# TEXAS IS WITHOUT LAWS, NEGRO CLAIMS

## DEVELOPMENT OF POTASH DEPOSITS IN STATE IS NOW PLANNED

## BORAH OF IDAHO NOMINATION POSSIBLE

### POINTS OUT WAY FOR REFERENDUM ON PROHIBITION

Members Of Senate Committee Express Views On The Order.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—If the wets want a referendum on prohibition they can submit the eighteenth amendment to the state through a proposal to repeal, Senator William E. Borah of Idaho, declared. Senator Borah is being boomed by the dries for the 1928 republican presidential nominee, it was announced today. Borah said, however, he did not favor any such course, but that the procedure was the only constitutional way he knew in which a national referendum could be obtained.

### COOLIDGE DRY ORDER IS OF NO CONSEQUENCE

WASHINGTON, June 1.—A report before the end of the week declaring that President Coolidge's executive prohibition is inconsequential of legal importance, was predicted today by members of the senate committee studying the legality of the order. The various members outlined their views in a half hour closed session and then adjourned until Thursday, when a final report must be drawn up.

The investigation followed a general uprising of the anti-bloc in the senate and house shortly after the proclamation was published by Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Lincoln C. Andrews.

Andrews announced that it was his purpose under the presidential executive order to appoint state, county and municipal officers special dry enforcement officers. The order brought out a storm of protests by the anti faction that claimed it was the usurpation of state's rights.

After several days, Mr. Andrews announced that the order will be tried out in California and no other state for some time.

### WOMEN'S CLUBS FAVOR ENFORCEMENT

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 1.—The General Federation of Women's Clubs, representing thousands of club women in all parts of the country, today passed a motion "renewing their unequivocal stand for loyal and uncompromising support of the eighteenth amendment and the Volstead act."

### INDICTMENT FOR MURDER SUSTAINED

WASHINGTON, June 1.—A federal indictment charging John Ramsey and William K. Hale, with planning and carrying out one of the famous Osage Indian murders in order to obtain rich estates was held valid by the United supreme court today.

The government had appealed the case from an Oklahoma federal court, which has quashed the indictment on the ground that the land on which Henry Roan, a full-blood Osage was murdered was a "restricted" allotment, not within criminal jurisdiction.

UNCOVER CONSPIRACY TO TAMPER WITH JURY PAWHUSKA, Okla., June 1.—An alleged conspiracy to tamper with witnesses in the Osage murder trial here was uncovered today when a warrant for the arrest of two men was sworn out by the Osage county officers.

The two men named in the warrant are charged with "conspiracy to keep a witness from testifying."

### FEDERAL TAXES MAY BE CUT SAYS COLVIN

WASHINGTON, June 1.—President Calvin Coolidge feels that there is a chance possibly of a reduction in federal taxes within the next few years, the white house spokesman pointed out today. He also said, the nation must pay off its national debt and that every cent that could be well expended in that direction will be spent.

### Life Is Exact Of Confessed Bomb Killer

MUSKOGON, Mich., June 1.—Michigan today exacted the life-time liberty of Asa K. Bartlett, 28-year-old Blue Lake township constable, for the confessed "bomb" murders of three persons Thursday.

Political enmity was the admitted motive.

### SUPREME COURT ROOM CROWDED TO HEAR CASE

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 1.—While scores of disappointed people jostled one another in a vain effort to gain entrance into an already packed supreme court chamber, the state of Tennessee offered final argument in the famous Scopes evolution case.

Clergymen, lawyers, doctors, mountaineers in "store bought clothes," curious women, and several pedagogues, composed the audience that greeted the five judges as they took their seats.

The judges were forced to enter from their chambers through an outside window, using this entrance rather than pushing through the crowd.

Arguments in the case were begun yesterday. Scopes, a teacher in one of the state institutions violated the law against teaching the evolution doctrine in any state institution to test the validity of the law.

The late William Jennings Bryan took part in the prosecution while the celebrated criminal lawyer, Clarence Darrow, represented the defendant. A verdict of guilty was returned after a hard fought legal battle in which constitutional questions were brought up.

Several large organizations are backing Scopes in his fight. Should the Tennessee court affirm the case, an appeal will be taken to the United States supreme court.

### 'MASKED' MARVEL IS KILLED

DENVER, Colo., June 1.—Mrs. Dorothy Walker, 23, driving as the "masked marvel" in an exhibition automobile race, on the Memorial day card here yesterday, was instantly killed when her car crashed into a fence on the first curve at Overland park race track.

