## Around Town

I am always interested in news about ex-residents of Ranger who have made a significant contribution to history. One man who lived here in Ranger made history in the field of aviation.

Although I was unable to get enough information to do a story on his background in Ranger, the story of Art Oakley and his accomplishments in aviation, appeared recently in the Oklahoma weekly magazine "Oklahoma's Orbit." The following is that story:

Twelve-year-old Art Oakley one day wired wood-and-canvas wings to his bike, hopped on and pedaled like mad off a 40 foot bluff near Ranger, Texas.

It was the only crack up he ever had, and it was a honey, the long-time Ardmore pilot now recalls. It was also the start of a career spanning more than 30 years as a wing-walking stuntman, airport operator, plane builder, flying instructor and oil company pilot.

After learning the hard way that bikes won't fly, Art learned to fly properly in the Army Air Corps in 1917. With a partner, the late Dorsey Aske, he built Ardmore's first airport and hangar. He soon had one of the state's first flying schools going. Art and his students flew surplus army trainers, and he put together a plane out of scrap parts and an OX-5 engine.

The first one, he muses, was modeled after the old Curtis Jenny. It wasn't much sturdier, by today's standards, than that non-flying bike. But he went on to build some 50 planes at Ardmore.

A fellow by the name of Wiley Post, who had lost an eye in an oilfield accident, hung around Oakley-A s k e w field, swapping odd jobs and an occasional exhibition parachute jump for board and bed in the hangar and some flying lessons from Art. Oakley recalls Post was a "rag, tag sort" in the days before his later fame as globe circling, stratosphere-busting pilot.

"He'd try anything," Art says. "He had guts, but sometimes not much safety judgment. Even then, though he was thinking way ahead of his time." People still craned their necks in the early 20's when a plane flew over, and Art caused a lot of them to crane in his time.

At fairs and air shows, he would do headstands and balance on one foot on the wing of a jenny, or hang by his knees from the wheel struts. Aske flew, Oakley stunted.

They would make \$500 some afternoons. Art recalls one jump Post made at a southern Oklahoma fair. Post came down on one side of a team of mules, the chute on the other. The mules took off in the opposite direction — with the mules' irate owner after him.

When Art married Mahota Nichols, she put a stop to the wing walking and high flying headstands. He continued flying, though, and promoting aviation.

"We would fly from almost any open patch of ground," he says, "taking people for air-ride rides, sometimes for as little as a penny a pound. The idea was to get them interested."

Art quit the barnstorming to become pilot for Ardmore oilman Lloyd Noble when business and industrial use of planes was in its infancy. Then one day he decided maybe his luck was wearing thin and quit flying to move into the engineering side of the oil business. Except for one wrecked bicycle, he hadn't so much as bent a prop.

Art's grounded now by illness, but he still thinks of flying. "I'd give a lot," he says time with some of those jet pilots, like maybe the Blue Angels."

## Social Security Totals \$140,000 In This County

Have you ever wondered just what happens to the social security taxes that you pay? Does it ever get back to the people who pay the taxes? The answer is "Yes", according to H. L. Weatherly, Field Representative from the Abilene Social Security Administration District Office.

At the present time, social security benefits are being paid at the rate of over 14 billion dollars a year. More than 18 million people receive a benefit each month.

Contrary to what many people believe, not all social security beneficiaries are aged, retired people. Over two million children and 434,000 young widowed mothers are getting benefits under the program. In addition, monthly benefits are now being paid to about 700,000 disabled workers and to 500,000 wives and children of these disabled workers.

Right here in Eastland County, over \$140,000 will be paid about June 5 in social security benefits for May 1963. These benefits are primarily intended for the beneficiaries' own economic security, but they also help business in the community. Most of the money is spent immediately for food, clothing, and other necessary expenses.

"It is interesting to note that the average old-age benefit nationally for December 1962, was \$76.19 and that the average such benefit for this State was \$68.49, and \$65.69 for Eastland County," Weatherly added.

## Jury Selection Moves Slowly; Change of Venue Being 'Talked'

Only 37 veniremen remained for the death penalty during the preliminary questioning.

Young Curry of Cisco is accused of the murder of Mrs. Florence Hussey, divorcee and secretary of Cisco's First Baptist Church, almost two years ago.

A man formerly stationed at Dyess AFB in Abilene and now charged with murder of two women in Arizona was called the "probable murderer" of Mrs. Hussey by defense attorney John Watts of Odessa Monday.

