It will inevitably be the chief issue, not only in itself but for what it represents, and every Republican candidate for representative or senator will be compelled to take a definite position for or against it. None of them will be able to dodge it on the pretext that the bill has not come out of conference committee. ' The country will insist on knowing whether or not the relection of a Republican congress next fall is to be construed as a popular indorsement of the profiteers' Fordney-McCumber schedules.

The only way in which the Republicans can avoid the odium of the Fordney-McCumber tariff in the coming campaign is to bring the bill to a vote and defeat it. Unless they are willing to do that, they must stand by the record as it is now written .-New York World.




