

Carter Resigns As Constable; Appointed Deputy And Jailer

George Carter of Rising Star gave his resignation as Constable of Precinct 7 at a meeting of the Eastland County Commissioners held Monday.

Carter was then appointed to the positions of deputy sheriff and county jailer, and the oath of office was given by County Judge Scott Bailey.

Carter's wife, Oma, will serve as matron of the jail. She and her husband will occupy the jailer's residence in Eastland.

Carter had been working with the Sheriff's Department on a tentative basis prior to his appointment.

Constable at Rising Star for the past several years, Carter succeeds L. E. Sublett, who has assumed the duties of chief deputy with the Sheriff's force.

Also of importance at the meeting was a contractual agreement of right-of-way procurement made with the State of Texas, acting by and through the Texas Highway Department, on a portion of Highway No. State 206 located between its junction with FM 569, approximately two miles south of U.S. 80, to the intersection with U.S. 80, providing further that the State be requested to make right-of-way value determinations for all required right-of-way and that the county be reimbursed.

Concluding the regular Commissioners' meeting was the routine order of payment on accounts made during the month.

Mr. Smith was to receive the grand champion plaque for his entry of Wichita pecans in the 1962 Texas State Pecan Show. His was the champion in-shell pecan.

Parade Marshal Ed Shinn has announced the judges for the annual Jaycee parade which is the kick-off to the rodeo to be staged here this week.

Judges will be Jasper Williamson, John Roberson and A. E. Thompson. They will be given choice viewing seats upon the flat bed of a big truck which will be parked directly in front of the old vacant lot next door to the Tony Lewis Barber Shop on Main Street. Announcer for the parade will be speaking over an intercom system which will be operating from the truck-bed also.

The judges will be busy during the parade and after trying to pick the winners for the three main divisions — the best band, best float, and the best riding club. Their decisions will be announced at the opening rodeo performance Thursday night and trophies will be awarded in all three classes.

The Rodeo Queen will also be riding "Frosty" in each night of the Grand Entry.

