DISARMAMENT CONFERENCE IS ADJOURNED UNTIL AUTUMN

CHIEF OF THE RIFFIANS, ABD-EL-KRIM QUILTS

MOROCCAN WAR COMES TO END CENTURIES OLD

Prisoners Are Brought To French Lines And Surrendered

By United Press. PARIS, May 26.—Abd-ElKrim, chief of the Riffians, who for more than two years has been making war on Spain and France in Morocco, surrendered tonight.

He entered the French lines and placed himself under French protection bringing his family with him, according to French advisers which have been confirmed.

He expected to reach Taza, there to wait the pleasure of the French and Spanish leaders. Abd-El-Krim early in the day brought to the French lines, prisoners he had been holding and surrendered them.

This is the beginning of the end of a war that had its inception almost since the time Columbus discovered America. The Riffs have been fighting to retain their lands for agriculture and grazing. Gradually, the French and Spanish have been pushing them back like Americans did the Indians and robbing them of their heritage.

Recently peace overtures were made without avail. The Riffs were not armed with modern weapons of war, nor did they have any allies.

Just what will be done with Abd-El-Krim is a matter of speculation.

TRAIN WRECK IN ARKANSAS NONE KILLED

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 26.—Two Kansas City passenger trains collided head-on near Mena, Ark., today, according to word received at the dispatcher's office here. The fireman of one of the trains was severely injured while 11 other persons, mostly passengers were badly shaken up, reports said.

The engines of both trains were demolished while several coaches were telescoped, the report said.

NEWSPAPER MEN FACING JAIL TERM

BOSTON, Mass., May 26.—The trial of three editors and two photographers of the Baltimore News and Baltimore American on charges of contempt of court has ended with the announcement by Judge Ewing Dunne that he will give his decision next Tuesday.

The judge said he would find them guilty unless new evidence is introduced.

The trial grows out of making of photographs during the trial of Richard Whitmore, charged with murder, after the judge had ordered that no photos be made.

He had stooped over the fire when the pot suddenly boiled over, searing his face with steam and coffee. He may lose his sight forever, it was said at the hospital.

REFERENDUM IS OPPOSED IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The senate is overwhelmingly opposed to a national prohibition referendum, a poll by the United Press disclosed today.

Of the seventy senators interviewed only sixteen favored a referendum, and some of the latter had almost impossible reservations. The polls showed that senators from the wet states of New York, Maryland and New Jersey, most heartily favored the referendum. Senators from the "half and half" states were uncertain, and those from the dry South and West generally opposed the plan.

'Dutch' Shafer Draws Life For Killing Man

TEXARKANA, Ark., May 26.—A. R. (Dutch) Shafer was sentenced to life imprisonment by a jury at Jefferson, Texas today in connection with the robbery and murder of Tom Powell, a Texarkana pawn broker on March 6.

PRESIDENT OF LINE BUYS B. & L. STOCK

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The Ranger railroad is enjoying a good business and the people of Ranger are doing their part toward aiding the prosperity of the line, declared J. W. Mitchell, of Fort Worth, president of the Wichita Falls, Ranger & Fort Worth railroad, who was in Ranger this morning.

He said his visit had no significance beyond being a trip merely to see the line and confer with the officials, now housed in the impressive uptown general offices of the railroad.

LEAGUE PLANS DISCUSSION OF LABOR MATTERS

General Principles Of Contracts Will Be Taken Up For Debate

GENEVA, Switzerland, May 26.—The League of Nations disarmament conference adjourned today until autumn to permit two technical sub-commissions to prepare their reports.

The commission has been in session 10 days preparing for the projected League of Nations disarmament conference. The two sub-commissions will prepare reports on the seven questions submitted as a basis for the agenda of the eventual conference.

No definite date for the autumn meeting was set. At the adjournment, Viscount Cecil of England urged the sub-commissions to take all the time necessary, saying their findings will constitute the basis for the greatest revolution the world has ever undertaken, namely disarmament.

