Accuse Boys of Target Practice With Folks as Targets

\$75,000 LOSS IN BIG FIRE AT LONE STAR GAS PLANT NEAR RANGER

2 PEOPLE IN AUTOS WOUNDED

Boys Hidden in Tree Were Playing 'Bandit,' Officers Say.

LUBBOCK, Texas, Dec. 3.—A pastime indulged in yesterday afternoon by three local youths—that of playing "bandit"—and taking potshots at passing autos from their ambush in a tree by the side of the road were rudely interrupted by the appearance of Constable J. C. Roberts of Lubbock county. The youths are now in jail here. Their ages are between 14 and 16. They explained to officers that they were merely testing their marksmanship.

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—John A. Swanson, formally took office as state's attorney today, faced with the task of ridding Chicago of vice and crime. Succeeding Robert E. Crowe, who made a name for himself in many sensational trials including the Lorch-Leopold case, Swanson had before him the reports of six special grand juries branding Chicago as crime and vice-ridden and in the grasp of a huge conspiracy of politicians and crooks.

Allen Completes Initial Lap of Journey That is Destined to Terminate in Death

E. V. Allen has completed the first lap on the trip that will eventually lead to death. Friday the man, who must pay with his life for his participation in the robbery of the First State Bank of Carbon a year ago, was taken to Dallas by Deputy Sheriff "Cy" Bradford. He was placed in the Dallas county jail and will remain there until his appeal is acted upon by the court of criminal appeals. Pale with prison pallor, the dapper bandit bid good-bye to his fellow prisoners. He was not coming back. He knew it. Behind him he left one who has been his staunch friend for the last few weeks—Fred Jordan, recently acquitted of the murder of a railway conductor, but who must return to the penitentiary for three and one half years before he is allowed his freedom. Behind him he left a scared youth, who shudders when he looks into the future. He is Thomas Davis, who too must pay with his life unless the higher courts intervene. The 17 year old boy was given the extreme penalty for the murder of Lucian Shook. Davis and Allen have been in the same general cell since their conviction. "We're in lots of trouble, this boy and me," Allen once remarked to visitors at the jail. It was Allen who denied he cursed the jury that sentenced him to die, after a newspaper man had given the story to the papers of the state. "Dug" Barton, jailer, would not say why Allen was suddenly transferred from the county jail. It has been said that upon several occasions after he was convicted Allen was caught trying to escape from the ancient county

COURT OPINION IS SENT FOR BY CUNNINGHAM

Tom J. Cunningham, judge of the Eastland county court-at-law which was held unconstitutional by the Texas supreme court in a decision handed down a few days ago, when asked Saturday about his plans for the future, said that he had wired the clerk of the court for a copy of the opinion of the court in the case and that until he received the opinion he did not know what he would do. At least one Eastland attorney is of the opinion that the matter may yet be straightened out and the court continued with the exception, possibly, that it could not have jurisdiction over probate matters.

Allen Completes Initial Lap of Journey That is Destined to Terminate in Death

Only after he had promised Barton, "to be good" was he allowed the semi-freedom of the general cell, and the association with the other prisoners. Men who have experienced the oppressive penitentiary walls, would rather be confined in a jail. They prefer a small jail to that of a large city. They prefer that of a large city to the penitentiary. "This seems like a vacation, compared to the penitentiary," Jordan had said since his confinement here. He will retrace his steps to the gray walls soon. Similar to most prisoners given the death penalty, Allen feels he is the victim of "injustice." "They gave my partner 99 years. They gave me death. It doesn't seem right," he said. Allen has lost his first engagement in an effort to cheat the chair. His motion for a new trial was overruled by Judge Eizo Beany, trial judge, several weeks ago. His appeal for a new hearing has been filed. Should this fail, Allen will bid goodbye to the inmates of the Dallas county jail and start his second lap that leads to death. It is a path which has been trod by many feet. From the county jail, to that of a larger city, and then to the narrow tier of cells known as "death row." Allen's departure leaves two boys in the Eastland jail, who also are depending upon intervention of the higher courts to save their lives from being snuffed out. One is Davis, the other is "Sleepy" Clyde Thompson, also convicted of the murder of Lucian Shook. Silently awaiting the decision of higher courts two more men are counting the days. Each was given a life term. (Continued on page 2)

TWO MEN GET OUT UNHURT

Lone Star Gas Co.'s No. 2 Plant Destroyed; Will Rebuild.

