Crop Conditions Favorable In Eastland County

Farmers in that section immediately inaugurated campaigns for poisoning them, however, and reports are that these campaigns have been very successful, and that the hoppers are diminishing in numbers.
 There has been an abundance of rain in all parts of the county. In some instances considerable damage has been done by rain to the crops, but this has not been very great.

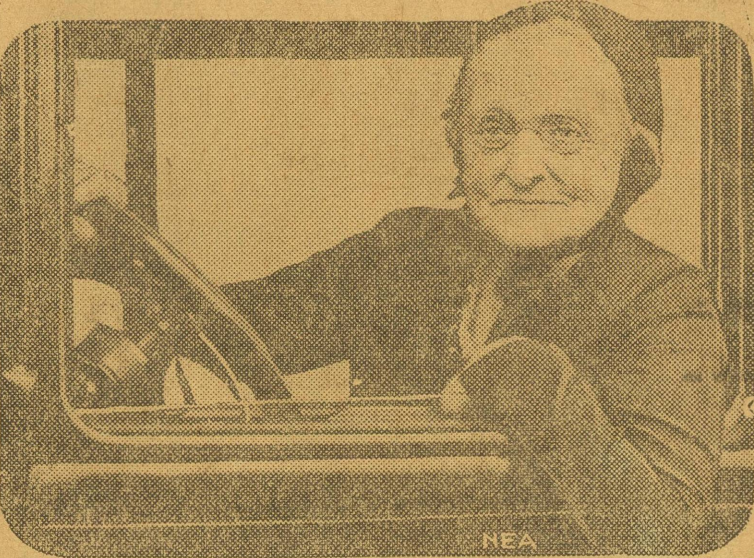

4,000,000 FOOT GASSER AT 476 FEET

Another freak well came in with a rush last night when the gas amounting to several millions of feet, roared from the shallow well being drilled by J. M. White and Howard Heath of Ranger at the Wilber Ranch two miles east of Mings in Pola Pinto county.

The well came in at a depth of 476 feet with a flow of gas estimated at 4,000,000 feet, the tools being blown from the hole. Mr. White said this morning that the well will probably blow itself into a good oil well today, but if the gas continued it would look up with the Lone Star Gas Company's line some half mile away.

The gas is fairly dry and according to officials of the Lone Star Gas Company would make one-half gas line for each thousand feet of gas.

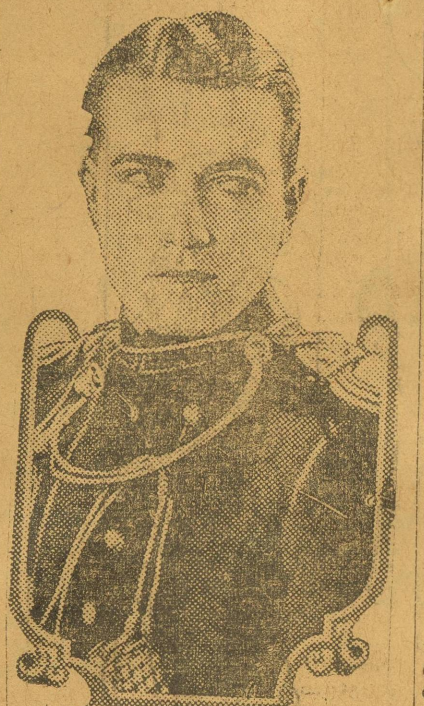

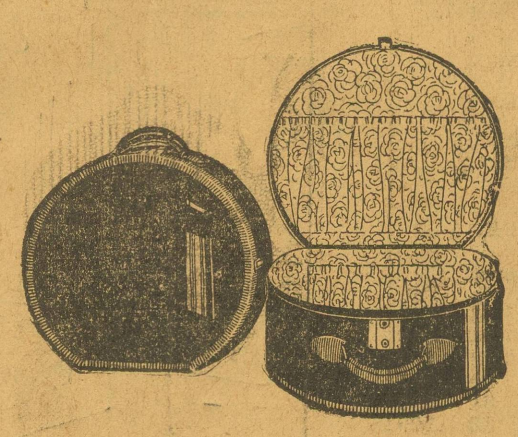

Cleveland Starts Trade Unionism School For Labor

CLEVELAND, O.—A trade school, the first of its kind operated by a board of education, will be opened here next fall to function in conjunction with labor unions and employers, and with the co-operation of the Cleveland Board of Education. The new trade school, the result of a conference between school authorities, the local chamber of commerce, employers and union leaders, was announced by Howard L. Briggs, director of vocational training of the board of education. Courses in the building trades, auto mechanics and mechanics' trades have already been outlined in the curriculum. Pupils will spend four hours a week in school, for which time they will be paid by their employers at the regular rate of pay, the remainder of the time to be put in "on the job." Labor unions have agreed to accept diplomas of the school, and will receive graduates into full standing in the respective unions.