More than 6,000 persons including the woman's husband, witnessed the accident, none of the spectators knew that the driver was a woman, as she was driving incognito, with an announced intention of making a new track record.

### Accident Proves Fatal To Cisco Resident Monday

Charles M. Crist, injured when his car went into a ditch as he and family were driving on the Cisco-Rising Star highway Saturday night, died at Cisco yesterday. Preparations are being made for shipping the body to Blairtown, Mo., the former home of the family for burial.

Mr. and Mrs. Crist, who have made their home in Cisco for some time, were returning to that city from Cross Plains when something is said to have gone wrong with their car, causing it to go into a ditch at the side of the road. Mr. Crist had a broken leg and was hurt internally.

### Chinese Village In California Is Swept By Flames

SACRAMENTO, Calif., June 1.—Nearly 100 homes were destroyed when fire swept the Chinese Village, Isleton, on the Sacramento River, last night. The flames followed a stove explosion in a Chinese home. Wire communications were cut off, most of the evening. One report received here was that three lives have been lost.

### INVESTMENT OF VARSITY FUNDS IS CONSIDERED

Board Of Regents Held An Important Meeting In Houston.

HOUSTON, June 1.—The development of the potash deposits on University of Texas lands and investing the university's funds now on hand were under discussion at a meeting of the financial committee of the board of regents, here Tuesday.

The committee has on deposit in the bank \$3,250,000. They plan to invest \$3,000,000 in interest bearing securities. Under the constitution they may invest only in state or national bonds. There are no state bonds, although Governor Ferguson has declared her intention of issuing 5 per cent bonds. If this is found legal the money will be invested in these bonds, or if not they will buy liberty bonds, M. E. Foster, chairman of the board said.

T. W. Gregory, former United States attorney general, and W. A. Keeling, former state attorney general were present and were asked to decide if the state issue was legal.

### \$400,000 HELD FROM INVESTORS PUNK COMPANY

DALLAS, June 1.—Payment of approximately \$400,000 in dividends to hundreds of Texas investors, in the delinquent United Home Builders of America, will be held up indefinitely, pending a hearing on the suit attacking the report of the master of chancery, it was announced here today.

A suit filed by Judge Maco Stewart, challenged the report of the master and called for a revision of the estimates. Date for hearing Stewart's suit has not been set.

Wage earners in practically every town and hamlet in Texas were investors in the scheme that locked rosy to them as an easy way to build a home. The plan was a get-rich-quick scheme and unlike any building and loan plan that is used.

This case has been in court for several months and now is no nearer settlement than when it was filed.

Three times the officers have raided the place and on the first occasion the woman grabbed the search warrant from the hands of the officer and defied the law to do it. She tore the warrant up.

### 6 INJURED IN WRECK ON INTERURBAN

FORT WORTH, June 1.—Six persons were injured when a westbound interurban car crashed into the rear of a work train on the Dallas-Fort Worth line, about a mile out of Fort Worth, early Tuesday. The motorman was most seriously injured, breaking a leg and suffering from painful cuts. The end of the passenger car was demolished.

### OFFICERS SAY ACCUSED MAN KNOWN HERE

Mrs. Jack Ellis, who was shot and killed at Cross Plains Saturday evening, and whose husband, Jack Ellis, is now being held in the Callahan county jail at Baird on a charge of murder, was known in Eastland, having delivered laundry here for some time from the Strawn laundry. After shooting his wife Ellis is said to have cut his own throat, but will recover from his wound, it is said.

### Girl Wins Bronze Medal For Speed On Typewriter

Miss Telma Strong, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Strong, Ranger, is the first Ranger girl to win the bronze medal given each year by the Underwood Typewriter company to the pupil who makes the highest speed record for the year. Miss Strong's average has been 45 words a minute. Boys have previously copied the high honor but this is the one honor that the boys did not win this year at Ranger High.

### Prairie Gets Good Producer Cross Plains

A 150-barrel producer came in late last night on the acreage south of Cross Plains recently bought by the Prairie Oil & Gas company from the Mook-Texas company at Cross Plains. The well has not been shot and is showing some gas. This well is known as the Prairie Oil & Gas company's McDonald No. 1.

This acreage had production on it when the purchase was made but this is the first well that the Prairie company has drilled in since that time.

### ATTENDING CONFERENCE ON FOOTBALL SCHEDULE

Coach Blair Cherry, Prof. R. F. Holloway, and Prof. O. G. Lanier, are in Abilene today attending the football conference. At this conference a program for the coming year will be outlined, which is expected to have a beneficial bearing on the Oil Belt teams.

