MINUS HAND, NIECE WILL SUE RAIL MAN'S HEIRS

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—Handicapped by the loss of her left hand, and angered at wealthy relatives who, she declared, were apathetic, Miss Leonore Ream today prepared to file suit for \$100,000 against the heirs of the \$40,000,000 estate of her uncle, the late Norman B. Ream, Chicago and New York capitalist.

The suit is based on an "implied" contract said to have been executed by Mr. Ream 13 years ago when Miss Ream lost her hand in a railroad accident. Her uncle was one of the directors of the road and at the time of his death was a director in 14 railroads, Miss Ream said.

During his lifetime Mr. Ream sent her a monthly allowance, but did not name her in his will, and after continuing the allotments for a time Mr. Ream's widow stopped them, Miss Ream said.

One of the heirs of Ream's vast estate and a cousin of Miss Ream is Mrs. Anastaz Andreivitch von Siatky-Vonsiatky, formerly Mrs. Marion B. Stevens, who startled society several months ago by becoming the bride of a young Russian nobleman employed in a locomotive works at Philadelphia.

STABBING FOLLOWS TROUBLE OVER CARDS

BRECKENRIDGE, Aug. 17.—M. Gegréte, a Mexican, is in jail under a charge of assault to kill, having been arrested by Sheriff L. D. Head. Miano is the name of the man attacked, and he is considered in a critical condition today, suffering from a knife wound in the side.

The trouble is reported to have arisen over a card game. It is alleged when the men had quarreled a bit they began hurling stones at each other. Miano turned and ran, while he was stabbed from the rear with a seven-inch blade knife.

GIRL AND EIGHT MEN SHOT DOWN IN STREET FIGHT

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—An attempt by four gunmen to assassinate Joe Masseria, out on bail on a charge of murder, in front of 82 Second avenue, did no damage to Masseria, but led to the shooting of eight men and a girl and the killing of a pony attached to an ice cream cart. The thugs escaped in an automobile.

Finding their way blocked by a crowd of striking garment workers, in front of Beethoven hall, the gunmen fired point blank into the terror-stricken crowd.

Pursued in commandeered automobiles by two police officers, the gunmen finally lost the police.

Masseria was cleared of a murder charge two years ago, and arrested last May on a charge of killing Silvio Tagliapano. A few days ago he was released from the Tombs under \$16,000 bail.

GORDON GETS WELL ON THE BOND TRACT

EASTLAND, Aug. 17.—Gordon Petroleum company brought in a 500-barrel well on the Bond tract, five miles north of town at noon Wednesday. It is producing from the black lime at 3,582 feet.

Amenemmes ruled Egypt about 2,000 years before the Exodus and all that is known of him is that he ruled 46 years, built many pyramids, indulged in scientific research, and during the Graeco-Roman period was worshipped as the god Perma-Marres. But surely the most extraordinary thing he ever did was to stir the hearts of modern women.

The case in which his black stone

head is on view has attracted hundreds of women, who say that he is one of the handsomest men they have ever seen. The sculpture, which is a superb work of art, conveys an idea of sedate and noble calm.