The labor question also was given some consideration before adjournment.

This question will be disposed of before June 7, at which time the second session of the conference is to convene for taking up questions dealing purely with maritime labor.

Two matters. The two questions on the agenda for this second conference are:

1. International codification of rules relating to seamen's articles of agreement.

2. General principles for the inspection of the conditions of work of seamen.

This conference will constitute the first serious effort to extend to sailors and sea workers generally all the benefits of common, world wide labor legislation that have already been attained for nearly all classes of workers on land.

HOUSTON OIL MAN IS HEAD REPUBLICANS

HOUSTON, May 26.—The Republican ticket for state offices may not be completed, according to word this morning from the state nomination committee in session here.

The committee held a continuous session yesterday and continued it today.

It is understood that T. P. Lee, a Houston oil man, has been mentioned as a possible candidate for governor. It is not known whether Lee will accept the nomination or not.

The Republican party seems hopelessly split with Creeper-Nolte leading on one wing and Harry Wurzbach, the lone Republican congressman from San Antonio leading the other wing. The black and tan element, heretofore headed by "Goose-neck" Bill McDonald, is staying out of the fight. Efforts are being made to get both factions together. It begins to look as if Lee will be the man to bring peace in the ranks.

Communists Ranks Dwindling Statistics Show

NEW YORK, May 26.—The American Labor year book issued this week by the Rana School of Social Science shows that communist ranks are dwindling; while an increase has been recorded in the membership of the American Federation of Labor.

Membership in the A. F. of L. is given as 2,878,297 compared with 2,865,979 in 1924. It is the first gain since 1920.

United States Is Healthiest Nation, World

WASHINGTON, May 26.—With its great national resources and its hustling citizens, the United States is the wealthiest and healthiest country in the world.

The nation's wealth in 1922 was \$355,000,000,000 the Federal Trade Commission has announced. At the same time, the public health service reported that Americans were getting healthier and that this is the healthiest country on the globe.

America's increase in national wealth from 1912 to 1922 was about 72 per cent, but if allowance is made in the change of purchasing power of the dollar due to the war, the increase was nearer 16 per cent as compared with a 15 per cent increase in population.

MODERN WING OF BAPTISTS WIN IN FIGHT

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Modernists won their first tilt against Fundamentalists in the Northern Baptist church convention here today. Without a debate the convention threw out the so-called Seattle amendment supported by the Fundamentalists which required immersion for membership in Baptist churches, and which would ban from the convention the Park Avenue church of New York and other modernist churches.

Rev. Harry Emerson Fosdick, pastor of the Park Avenue church was the leader of the move. When he accepted the call of the church it was on a free basis. There was considerable disappointment because a fight was expected, but the modernists were in control and stayed off any debate.

The attempt to bring the opposing sides together was fairly successful in that the so-called Seattle amendment was thrown out without any debate on the question.

Hitherto each local church has exercised supreme authority over matters of this kind, and to have the convention legislate on the matter will mean a radical change from the traditional policy, with liberal leaders supporting the traditional practices. The outcome will be awaited with much interest.

100 BODIES RECOVERED FROM LAVA

TOKIO, May 26.—The latest official reports from Hokkaido, the district devastated by the eruption of Mount Tokachi, said 100 bodies had been recovered, that 20 of the survivors were seriously injured and 200 slightly hurt.

Relief work is being carried on the zone, where the Red Cross workers and the troops are clearing up the situation.

The eruption subsided today.

DAWES PLEADS FOR PEACE IN UPPER HOUSE

New Jersey Democrat Leads The Fight On Anti-Prohibition

WASHINGTON, May 26.—A heated demonstration over President Coolidge's executive prohibition order and over prohibition in general, occurred at the opening of the senate today, being lulled only when Vice President Dawes pleaded for order.

Senator Edwards, democrat, New Jersey, of the beer bloc, started the conflict by reading a newspaper editorial assailing the order by which President Coolidge authorized the use of local authorities as federal prohibition officers.