### CROCKER WELL MADE 100 BBLS. SCOUTS STATE

Good progress has been made in the wells now drilling in the Rising Star area, where L. A. Delaney, drilling on the Dr. B. F. Terry farm, a short distance north of Rising Star struck the Caddo lime without showing oil, but after a shot a fair showing came with a flow by heads, but not enough to satisfy the drillers. If production does not increase the well will be taken down to the Hillburn sand, it was said.

The Crocker well reported last week still maintains an even at 100 barrels while the Mook-Tex Co. drilling on the G. T. Butler farm, six miles southwest of Rising Star struck the shallow sand at 1,300 feet and drilled through 40 feet which water.

George Eberhardt drilling Patterson No. 1 at 2600 feet in the black lime and expects to pick it the Hillburn sand at about 2800 feet. All other sands encountered have been dry.

Hodnet No. 3 in the Blake field looks like a nice well after a shot. It is one location north of the discovery Stover well, while the J. C. Kluge also being drilled by the Humble company looks good for 75 barrels.

Drilling reports from the Callahan shallow field, west of Cisco, show considerable operations now under way. Gibson & Johnson No. 1 Glover, drilling at 1095 feet; No. 1 Williams, drilling at 650 feet; No. 1 Dyer, survey 85, T. & P. Callahan survey; Nos. 2 and 3, location; No. 1 Griggs, location; No. 1 Finley, location; Holmes & Roberts No. 1 Bell, drilling at 710 feet; Goodloe & Duffey No. 1 Boren, drilling at 600 feet; Acers & Mee, of Cisco, No. 3 Snyder, completed for 18 barrels; No. 4, small producer; Nos. 5 and 6, rigging; No. 7, location; Wittmer, Anderson & Denny, No. 1 Jackson, drilling at 1100 feet; Moody & Adams Windham, drilling at 1200 feet; Empire Gas & Fuel company, Windham, location; Moutray Oil company, of Cisco, No. 1 Finley, cleaning out to put on pump; Howd Oil company Jackson, E. T. Ry., Callahan county, location for 1200-foot test.

### ELECTRIC SIGNAL AT CROSSING

C. V. Terrell, a member of the railroad commission sent an employee of the commission, Walter Gerron of Ellis county, out to Ranger to see about installing an electric signal device on the Prairie crossing, which has been the scene of several fatalities. Mr. Gerron has made his inspection and gone from here to Dallas to confer with Texas & Pacific authorities and it is not known what action will be taken until after this conference.

Mr. Terrell, hails from Wise county, the former home county of Steve A. Lillard, is a candidate for railroad commissioner, and incidentally has a son in the Ranger State bank. Mr. Terrell could not score a greater hit with Ranger people than to make this crossing safe for man, beast and cars.

### Argentina Plane Meets With Mishap At Port-an-Prince

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, June 1.—The plane in which Bernardo Duggan, an Argentine sportsman, is flying from New York to Buenos Aires, crashed into a wharf here today in an attempt to take off for San Juan, Porto Rico. The nose of the plane was crashed, but none of the three airmen were injured.

The plane was towed to a navy yard, where it is being repaired by the marine aviation mechanics. If the repairs are completed in time, the flight to Porto Rico will be resumed today.

WARSAW, Poland, June 1.—Ignace Moscivki, candidate of the Middle parties of the Polish parliament and endorsed by Marshal Pilsudski, leader of the recent revolt, today was elected president of the Poland parliament.

### Washington Irving River Steamer Is Sunk; All Saved

HOBOKEN, N. J., June 1.—The big Hudson River steamer, Washington Irving, a majestic boat, which has a capacity of 5,000 passengers, was sunk in a collision in the lower Hudson River today. A dozen tugs reached the ship before it sank and took off the passengers, numbering only a few and a crew of 150 men.

### TRAPP FACES FIGHT TO GET ON TICKET

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 1.—Two suits were filed today by candidates to test the eligibility of Governor M. E. Trapp to be a candidate in the democratic primary.

The first suit was brought by Kirby Fitzpatrick of Ardmore, a candidate for attorney general. The second suit was filed by John H. Turner, a candidate for the nomination of governor of the democratic party in the primaries.

Following the filing of the Fitzpatrick petition, District Judge William H. Secrich granted a temporary restraining order prohibiting the placing of the name of Trapp on the primary ballot.

