percentage of gasoline. The well has a rock pressure of more than a thousand pounds and should be a consistent producer for several years.  
This well has had quite a checkered career, having been spudded in by the contractor on January 27th of this year and a great deal of time has been lost on account of fishing jobs, one fishing job lasting from March 16 to June 25. Although drilled in territory surrounded by wells drilled to the Marble Falls lime formation during the boom days, this well's pay formations have logged one hundred feet higher from the Caddo lime down, making it more or less a wildcat.  
A showing of gas was had in the Olden sand, gas and oil in the Parson's sand; small well passed up in the Caddo lime; also showing in the Marble Falls lime; small quantity of gas in the Eastland lake sand, and finally picking up this nice wet gas well in the lower Ranger formation.  
Mr. Hopkins, who is from Boston, but who has been residing in Cisco for the past year, deserves a great deal of credit in completing this well, as several of the fishing jobs looked almost impossible to clean up and were very costly, and in addition to this he was forced to take the well over from the contractor on May 7th and later to buy a string of tools in order to complete it.  
Ben Mackall, of Eastland, his tool pusher, also deserves credit for his knowledge and stay-with-it-ness, having stayed as high as eight days and nights on the derrick floor without leaving.

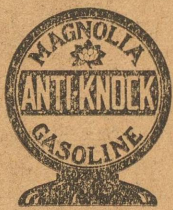

# BULLDOGS ARE WINNERS 25 TO 0 OVER WINTERS HI

Ranger Team Plays Sluggishly Until the Game is Nearly Over.

After playing in a listless fashion for three quarters, the Ranger Bulldogs suddenly sank their teeth into the Winters Blizzards and ran up a score of 25 to 0 Thursday afternoon on the Winters gridiron.  
The only thing that suggested winter, icy winds and cold weather was the name of the home team for a beaming sun was beating down throughout the game. The Bulldogs played without the services of big Garland Hinman,

fullback, who was out with injuries.

Until the start of the last quarter—when the Ranger team decided to make a game of it—the affair had been rather dismal to the handful of faithful fans who had driven 110 miles to see their favorites in action. The Blizzards—made up of diverse sizes, two or three big men but the remainder small or even smaller—put up a good fight and repeatedly prevented touchdowns by brave stands inside their 10-yard line. On offense, they could get nowhere, two passes, each thrown by Hill to Hardegee, marking the sum total of their success. One heave

was for 15 and the other for 20 yards.

Near the close of the first quarter, the Bulldogs marched 60 yards for a touchdown. Hammett's dash of 35 yards was the chief feature of the advance. McLaughlin plunged the ball over. Goal was missed. With this exception, Ranger's offense in the first half would get started, then, like a flyver without gasoline, it would splutter and stop. One onslaught of 50 yards might have meant a score but a fumble lost the opportunity.

The speedy Whitehall went in as the final quarter began and dashed off tackle 20 yards. Hammett went through the same opening for 15. A 15-yard penalty set the Bulldogs back on the next play but Whitehall gained 10 and Hammett five yards. Whitehall in two plays, made the remaining 12 yards for a score. The kick was low.  
Taking to the air, the Bulldogs

made quick progress—Whitehall to Hammett for 15, and Hammett to Bowden for 23, Bowden dragging two tacklers five yards. But the Blizzards obtained the ball on downs on their four-yard line and punted.

Hammett made a 10-yard return of the kick, then passed to McLaughlin for 11 yards and Whitehall went off tackle for seven yards and a touchdown. Goal was kicked.

The final score of the game was the most spectacular play of the day. Hammett faked a pass, faked a run, then shot a pass for 35 yards to Whitehall for a touchdown.

Sullivan, hefty lineman for Winters, deserves special commendation for his sterling defensive work.  
The lineups: Winters, Collingsworth and Hardegee, ends; Williams and Kelly, tackles; Smith, center; Hill, quarter; Bishop and Baldwin, halfbacks; Orr, full back; Tully and Mills, ends; T. Hinman and Love, tackles; Bumpers and Mitchell, guards; Bohannon, center; Hammett, quarter; Seay and Hamilton, halfbacks; McLaughlin, full. Numerous lads were sent into the Bulldog lineup, including Bowen, Whitehall and Blackmond.

Every commercial exhibit building is overflowing; the Manufacturers building has no vacant space left; the Automobile Building is full; the demand for stalls and stables in the Livestock Department, greatly exceeded the supply; the Agricultural building will have more exhibits than ever before, and the poultry building is crowded. A special tent has been erected to care for the Pigeon Show.

All dairy cattle, dairy equipment, and dairy products will be housed in the new dairy building where the first annual southwest dairy show will be held.

"We believe the people of the Southwest will agree with us that we have the greatest exposition ever staged in America," Mr. Olmsted said.