Judge W. J. Oxford, of Stephenville, ordered selection of the jury to begin Monday afternoon after rejecting both a motion on continuance of the case until a later date and a motion for dismissal based on "double jeopardy."

Watts said Curry would plead "not guilty" and that as an alternative he will plead "not guilty by reason of temporary insanity."

**Autopsy Report**  
An autopsy report by a Cisco physician, Dr. Ballew, shows there is no legal evidence of rape but that an attempt at rape may have been made, Watts told the court.

Watts questioned prospective jurors on three specific points: prejudice on the guilt or innocence of the defendant; prejudice on the plea of temporary insanity; prejudice on the suspended sentence law.

Curry for the first time showed a keen interest in the proceedings of the court when the jury selection started. He was in animated conversation with his attorney and read the jury's list with noticeable interest.

At one point in the questioning, Watts interjected the question of use of expert testimony by a psychiatrist in questioning the prospective jurors. District Atty. Earl Conner questioned on points of whether or not they had fixed opinions about the case; whether they could lay aside what they had read and heard and serve with impartiality.

Most of the jury panel who were excused were released because they said they had fixed opinions about the case.

Gene Graves, Texas Ranger from Sweetwater, was at the trial all day. It is expected he will be called as a witness in the case. He was one of the first out-of-county officials called to assist in the investigation of the case.

questions Watts put to a prospective juror concerning a business deal he had had with District Atty. Conner.

**Double Jeopardy?**  
Watts claimed that the Cisco youth had faced "jeopardy" for murder in the juvenile hearing Aug. 9 1961, when he was sent to the State School for Boys at Gatesville.

District Atty. Conner admitted that a charge of murder had been filed against Curry on about July 15, 1961, and that after the defendant had been in jail for about 16 days, an order of dismissal of the murder charge was prepared.

Watts contended that the district attorney indicated in the dismissal motion that no further prosecution of murder would continue. The charge was changed to burglary and it was on that charge that the youth was sent to Gatesville in a closed hearing.

Conner replied that the "no prosecution clause" referred to juvenile court and not to a state court. The Odessa attorney contended the clause covered any further prosecution of any kind for murder.

Watts said the "Garza case" decision of the court of Criminal Appeals was his basis for a "double jeopardy contention."

**Bloody Flower Pot**  
Watts said the "flower pot" evidence was the basis on which he hoped to prove his contention, declaring, "The bloody flower pot which the State will say that Curry led officials to and which had his fingerprints — this evidence cannot be separated from the murder charge." Watts read other cases into the record, including one from Eastland County.

Conner's brief rebuttal cited cases where higher courts had thrown out evidence on such appeals, and asked that the motion be denied.

In overruling the motion, Judge Oxford said the juvenile trial of Curry was for burglary only, that the two offenses are separate and "based on the judgment of this court, the motion for continuance was based on his assertion that the defense needs time to get expert opinion to determine blood samples, fingerprints, etc., on items held by the state and expected to be used as exhibits at the trial.

"I expect to get a jury if at all possible," District Judge W. J. Oxford of Stephenville told a crowded courtroom in Eastland Monday.

He began hearing excuses from a number of the 196 prospective jurors about 10 a. m. before John Watts, defense attorney from Odessa, presented a motion for dismissal of the murder case against his 17-year-old client, Nathan Curry.

Watts said he hoped to have the motion, claiming former jeopardy, heard before selection of the jury began. Judge Oxford had not received the motion by 10:30 a. m., however, as he continued to hear excuses from jurors. About 10 of them had been released from the panel by that time on the basis of illness at home or small children at home.

Few excuses for business reasons were accepted.

Three walls of the courtroom were lined with spectators and newsmen and television cameramen as the trial of young Curry attracted the biggest furore in Eastland County since the famous Santa Claus bank robbery in 1927 — which also happened in Cisco.

Watts claimed his client had already faced trial in the case on the basis of his conviction of juvenile delinquency and sentenced to the State School for Boys at Gatesville Aug. 9, 1961. The specific allegation in that juvenile conviction as a 15-year-old boy was burglary, however, and the state, represented by District Atty. Earl Conner, Jr., claims he has not faced trial for murder.

Curry is accused in the slaying of Mrs. Florence Hussey, 53, a divorcee and secretary of the First Baptist Church in Cisco, two years ago.

Judge Oxford is sitting in on the 91st District Court bench for Judge T. M. Collier who disqualified himself in the case after first ruling that it should not be transferred from Eastland County.