The question to be passed on in this case is a constitutional one. Under the constitution of Oklahoma, no one can serve two terms as governor. Trapp was never elected governor, but finished out the unexpired term of Jack Walton, who was kicked out by the legislature. He was lieutenant governor. Whether the constitution intended that a man can't be twice elected is to be decided, or whether his finishing an unexpired term prevents him from becoming a candidate.

### Rains And Winds With Lightning Do Heavy Damage

DALLAS, June 1.—Unusual heavy rains accompanied by high winds and electrical displays, fell over the north-east section of Texas during the night causing considerable property damage, according to advices here today.

Hail with a drenching rain battered growing crops near Rockwall and Garland, while Bonham lay in the path of heavy rains and lightning. Some livestock was killed near Denton during the downpour by lightning. Window panes were smashed, and shingles torn down at Denison, while heavy rains and high winds were reported at Sherman.

Dallas came in for more than an inch of rain early today, while plate-glass windows were driven in by the wind, and light wires were handicapped by lightning.

Two persons were injured in auto accidents incidental to the storm, and a house was destroyed by fire following a bolt of lightning. No fatalities have been reported from the storm area which extended northeast into Oklahoma and Arkansas, reports indicate.

### Bottle of Wine Needed To Wash Down The Hash

DALLAS, June 1.—Do you know what hash is called in any other language besides the good old "English as she is spoke."

According to J. Ingels, chef at the Adolphus hotel here it is Brussels Choussels in the country made famous by Kaiser Wilhelm twelve years ago.

But, according to Ingels in that country the hash is not appreciated unless there is a bottle of wine to wash it down with.

"No meal would be complete without a glass of old port or a stein of pre-Volstead. Why, many folks, in the old country, sip a glass of wine in the morning with as much relish and regularity as the American takes his religious glass of hot water," said Ingels. According to the chef the people of Dallas are very fond of broiled steaks with fresh fish running a close second. Fresh fruit is also eaten regularly by local citizens, he said.

### LAWYERS RAISE A NOVEL POINT IN MURDER CASE

Self-Defense Plea Is Interposed When a Plea Is Overruled.

An extraordinary situation arose in Eighty-eighth district court, Eastland Tuesday after the jury had been selected to try the case of Chester Johnson, charged with killing, by shooting, Plummer Tyler, negro, at Cisco on March 18 last. Accused pleaded not guilty.

Attorneys for the defense claimed that the thirty-ninth legislature had canceled all laws in the state and that they had done nothing to pass any laws and that as things stood there was no laws under which he could be tried. Accused also pleaded self-defense.

W. J. Barnes, county attorney, and S. W. Pratt, special prosecutor, appeared for the state while Barker & Orn, attorneys of Cisco represented accused.

The jury were B. D. Hampton, J. R. Crossley, R. D. Mahon, Jack Blackwell, A. H. Crossby, Lee Bishop, W. F. Barton, S. M. Poe, Guy McGee, J. G. Orass, Jim Watzler, and E. B. Owen. The first panel was quickly used up and the sheriff was forced to call eight new men from the street.

The demurrer as raised by the defense is as follows: Demurrer.

Now comes the defendant Chester Johnson in the above entitled and numbered cause, and states under oath that he is not able to go to trial for the reason that under the indictment he nor his attorneys are able to determine an offense against the state of Texas has been committed; and further that he is not able to determine or ascertain his rights in this court; and would respectfully show to the court the following facts:

1. That all the laws of the state of Texas enacted prior to January, 1925, were repealed by the acts of the thirty-ninth legislature. That this defendant, nor his attorneys are able to determine whether the legislature passed any new laws, and therefore does not know whether he has committed an offense against the state of Texas, or what his rights are in this court. That if the thirty-ninth legislature of the state of Texas passed any laws, an authentic copy of same has never been published, and this defendant is not able to determine whether there are any laws in force in the state of Texas or not. Defendant states to the court that the last legislature purported to pass some laws, after it repealed the old laws, but that if said legislature passed any laws, an authentic copy of same has never been published, bearing the certificate of the secretary of state, authenticating same, as required by the constitution of the state of Texas. That this defendant has not been able to secure a copy of the authentic laws of the state, and this defendant states to the court that there are no authentic copies.

Wherefore defendant moves the court to continue this case until he and his attorneys are able to procure a copy of the authentic laws of the state of Texas, published under and by the authority of the secretary of state bearing the certificate and seal of that officer, authenticating same as required by the constitution of the state of Texas; and thereby be informed whether he has committed a crime, and what his rights are in this court.