LINCOLN ANDREWS EXPLAINS THE ORDER

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Lincoln C. Andrews, prohibition chief, believes the storm over the presidential order permitting local officers to act as federal dry agents, will help enforcement.

"I feel that this discussion will serve to awaken the states to a sense of their responsibility in enforcing the dry law," he said, in an exclusive interview with the United Press. "I am not trying to force anything down anybody's throat; and what I said previously about not inflicting this on any state that did not desire it still stands."

The Olden Outlaws were defeated by the Eastland boys Saturday, the score was 11 to 2.

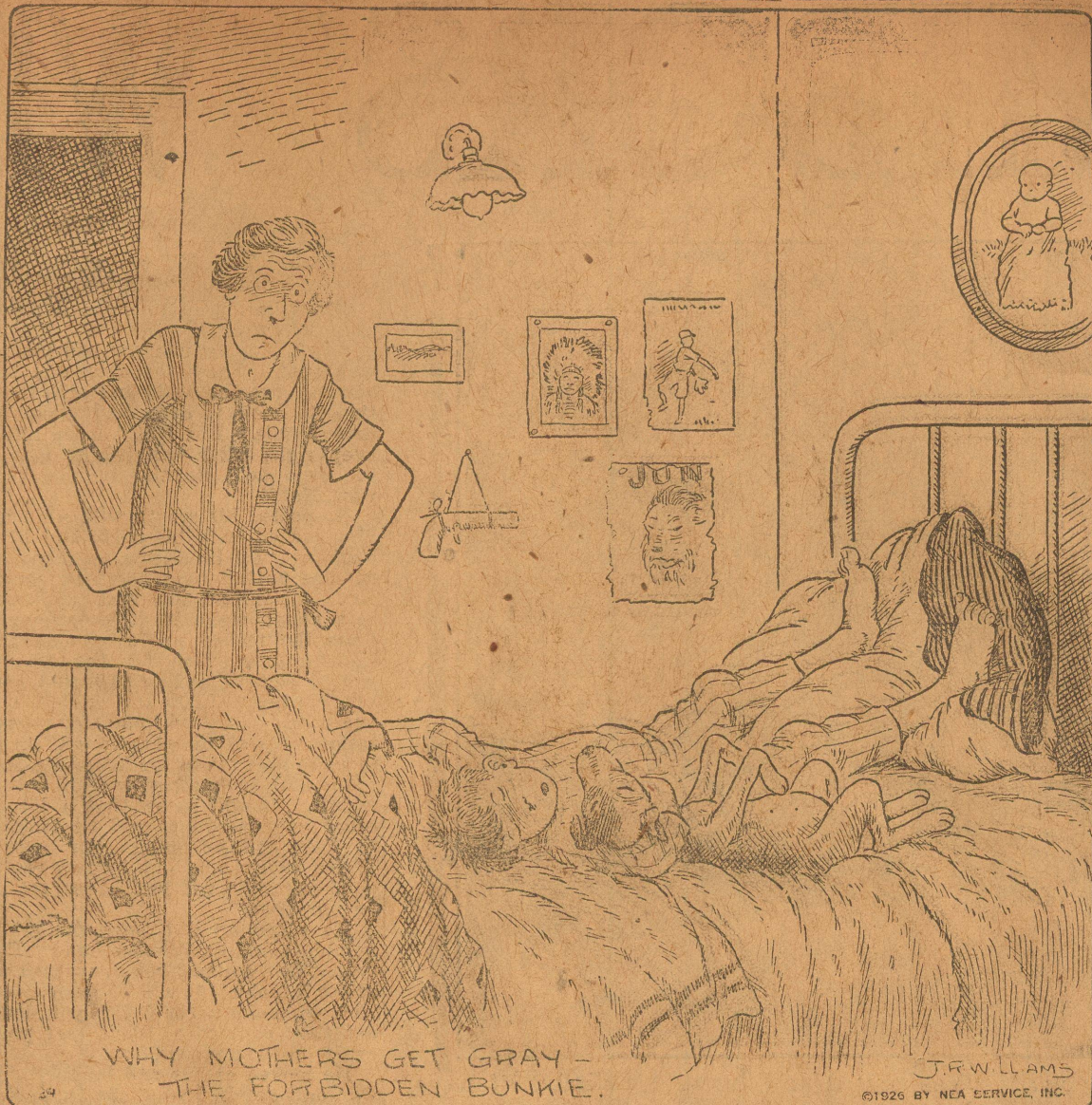