Causing a loss estimated at \$75,000, fire virtually destroyed plant No. 2 of the Lone Star Gas company northwest of Ranger early Sunday night. The flames leaped a hundred feet into the air and the fire lasted about an hour. Two men on duty when the fire began got out of the doomed plant without injury. They were P. W. Swope, engineer and O. Hooks, electrician. Discharge from a high stage compressor was the cause of the fire, a four-inch pipe blowing out. The plant will be rebuilt, representatives of the Lone Star indicated. S. M. Gamble is district superintendent. Five Cooper engines, each 160 horsepower; two Superior 25 horse power engines and a 25 horsepower lighting plant engine as well as two meter houses were destroyed. The plant's function was to increase the pressure of the gas from 25 pounds to approximately 340 pounds.

KING GEORGE GRAVELLY ILL

LONDON, Eng., Dec. 2.—The King of England lay gravely ill today. His heart weakened under the strain of his lung infection and oxygen was administered to bolster his strength. Anxious subjects crowded about the palace gates. The few hundreds there represented the millions in the British empire who shared their vigil from the ends of the earth. The queen bravely faced anxious hours during the night with her daughter, Princess Mary, at her side. The Prince of Wales, heir to the throne, raced home from Africa on the fastest cruiser in the British navy. Four of the most expert medical men in Britain waited on the king, staying with him most of the night. Stanley Baldwin, the prime minister, conferred for half an hour at Buckingham palace during the early afternoon with Lord Dawson of Penn, physician in ordinary to the king.

'29 License Plates Will Be Placed On Sale Monday

Nineteen twenty-nine automobile license plates for Eastland county cars will be placed on sale Monday morning, according to Tax Collector A. M. (Ott) Hearn. The 1929 plate has a black background with gold lettering. What is believed will be a sufficient number to supply the need of car owners in the county is now in the hands of the collector. In making the announcement about the plates Mr. Hearn called attention to the fact that cars registered for 1928 might be registered now and display 1929 license plates until January 1, 1929. Also no car may be licensed without a headlight certificate of the proper date. Licenses were issued to 12,000 cars and 1,200 trucks in Eastland county in 1928, but the number for 1929 is expected to be somewhat larger than those figures.

Girl Saves Sister From Being Burned

Lying ill in bed at the home of her parents; Mr. and Mrs. R. H. McGaughey, of near Rising Star, 14-year old Margaret McGaughey, by rare presence of mind, saved her sister, Gladys, 12, from death by burns. Gladys had arisen from bed and was dressing before a gas stove when her clothing ignited, quickly enveloping her in flames. Seeing her predicament the elder sister leaped from the bed, dragged a bath robe and wrapped it about the younger girl, extinguishing the flames. Gladys, though badly burned, was pronounced by physicians as being in no danger.

BYRD NEARS ICY REGIONS

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Dec. 3.—Commander Richard E. Byrd was on the final section of his journey to the Antarctic today. Byrd, with an advance party of 50, left Dunedin yesterday aboard the flagship of his fleet, the City of New York, for the Bay of Wales. They were accompanied by supply ships. The party will establish its base at the Bay of Wales while the Eleanor Bolling, one of the supply ships, returns to New Zealand for the remainder of the expedition personnel and equipment, including airplane supplies.

Bandit Reward Case Postponed to May

EMORY, Tex., Dec. 2.—The \$100,000 suit of Mrs. Mary Hansen against the Texas Bankers' association and others was put over today until the May term of court by agreement of attorneys for both sides. At that time, Judge Grover Sellers will rule on the plea of privilege of 32 defectors to try the case in their respective counties. Defendants entering pleas of privilege when court opened this morning disclaimed any liability in the case. The suit grew out of the shooting to death of Wm. Carl Hansen during a bank robbery at Odessa, Mrs. Hansen, widow of the slain man, claimed in her petition that her husband was killed as the result of a conspiracy to collect \$5,000 reward offered by the Texas Bankers' association for every bank bandit killed. In her suit, Mrs. Hansen named officers and members of the bankers' association and three West Texas county sheriffs as defendants. She claims her husband was shot down despite his plea to the officers that they let him live.

12 KILLED IN PLUNGE OF PLANE

Big 'Ship' Going Out to Meet Brazilian Aboard Steamer.