Overruled. The plea was overruled by Judge Elizo Been and attorneys for defense intimated that they will take the demurrer to the court of criminal appeals.

R. L. Garrett of Cisco, was the first witness, and stated that on March 18 last he was working at the Planning mill in Cisco, when Tyler came in with a chair to mend, and a few minutes later Johnson pushed his head in the door and called Tyler out. After about 20 minutes, he heard shots and saw Tyler running through the mill being pursued by Johnson with a gun. Johnson fired as he ran, and as Tyler fell Johnson rushed up and snapped the gun in Tyler's face, after which he commenced to beat Tyler about the head. Tyler was screaming and telling Johnson not to shoot him. Witness did not see Tyler with a gun, he stated.

### REFUSES CLOSURE RULE

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The senate today refused to give a two-thirds majority for the adoption of the drastic closure rule to force a vote upon the pending migratory bird measure, which has deadlocked the upper house for three weeks.

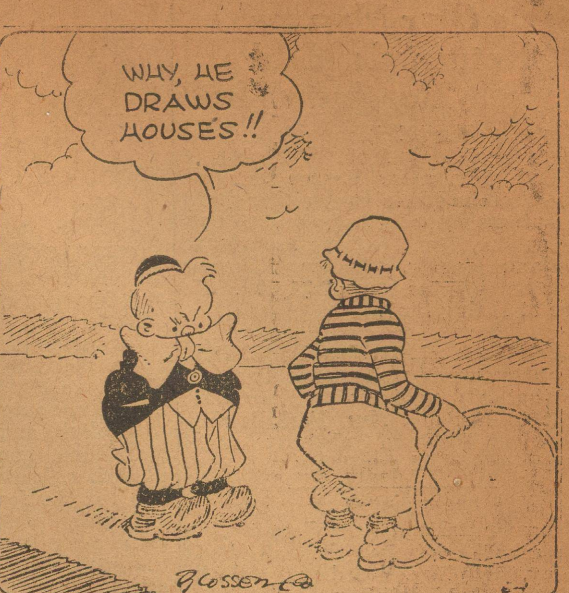
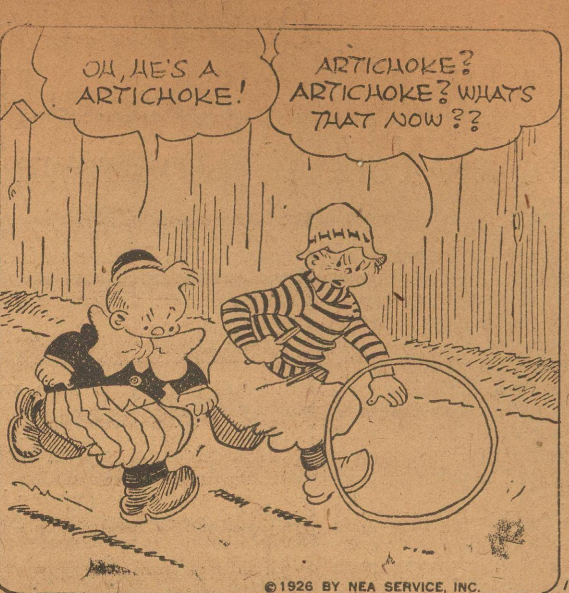
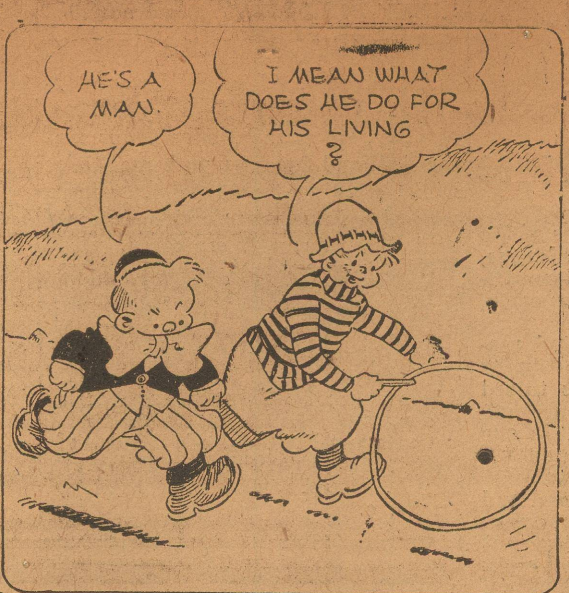