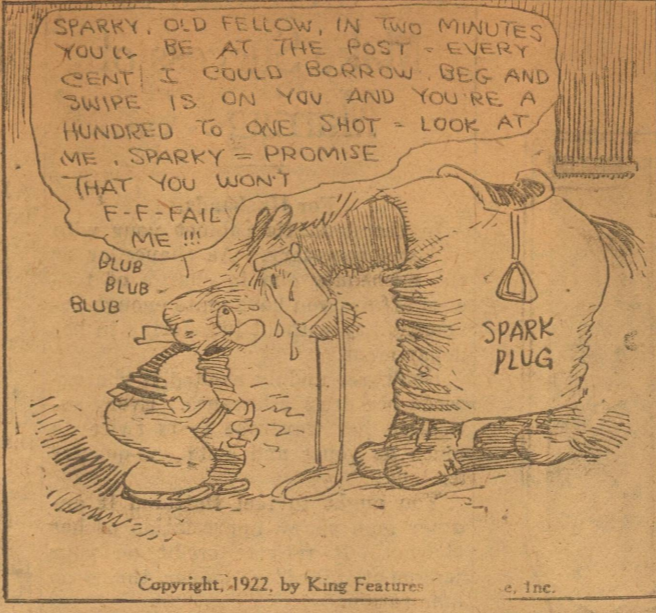
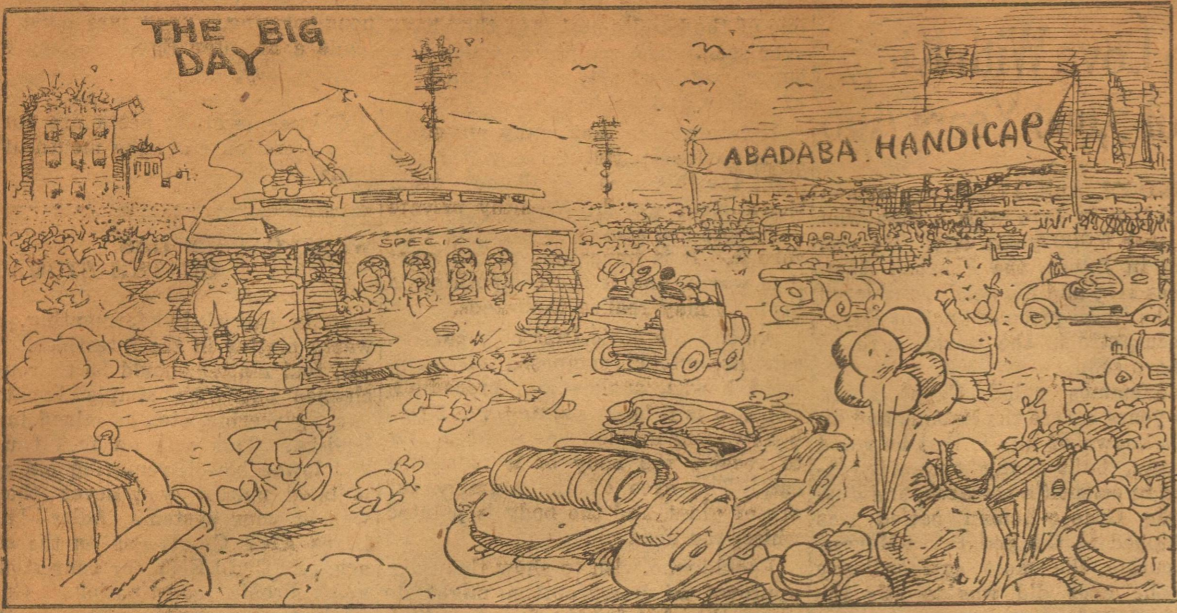

DOCKERY HITS HOMER; BEATS HILL AGAIN, 3-2

ABILENE, Aug. 17.-Red Hill, raring for revenge against the Nitros for the walloping handed him Wednesday, did a comeback in fine style yesterday but lost a 3 to 2 decision in a grueling match.
The only let-down in his hurling came in the seventh round, when Dockery slammed one of his curves over the left field fence for the circuit, with Pyle and Conley roosting on the sacks. In other innings, Red had the Nitros buffaloes, their specialty being weak taps strewn around the infield, of which Red himself handled nine perfectly and made but one error. Pyle and Dockery were the only ones who had on their batting clothes, these two connecting for six of the seven hits garnered by the Nitros.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.-Charley Comiskey, the White Sox proprietor, is showing signs of hysteria in throwing out his cash for minor league ball players.
When it was announced that the Old Roman had paid the San Francisco Pacific Coast league club \$100,000 for third baseman, Willie Kamm, some press agent inclinations were suspected.
However, when John Farrell, secretary of the National Association, offered the check as evidence, the sages then turned their doubts to a question of the old man's sanity.
No sooner had the smoke cleared from this than the White Sox boss announced that he had paid the Seattle club \$50,000 for Frank "Stubby" Mack, a young pitcher.
Because Mack was considered only a fair pitcher, many of the western fans gave the Sox the laugh and said they had been stung, but the scouts on the coast predict that he is a fine prospect.
Mack's nickname of "Stubby" is a misnomer, as he is six feet tall and weighs 185 pounds. He started baseball as a bat boy with one of his home town semi-pro teams in Los Angeles and signed by the Calgary team in the Western Canada league. At the close of the 1920 season he was picked up by Seattle for \$1,000 and was turned over to Tacoma in the Pacific International league for development.
He had a hard time getting going this year and made a poor record, but it is said that he was a victim of hard luck. He pitches overhand like all the old timers.
