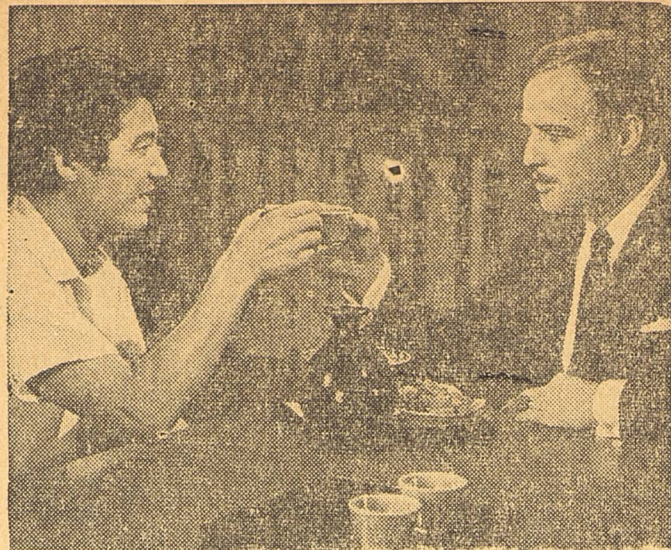

BILLS VERSUS LAWS - A quick tabulation of the results of five months of labor by the 181 members of the 58th Legislature reveals that only about 31 per cent of the bills passed both House and Senate, to become laws.

Mrs. Alworth Concludes Story On Travels

(Editor's note: This is the last article of a series concerning travels of Mrs. Alworth and her two companions in Istanbul.)
 Sunday, March 31st. We had hoped to join friends of mine and take a trip over to the Princess Island, down the sea of Marmora but the Browns called it off as their boat was an open one and the weather was so cold. We walked down the main shopping street for lunch at a fair-

ly good restaurant. Later in the afternoon, we foregathered at the Browns (he is U. S. Consul-General), together with Rabbi and Mrs. Silverman. I believe he is quite well known in New York, and I had heard the name. His trip around the world was being paid for by a branch of the government, to my disgust. We had a snack supper at the new Hilton Hotel, which is a huge affair and every thing most elaborate, even to serving girls in Turkish costume.
 Monday, April 1st. Nobody made a fool of us, except perhaps the traders we bought from. We took a nice drive around the ancient walls of Istanbul, about 16 miles and saw the fort on the European

side (where the town of Istanbul is of course.) from which a chain was stretched across the Bosphorus of Leander's Tower very near the Asiatic side. It was a very massive one, and no enemy ships ever breached it. We visited the Dried Fruit Market, and saw some interesting staples of the Turks. In fact, it seems a pity they don't export some.
 Tuesday April 2nd. We had planned a boat ride up the Bosphorus, but it was pouring rain again. It cleared by mid-day however, and we were able to get out and spend most of our money.
 Wednesday, April 3rd. We did our last shopping in the Bazaar, bade farewell to our friends in the evening over a rather better martini, and got ourselves ready for the homeward journey.
 Thursday, April 4th. We anxiously scanned the skies and found no consolation, so decided to take the long way home again. We were on the road by 7 a. m. We were not too far out of Istanbul when we came upon our first detour. It wasn't very clear to us, as the side road seemed to go to a Barrack, but we watched two heavy trucks laboring through the mud. There was a dip in the main highway which had evidently been in poor condition and it was now heavily covered with mud and debris. So rather reluctantly we turned on the side road, and discovered it

