Students pay a fee of \$25 for the special summer course. They will receive 1/2 credit for completing the

Classroom instructions began May 13, and we're com-pleted on June 7 for a total of 33 hours of classroom instruction. Hours are from 8-10:15 each week day morning.

All phases of driving are taught in the classroom, in-

Mr. Garrett said that the objective of the course was not primarily to get a driver's license, but to teach students

to be safe and sane drivers. Written tests were given to the students Monday by a representative of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Those who passed were given restricted licenses to be used while participating in the second phase of the course, behind the wheel training. Holders of restricted licenses must have a licensed driver in the they are at the wheel.

A dual control car is being used for this instruction. Students are divided into groups of four, in the behind the wheel phase. One group and the instructor make up the number in the car.

Students must be 14 years of age and classified as a freshman or above before becoming eligible for the course.