RIO DE JENEIRO, Dec. 2.—Twelve persons were killed when a passenger plane fell into Guanabara bay. All aboard lost their lives. The mechanics of the plane emerged alive but died soon after being landed from a launch at the marine hospital. The heavily-loaded plane, with several prominent persons among its passengers, was flying out to greet the Brazilian aviator, Alberto Deumont, arriving on the steamer Cap Artona. Near Cobras island, something went wrong with the plane and watchers saw it dive 300 feet into the bay, disappearing under the water.

BY THE WAY

If you think that Cisco is deserving of all the blame and criticism in connection with the recent proceedings of the district executive committee whereby the Ranger Bulldogs were, in effect, deprived of the Oil Belt championship, your attention is invited to a part taken by the representatives of the Abilene school, as related to us by the Ranger school authorities.

The readers will recall that after the committee ruled Hammett ineligible, the committee further suggested that the Cisco-Ranger game be replayed. It will be further recalled that the representatives of Cisco and Ranger decided to postpone this game until the regular schedule had been completed—and then, if the championship decision hinged upon such a game, that it be replayed—otherwise not. In other words, there was no reason for replaying the game until Ranger and Cisco had completed their regular schedules without an official defeat. This arrangement suited Cisco and Ranger but it didn't suit Abilene.

Abilene sent a wire to all the members of the district committee saying that the Cisco-Ranger arrangement was "unfair to Abilene." How was it unfair to Abilene? Had they not said that Ranger had played Hammett in good faith against the Eagles and that they did not want their game on a forfeit? Then what decision was it of Abilene's what decision that Cisco and Ranger worked out concerning their own game?

That's not all; Abilene notified Ranger that if Ranger did not play Cisco regular schedule Saturday that Abilene would refuse to play Ranger again and would claim the championship.

Could it be possible that Abilene had merely posed as being magnanimous and wasn't going to claim a forfeit because it figured that Cisco would push its own case? Had they not said that Ranger and Cisco would "cut each other's throat" and make both teams easy pickings for Abilene when the Eagles played Cisco four days later and Ranger two days after that, provided Ranger achieved the miraculous and—without Hammett—defeated Cisco and Breckenridge?

Wouldn't that have been a sweet arrangement that Abilene was trying to force on Ranger? Make the Bulldogs meet Cisco on Saturday, then Breckenridge two or three days later and then, if Ranger had run that gauntlet, clash with the Eagles after two or three more days?

On the other hand if Ranger had been unable to beat Cisco, don't you know that the Bulldogs would have chewed the Lobos up so badly that when Abilene tackled Cisco five days afterward, the Big Dam team would have been smooth sailing for Abilene?

But this pretty scheme whereby Ranger and Cisco would act as the unwitting catspaws in raking chestnuts out of the fire for

AGED PIONEER GOES TO NEW, UNKNOWN LAND

Ezra Meeker, of Oregon Trail Fame, Dies at Age of 97.

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 3.—Ezra Meeker, last of the great pioneers, is dead.

The man known to the world as the personification of the type of emigrant who braved the rigors of the old Oregon trail, breathed his last at 4:05 a. m. today.

Old age coupled with illness proved too much for the vitality of the 97-year-old westerner. Meeker had said as he lay dying—squarely—he was not sorry to go, although it was his desire to live to the age of 100.

Unfounded Rumors of King's Death

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Baseless rumors that the king of England was dead were circulated in several cities of the United States and Canada today. The United Press traced the origin of one rumor to Montreal where it apparently originated when a flag was flown at half mast for someone who had died there.

The London office of the United Press was informed by Buckingham palace attendants at 4:45 p. m., British time, that the rumors were false. Similar rumors have been circulated in England in the last 48 hours.

Quake Victims Now Are Estimated 221

SANTIAGO, Chile, Dec. 3.—The newspaper La Nacion on the basis of its correspondents' report estimated that 221 persons were killed in the earthquake which rocked a section 150 miles south of here. The newspaper estimated the injured at 695.

Standing Beside a Man Shot Down By Enraged Bandit

A. Neill of Prairie Oil & Gas Company, Passenger on Illinois Central Train Near Monroe, La., That Was Held Up; Lost Only a Few Dollars.

Returning from a Thanksgiving visit with his parents, A. Neill in charge of the gas department of the Prairie Oil & Gas company, was one of the passengers held up on the Illinois Central railroad Saturday night about 9:30 just out of Monroe, La.

