NEGRO BOY CONFESSES **POISONING**

"Got Tired of Taking Care of Kids," 12-Year-Old Says.

By United Press. DALLAS, Dec. 7.—A 12-year-old negro boy who acted as nurse to younger negro children told Assistant District Attorney King how he roisoned one of the children, attempted to poison the mother and planned to poison another

The statement was made Finay after the boy had been in the county jail more than a month, during which he refused to talk. Theo Parker, the child who was poisoned, died at a hospital about six weeks ago from the effects of poison which Earl Smith, the 12-

year-old negro, said he adminis-Lucile Parker, 57, mother of Theo, had to start work about six

months ago to support her children, and friends told her she could trust Earl to take care of the children, Theo, and May Helthe children, Theo, and May Helen, less than a year old.

Earl Smith soon became tired of this. About six weeks ago he found a bottle of poison in the kitchen. While he was feeding oatmeal to 3-year-old Theo, Earl gave the child a spoonful of poison right after a spoonful of oatmeal. The child screamed and Earl ran, he said. The next day, Theo died. The mother started to prepare some cocoa the next morning and she noticed the powder was damp.

she noticed the powder was damp. She examined it and found it was saturated with poison. Until Friday Earl refused to make any statement concerning the death of Theo or his attempt to poison to Theo's mother. When he told his story he declared, "I just got tired of taking care of those kids."

Scores of rooming-house keepers, they assert, who for years have made all or part of their income by renting rooms to students, will be deprived of their income if the dormitory is built.