was the old road going into the next village. We eventually got on to the highway again, after inquiring from a platoon of Turks for Edirne and receiving a reassuring "O.K." We had only one other detour a little further on, where a bridge had collapsed and then proceeded along the stretch of road on which we had previously suffered.
 It was as bad as ever, if not worse! We ran into Army Convoys everywhere, both in Turkey and Greece-their armies certainly see their respective countries. Of course it must be remembered that up where we were heading for Turkey, Greece, and Bulgaria all meet, and there is a great deal of distrust of Bulgaria. Goodness knows why. When we finally bumped and rattled into Edirne again, we couldn't remember the road, but we saw two signs "Bulgaria-Greece". I thought we should take the left turn, but a traffic cop waved us merrily straight on (and we were in a Greek car too) so we obeyed and soon found ourselves crossing a long narrow bridge and bouncing a and jouncing down a narrow dirt road. So back we went behind a long line of sheep and a lot of giggling women - must have been going to a meeting or something. 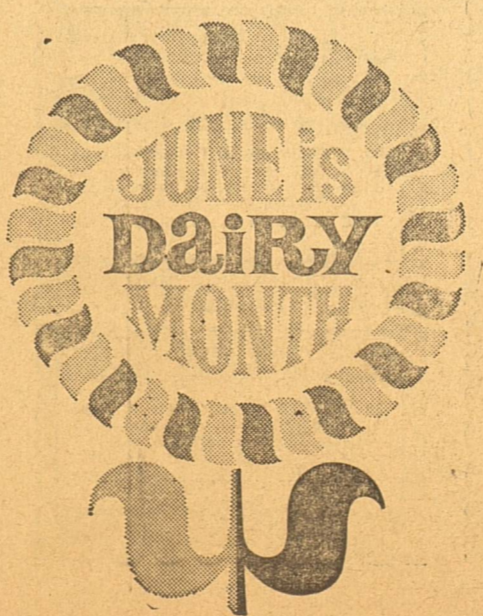

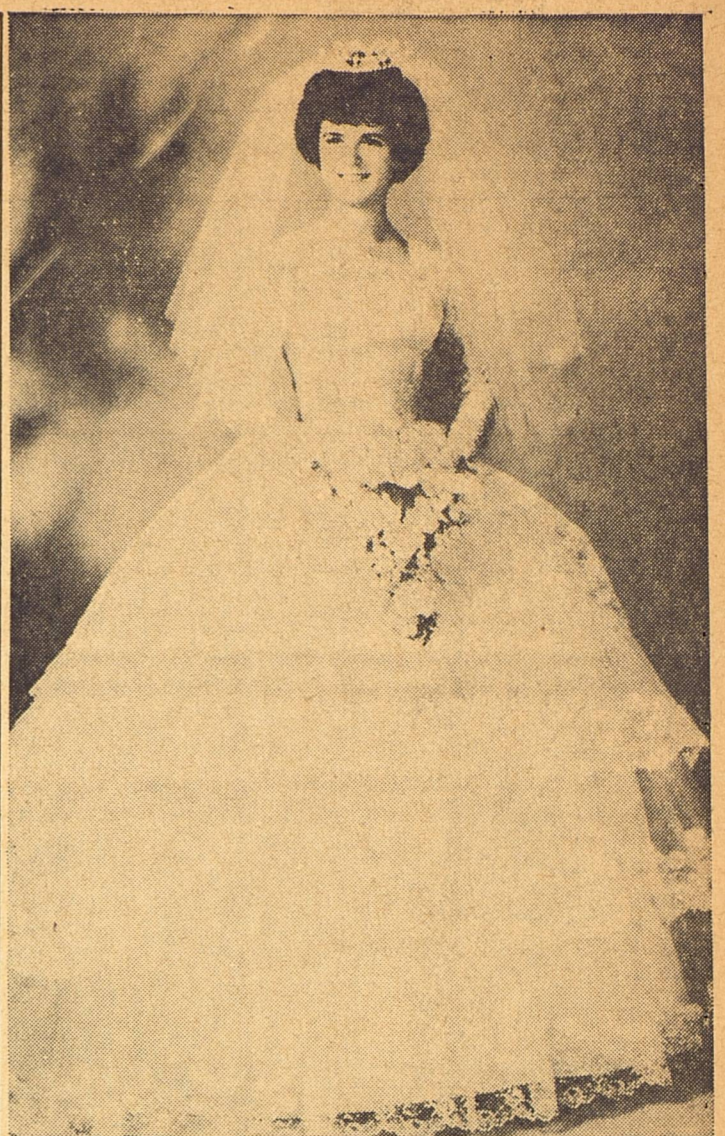