In describing the incident, Mr. Neill said the passengers were notified by the train crew that the train was being held up and this fact enabled many of the passengers to hide much of their valuables. The loss of his money did not worry Mr. Neill as he said that was the least part of it.

When the hold-up man entered the compartment where Mr. Neill and several others were, he demanded "Shove 'em up," and they went up, too.

Approaching K. M. Blount, a representative of DeSota Motor Corporation, the robber demanded his watch and chain. After jerking it from his vest, he discovered there was no watch on it and said "I'll kill you for that," and fired one shot which struck Mr. Blount's neck and he fell over a wash basin. Thinking his shot had been fatal the bandit immediately fled to the rear of the car and made his escape. The wound proved to be only slight.

"The fact that I was standing next to Mr. Blount and came out without an injury is the greatest thing I was interested in," said Mr. Neill.

Reports from Monroe, La., stated it was thought possibly the hold-up man has been caught.

Mr. Neill's actual loss was only some four or five dollars, having successfully hidden the remainder of his valuables but other passengers were not so fortunate and several thousand dollars was taken.

San Antonio Will Be Funeral Scene For Five Victims

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 3.—The bodies of the five persons who were burned to death when the tri-motored transport plane Sunbeam crashed and burned near Spur, Texas, late Saturday, will be brought here today. The Sunbeam was en route to Denver when the accident occurred.

Homer D. Ballard, millionaire owner of the plane, will be buried here Wednesday. He formerly lived in Minneapolis but during the past two years had been engaged in the bond business here. He also maintained a home in Denver. During the war, Ballard was a flying cadet at Ellington field, Houston. His mother, aged 50, and two children, survive him.

Matthew Waldron, 32, of Austin, pilot of the plane, came here from Austin a year ago and was credited with 5,000 hours in the air. His former home was at Gary, Ind., and he is survived by his father and a 7-year-old daughter. Harold Washburn, 22, the mechanic, was the son of Mrs. Winifred Washburn of San Antonio.