never made a stable town, or countryside. Agriculture scientifically carried out was what built cities, he said.

Oil wealth soon passes and national responsibility cannot be founded upon it. Oil towns rise and fall, he declared, but a prosperous agricultural community will stand for ever.

Soil Basis of Wealth

He argued that the soil was the basis of all wealth, but with the reservation that this was not possible in a community that depended upon one crop for its living. Animals must be bred on the farm while wheat and all other kinds of produce must also be part of the farms yearly earnings. There was no sense in farmers raising all cotton and buying food that could just as well be raised on the farm, he concluded.

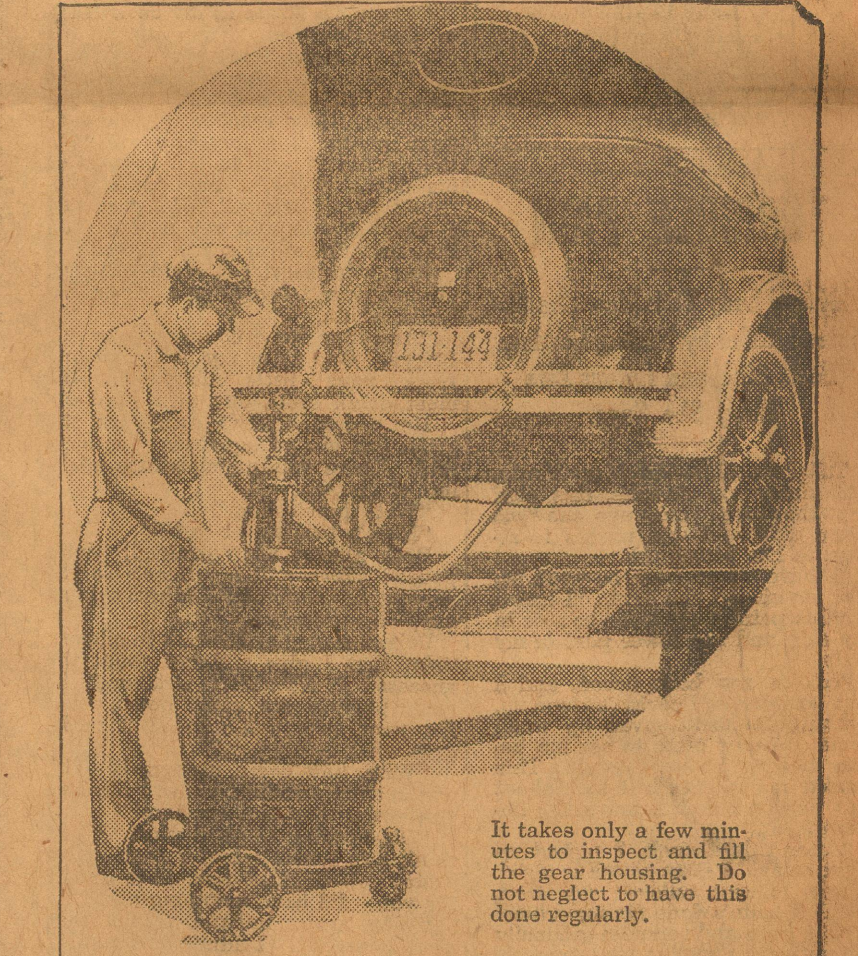