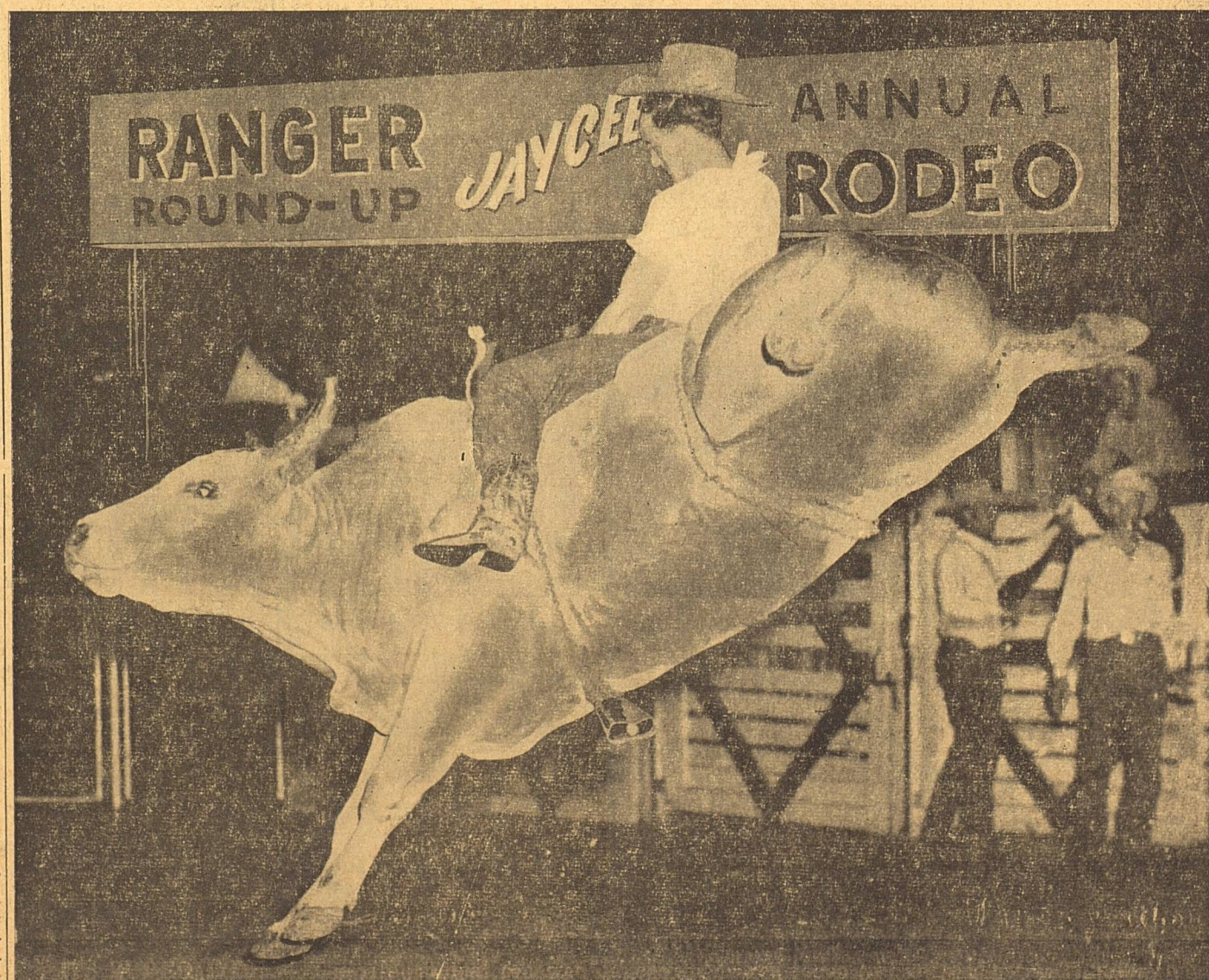
Ladies Work Many Hours On Rodeo Grounds

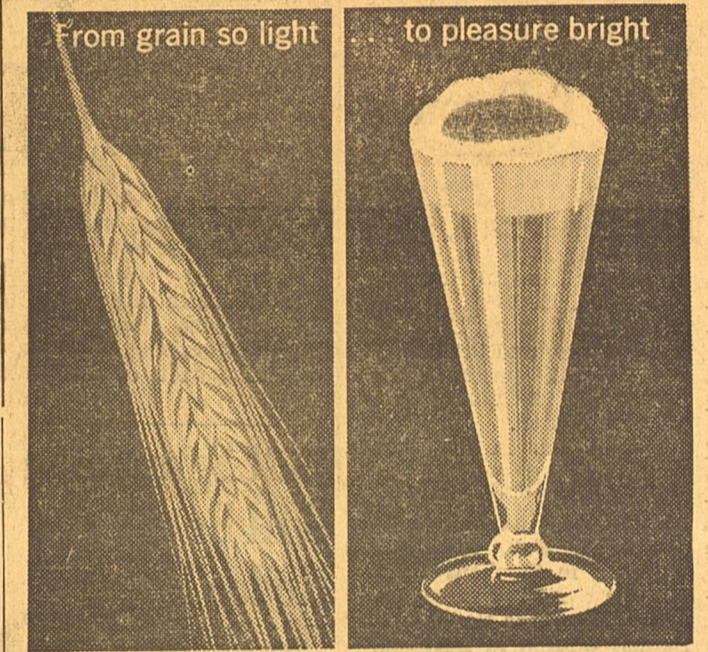
First place in the ladies pumper race with 20.2 seconds was Weatherford. Eastland placed second with 26.2 and Aledo third with 31 seconds.

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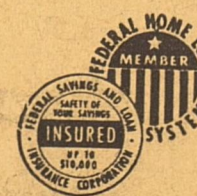