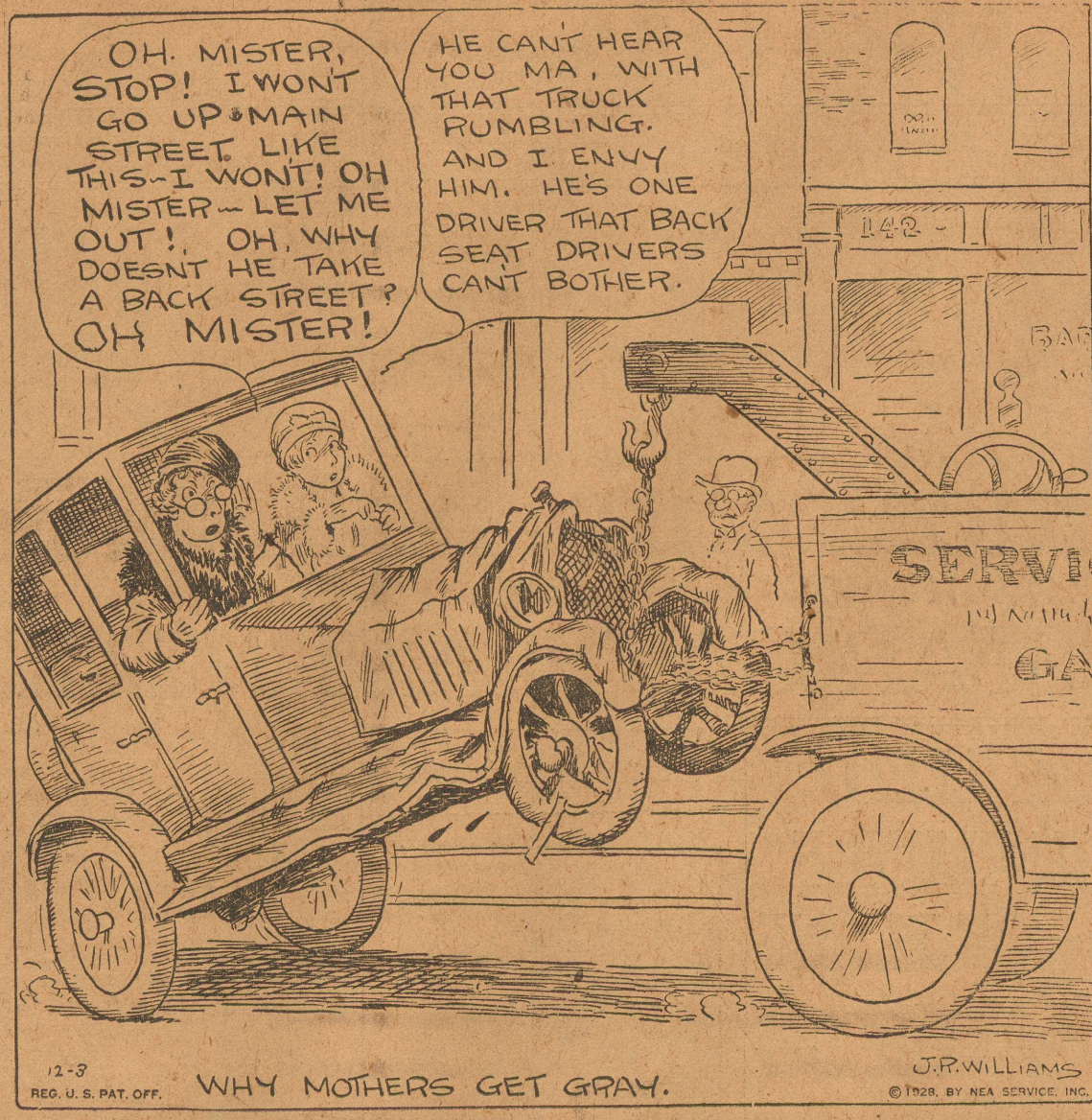

(Continued From Page One) somebody else collapsed. So then what did Abilene do—this Abilene school that never protests anybody, that wins its games on the field, that wants no forfeitures, this school that was the friend of Ranger. Why a school official calls up the Ranger superintendent and tells Mr. Holloway in substance, "If you don't play Cisco Saturday—meaning the Saturday before Thanksgiving—Abilene will refuse to play Ranger again and will claim the championship." If Abilene school authorities are friends of Ranger—in the face of that—then Brutus was a friend of Caesar. In fact, Brutus claimed to be Caesar's friend, meanwhile whittling Julius' heart out with a Bowie knife. Deliver us from such friends!

We are not including the citizenship of Abilene in our comments. We think the people of this city are good sports and we do not believe that they knew what their school authorities were doing.

Here's a challenge to Abilene school authorities: Either Abilene voted against Hammett, or they voted for Hammett. If they voted against Hammett, then Abilene is responsible for Hammett's being ruled ineligible because the vote was 3 to 2 against him and a change of one vote would have made the ballot 3 to 2 for him—which means that Ranger's hard-won, clean-cut victory over Cisco on the gridiron would have stood, Ranger would have had the services of her regular quarterback and would not have sustained the humiliation of a defeat at the hands of Breckenridge, and then would have taken Abilene to an old-fashioned country cleaning in the playoff game for the championship. So if Abilene voted against Hammett, then Abilene cost Ranger the district championship.

But maybe Abilene voted for Hammett. All right; by their vote they said he was eligible, yet they were willing to take the championship from Ranger on the ground of ineligibility—which they had voted against. How's that for consistency?

Abilene authorities can take either horn of the dilemma they choose. If they voted against Hammett, they kept Ranger from winning the district championship; if they voted for Hammett, believing him eligible, yet would try to force Ranger to default, they were taking advantage of a charge of ineligibility which by their vote they said was not true—isn't that the case?

Oil Belt fans in general did not know about these matters. Everyone upon learning of these things has urged us to print them so the public may know. And we are

servicing notice here and now that we haven't fired all our ammunition about Abilene.

We are going to give to the public the behind-the-scenes occurrences in Oil Belt football. The situation is going to be cleaned up or we'll know the reason why. Ranger has been deprived of the district championship but that is no reason why we should remain silent and allow the Bulldogs to be torn to pieces in the committee room again next year or by our inactivity now allow a condition to continue whereby Eastland, San Angelo or Brownwood—if they produce a winning team next year—will suffer at the hands of Abilene and Cisco as Ranger has this season.

The time has come for plain speaking and for an end of secret proceedings and secret meetings. We feel that a great injustice has been done to us clean and fine a bunch of boys as can be found and to keep silence at a time like this would be the rankest cowardice. We believe that the fate of Oil Belt football is trembling in the balance. Another such season as this one and the sport in effect will have been flung to the wolves to be torn limb from limb.