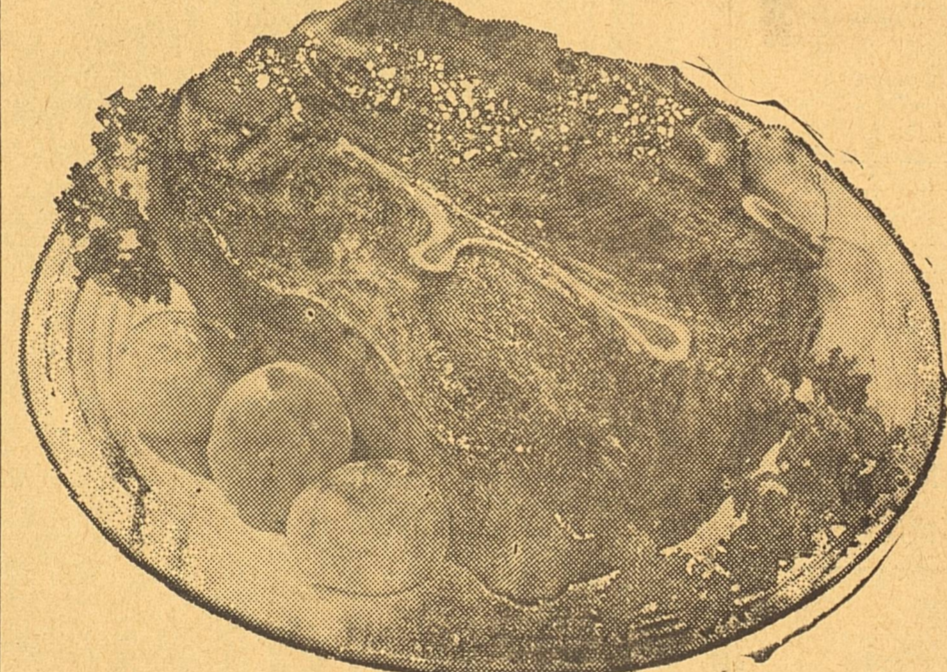

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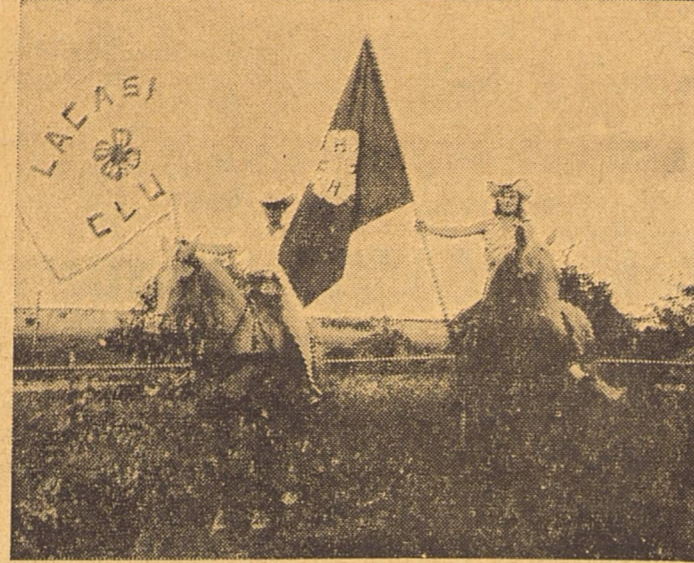

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TO THE CITIZENS...

What I will have to say probably will not appeal to nor change the minds of those of you who are firmly in favor of alcohol consumption and the legalized selling of it, but for those of you who are not in favor of it, but feel that by the legalization of it, bootlegging will be stopped and the economy of the city will be stimulated, listen to the reasonableness of such arguments.

Since the prohibition period, bootlegging (the illegal peddling and selling) of alcoholic beverages has been prevalent in this country. It is true that to a certain extent bootlegging would be stopped but only to the extent that there is a change of meaning. Bootlegging means the illegal transporting and selling of a product, but where it becomes legalized it is no longer bootlegging. Legalization of such will not stop bootlegging to teen-agers; it just makes it more accessible. If the bootleggers have a good market with teen-agers, do you think they will give that up because of the legalization of it for adults? Even if they quit selling it to teen-agers, if a young boy or girl wants it all they have to do is get someone else to go in the store and purchase it for them because it has been made within easy reach of all. Are you in favor of the legalized selling and consumption of Morphine or Heroin? If not, why not? Wouldn't the legalization of it stop the bootlegging of such products?

To a town that is gradually dying, the stimulation of its economy is quite a controversial subject. Alcohol does not stimulate an individual for it is not a stimulant but a depressant. Can alcohol stimulate the economy of this city or would it cost more to take care of the other crimes committed from the use of alcohol thereby depressing the economy? The consumption of alcohol leads to many other sins and crimes because it numbs a person's mind to that which he knows to be right and wrong. Ask the Texas Department of Public Safety how much money Texas pays out each year because of drivers who drink alcoholic beverages and ask them how many lives are lost due to its consumption? By the same token wouldn't the legalization of selling dope stimulate the economy? About the only thing that would be accomplished in the way of stimulating the economy of this city is that the licensed selling of alcohol would pad the pocket-books of a few individuals at the expense of others.
